Weinert To Get New Post Office

Construction of a new post office building at Weinert was further advanced recently with the announcement by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that a contract has been awarded to Mr. Keith D. Swim, P. O. Box 428, Iowa Park, Texas, to build and lease the building to the Post Office Department for a basic 5 year period, with two five-year renewal options.

Mr. Gronouski said, "We are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed, but we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program

to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding volume of mail. The construction program is being concentrated in those areas where the need is urgent and suitable space cannot be obtained except through new construction.

"We now have about 45,000 post office locations throughout the country, handling a volume of 68 billion pieces of mail a year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. It is clear, therefore that we must redouble our efforts, not only in expanding our capacity but also in devising new postal techniques to meet the demands of our growing population. The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment, while the building remains under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes. This formula utilizes the resources and investment funds of private enterprise for needed postal buildings."

The new post office quarters at Weinert will contain approximately 800 square feet of floor space and will be equipped with air conditioning equipment and fluorescent lighting. This new postal facility will be located on the northwest corner of Duvall Street and Highway 277 and will have adequate all-weather parking and maneuvering area.

The space presently occupied by the Weinert Post Office will be made available for other purposes at the time the new quarters are occupied. Occupancy is scheduled for May 1, 1964.

THE NATION LIVES

Out of evil, sometimes comes a good. Perhaps that can be said, in all humility and wonder, of the terrible assassination of President Kennedy.

The nation was shocked — shocked to the heart, and pervading sorrow lay over all. But the nation lived. A new President took the helm at once, in line of duty, and the continuity was never broken. Presidents, as all mortals must, pass on—by natural death, by retirement, by the will of the electorate, or, in rare and awful instances, by a violence that no rational mind can understand. But the nation goes on. Its institutions and its necessities remain in all their strength and urgency. The nation is greater than any man, great as he may be.

So, to speak in symbol, the flag still flew. It was at half mast, in honor and in sadness, but it was there. The flag is beyond mortality, as it is beyond the problems and controversies of the passing moments.

The nation stands firm and strong—as, at a time of profound tragedy, the whole world learned.

THE PRESIDENT DEMANDS ECONOMY

In the vast welter of news and speculation that surrounded President Lyndon Johnson's first days and weeks in office, one statement of his, of potentially great significance, may have been widely overlooked.

Speaking before a joint session of Congress, he made it unequivocally clear that he means to press for maximum economy in the operation of the government. His avowed purpose is to get a dollar's worth of value in return for each public dollar spent.

This is not just a matter of lip service to a principle. The new President implemented it with action, in the form of orders and directives to both government agencies and concerns doing business with the government which, in effect, demand a strict accounting of all costs and the making of reductions where possible.

This does not mean that government spending will be anything other than huge. Indeed, if the space race intensifies, it may substantially increase. But if Mr. Johnson has his way, the government will watch its spending with a much more analytical eye.

It is to be hoped that the President will take still another needed step—that is, to urge the removal of government from the tax-exempt operation of commercial projects which can and should be undertaken by taxpaying private enterprise.

YORK, NEBR., NEWS-TIMES: "Few of us ever have folding money in our pockets long enough to become very well acquainted with it. . . . But there's a fellow in Miami, Fla., who has complained to his congressman about the \$10 bill. He thinks the obsolete car in the picture on the back gives America a bad image and certainly does not convey the idea of progress which this nation is so proud of. . . . However, as one Treasury spokesman commented, the out-of-date ten-spot is 'a symbol of the stability of the American economy.' On that controversial note, perhaps it is best to close the subject."

MILES CITY, MONT., STAR: ". . . in a Moscow military parade, Khrushchev wheeled out for a public view what he represented was an anti-missile missile. I do not suggest that we take Khrushchev's word for it. But, at the same time, we should not be trusting him to keep his word on the test-ban treaty as we seem to be doing. The flaunting of the Soviet weapon dramatically points up the enormity of the risk we are taking by not developing our own anti-missile missile with all possible haste."

ALBANY, KY., NEWS: "Democrats and Republicans in Congress are accusing one another of playing politics. That's like accusing Daniel Boone of carrying a gun."

THE DANGER OF CREEPING INFLATION

Last October, reports the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the cost of living reached still another record high. Further increases are expected.

This particular increase was very small—it reduced the purchasing power of a \$10 bill by only about a penny. Over a period of time the monthly loss in the dollar's value has been similarly small. One hardly notices it. And therein lies a real danger. The worth of our money, which means the worth of our labor, may be so slowly eroded that we hardly realize the peril that exists. Like water wearing away stone, day by day, month by month, year by year, the loss is barely discernible. But, ultimately, the stone ceases to exist.

So it is with creeping inflation. Values—irreplaceable values—may be destroyed almost unnoticed. And the primary cause of that inflation is spending by government beyond income—which means, to a very great extent, spending for purposes which are not within the true responsibility of government. The menace of inflation has not been eliminated—it is only dormant. And the problem it presents is made all the greater by the almost universal demand for tax reduction—with no certain reduction in spending.

The Wall Street Journal points out that "Since electric power is available to just about every farm in the country, it would seem logical for the Rural Electrification Administration to stop expanding. But since political instrumentalities are not necessarily logical, the REA is busily financing the building of more and bigger electric generating plants."

GRAYSON, KY., JOURNAL-ENQUIRER: "If the U. S. has enough nuclear weapons to kill three times the present world population, as many believe, and it wishes to maintain this ratio, it probably will have to step up production, as the world population is increasing rapidly."

