with Mosler equipment. The new window should be open for business Tuesday morning, July 1. Even though the customer will find himself in new surroundings, he will be greeted by the familiar face of Mrs. Jo Ann Marr.

One employee can easily serve customers in both lanes. In the lane nearest the office, the bank customer is waited on as in the old unit. If the customer is in the second lane fartherest from the office, a cannister will come from the office through an underground tube and be at window level for removal to place banking business in and return to the office by cannister through the pipe. The drive-in office is connected with the main bank building both by telephone intercom and closed circuit television. In either lane, the customer has intercom connection with the drive-in window

Two banks in Wichita Falls have the identical set-up which Munday has chosen. It will definitely give the cusomters faster service. Two more lanes have been constructed, and the mechanism needed for them to be operable will be very minor. At some future date, if there is a need for additional lanes, they will be provided.

#### County Has \$3 Million In **Taxable Sales**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday reported gross sales in Texas for 1979 totaled more than \$213.8 billion.

Bullock said a sales tax analysis of gross sales for the year's last calendar quarter showed that gross sales reached \$66.9 billion, up \$14.4 billion over third quarter gross sales.

The gross sales figures were gathered from 329,405 reporting outlets across the

Out-of-state gross sales

received from 5,867 reporting outlets from the same period totaled \$5 billion. He said 1978 gross sales for Texas amounted to \$186

Bullock also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of

the state's 254 counties. The report for Knox County showed a gross sales of \$10,732,522 from 176 reporting outlets. After deductions, the county was listed as having a total of \$3,804,189 in sales subject to

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#### IN TOUCH

By DAN COX, MINISTER CHURCH OF CHRIST

There is more interest today than ever before in religion, especially in salvation by God the creator of us all. Many so-called "Evangelists" are preaching "Salvation is by faith alone". But what does the Bible say? Can we trust any other source for our eternal security? Let's look at three points on salvation. Check the scriptures in your Bible and see if you agree with God's word.

THE GOSPEL IS GOD'S ONLY PLAN OF SALVA-TION. Do you agree here? The fact is stated by Paul in Romans 1:16: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes." Of course, we can all agree at this point. According to the "gospel", men must hear the gospel (Romans 10:17) to obtain faith. We are responsible for what we hear, and therefore what we believe. The Bereans in Acts 17:11 were commended for checking up on Paul as he preached to them. We must be ready to accept this responsibility for what we hear, and how we apply what is learned. The gospel (good news) of Jesus can only help us if we hear the pure gospel. This accounts for Paul's curse on any who try to pervert the truth (Galatians 1:6-9).

FAITH IS ESSENTIAL TO SALVATION. Again, almost everyone is in agreement here. Without faith, it is impossible to please God (Hebrews 11:6). Also, a majority of us could agree what is taught to believe in the scriptures: God, Jesus the Savior of all, resurrection of Christ, eternal punishment and reward, etc. But a warning stands clear in James Chapter 2 there are two kinds of faith. One kind is dead and unsaving (James 2:19, 20); the other is active and brings salvation (2:20-26). Verse 19 and 20 show that even the demons believe, but it is a dead faith. It is also pointed out that faith can be seen in actions (works). In verses 20-26 it is plainly summed up by "As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead". Faith is perfected in obedience. See Romans 16:26 and Hebrews 5:8, 9. What are these "works?"

OBEDIENCE IN FAITH DEMANDS THREE BIBLICAL "ACTS".

Repentance towards sin is the first of these three. Turning from sin (repentance) is commanded (Acts

17:30), and the consequences of neglect are clear (Luke 13:3). Confession of faith in Jesus is also a necessary step. Jesus said that those who confess him before men would be confessed before the Father in Heaven (Matthew 10:32). Romans 10:10 teaches that with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. This brings us to baptism, a disputed work of obedience.

Yet baptism is mentioned as strongly as repentance or confession in required acts of faith. Baptism (immersion in water - Romans 6:4; Acts 8:36) is essential for the forgiveness of sins, thus salvation. Read Mark 16:15-16, Acts 22:16, and I Peter 3:20-21.

The Bible speaks plainly when it tells us that the gospel is the only plan of salvation, faith is essential to that salvation, and obedience requires repentance, confession, and baptism for the forgiveness of sin. "What must I do to be saved?" Some say "just believe". What does the Bible say? No one asks you to give up God's grace, for Ephesians 2:8, 9 says, "For by grace you have been saved thru faith." His grace is still applied, but only when his commandments are met. Are you saved? Have you ever been told these things before? You have now! Will you accept His gospel as the Way to Heaven and be obedient to

EYE PRESSURE TEST NEEDED TO

PREVENT BLINDNESS Is there a blind spot in your checkups? The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness thinks there is : if that checkup does not include a test for glaucoma, the

leading cause of blindness

"A test for the high eye

pressure that is characteristic of glaucoma should be as routine a part of every checkup for people over 35 years old as is the test for high blood pressure", says Richard Kimbrough, M. D., Houston ophthalmologist who is the Society's glaucoma chairman. "A quick, painless test with a tonometer can readily determine eye pressure and in an era where preventive health measures are being increas- ingly emphasized, patients should ask that such a test be included in every physical exam they get."

"Family practitioners and internists, the doctors who frequently give checkups, tested for glaucoma in medical school," Kimbrough pointed out, "but usually neglect to incorporate the test into their practice." Yet the Society estimates that one out of every 50 of their patients over age 35 may have glaucoma. However, because the disease comes. on so painlessly, neither patient nor doctor can be aware of its onset in time to save valuable sight unless the patient's intraocular or eye pressure is regularly checked.

### Through Travel

### Four Tractors Receive Facelift By 'Ag' Boys

Greg Rawdon, instructor of the Farm Power and Machinery class, and his 13 senior students experienced a very busy and worthwhile school year. They were successful in acquiring four tractors to overhaul and bring up to "par".

A. B. Martin Jr., principal of Munday elementary and Junior high school, pesented them with a "family heirloom", a 1936 model A John Deere. Mr. Martin's dad, the late A. B. (Alvie) Martin Sr., bought the tractor new from Wesley Harrison Hardware in Seymour, trading his horses, mules, and a Farmall lug tractor in on this up-to-date piece of equipment.


It came equipped with a two row cultivator and two row planter. List price was around \$1550. It burns kerosene and has a one gallon annex gas tank used for starting. At that time, kerosene sold for about four or five cents a gallon - talk about economy!

This little number is a two cylinder which was the John Deere style for a number of years. The one gallon starter tank works real well if a fellow doesn't forget to soon change it over to kerosene. If it slips the driver's mind and all the gas is used up, one would be walking to the house, or wherever, for a gallon of gas, because there was just no getting it started. It was slow to travel - a rain shower coming up would get you wet easily before you could get to shelter.


This 1936 model was used for field plowing until around 1947; then, was used around the farm for odd jobs as late as 1953.

Mr. Martin, his dad, and his brother, Forest, now of Seymour, all drove the tractor. It has now become a three generation tractor, since Mr. Martin's son drove it home from Munday after its "facelift."

All the materials for the repair work could be found except for a gasket. The

Another tractor overhauled this year was a Cyclone A John Deere, belonging to Alvin Adams. It is a two cylinder model dating to 1947 or 1948, and had been more or less discarded. It is certainly in working order now! The cost of the work was around \$300.00. The owner pays for the materials and gives a donation to the chapter to cover incidentals.

Merle Lambeth of Goree has a 1951 M Farmall which, after hving approximately \$600.00 worth of parts put in it and hours of hard work by Phil Johnson, Isom Murray, Ernie Valencia and Ralph Hernandez, works like a top. This tractor proved to be the biggest challenge. Finding

parts was a major problem. James Carden let the boys work over his 1943 9N Ford. They completely rebuilt the engine, replaced bearings in the rear end, painted it, and had around \$450 to \$500 in it when they called it finished. Chris Brown, Jeff Cooke and Henry Escamilla were the mechanics and painters on this project.

Greg Rawdon complito their job until the end, in each instance. There were problems but they worked them out and the boys felt a real sense of accomplishment when the jobs were completed.