VINCENNES, IND., SUN-COMMERCIAL: "The first book to be written by a computer is soon to be placed on the market. In fact, it was written by a number of computers working 40 hours, nonstop. . . . Human authors take note: This computer-written opus will sell for the industry price of \$500 a set. Not bad for a first opus by a computer."

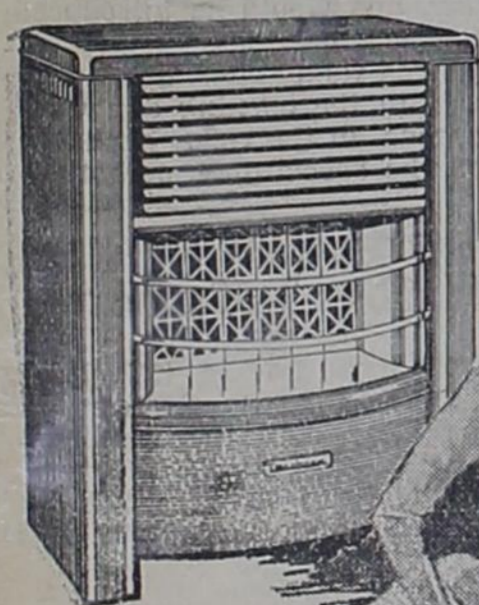

**IT'S THE LAW
in Texas**

**The Original
"Philadelphia Lawyer"**
Frequently, when a problem is particularly perplexing, someone will exclaim that "this would confuse a Philadelphia lawyer." The term takes on special significance when it is remembered that it has a close connection with one of the most important cases in American legal history—the seditious libel trial of John Peter Zenger in 1735.

Zenger was the printer and publisher of a paper known as the New York Weekly Journal. Unfortunately, he made the unhappy mistake of criticizing the administration of Royal Governor Cosby of New York in the public print. The tyrannical Cosby had Zenger jailed and thus began a dramatic and important event in American history.

Zenger had editorialized that the Governor had deeds to lands destroyed, judges arbitrarily displaced, new courts established without the consent of the Legislature and had denied the right to vote to certain landowners. All of these accusations were based on fact but truth was held to be no defense in a prosecution for seditious libel, which was defined as "a written censure upon public men for their conduct as such." Inconceivable as it is today, the English courts had taken the position that the greater the truth the more serious the nature of the libel.

Zenger was brought to trial for his published remarks and almost immediately his New York counsel were disbarred because of the resistance they offered in his defense. After disbarment they secured the services of Andrew Hamilton of the Philadelphia bar to continue the defense. Hamilton was the foremost lawyer in the American Colonies and the term "Philadelphia lawyer" was long used as a special compliment in his individual honor.

Hamilton offered his services to Zenger without fee. Displaying great moral courage he defied the judges who were controlled by the Governor and told the jury that it was not considering the cause of just a poor printer. Instead, it was considering the cause of "the liberty both of exposing and opposing arbitrary power by speaking and writing truth." At the conclusion of the trial the Chief Justice instructed the jury that the printed words of Zenger were libelous and that if the jury found he had published them, as he had, then Zenger should be found guilty. Under such circumstances it was obvious that Zenger would be convicted.

Fortunately, the jury, which was not controlled by the Governor, defied the court. Zenger was found not guilty. America had a free press and as Governor Morris, one of the members of the Constitutional Convention was later to remark, "The trial of Zenger in 1735 was the germ of American freedom, the morning star of that liberty which subsequently revolutionized America."

LONE STAR AGRICULTURE

Artificial Infestation Of Fruit Flies Planned
 Down in the Rio Grande Valley where the Mexican fruit fly is a perennial pest, scientists are going to deliberately release a host of the insects this season.

This is not a deliberate attempt to destroy the citrus fruit industry already harrassed by the citrus black fly, soft brown scale, rust mite and intermittent freezes, however. No damage will

result from this artificial infestation.

Large colonies of flies will be sterilized, both male and female, so that Texans and federal entomologists can study their migration habits. The flies themselves do not actually damage the fruit. But sterilization prevents the females from producing eggs that develop into hungry larvae—the actual culprit. Male flies are sterilized so that they cannot breed with any female flies that may be already present.

The flies are fed a dye compound which causes their bodies to glow under florescent light. By keeping a record of release points and dates, researchers can tell a great deal about the flies' traveling habits when they are later caught in traps set at various points up and down the Valley. Once their migration habits and traveling capabilities are known, the information will be valuable in establishing a more effective control program.

Sterile fly release has been used successfully in the screw-worm eradication program. Unfortunately, this sterilization program will not reduce the Mexican fruit fly population in the same manner. Mexican fruit flies breed several times each season. The female screwworm fly breeds only once in a lifetime.

This program is a cooperative project between the Texas Department of Agriculture, U.S.D.A. Plant Pest Control Division and the Valley citrus industry. Mexican authorities are also aiding in the study. Flies will be irradiated and dye marked at a research lab in Mexico City and brought to the Valley for release, beginning in early January. The program is scheduled to continue through the Valley shipping season next spring.

Motoring Without Traffic Lights And Intersections Is Dream Of The Future

COLLEGE STATION—Within the next decade, Texans should be able to motor nonstop to far-away places like California or New York without opposition from pesky traffic lights and busy intersections.

The program to crisscross the United States with these interstate highways has been made possible by billions of dollars allocated by state and federal governments.

But the success of this venture will depend largely on how well men can use heavy highway construction equipment to clear and to make a path for miles of concrete and asphalt.

Members of a training school at Texas A&M University believe that their graduates will make a sizeable contribution to this federal-state highway program through its graduates.

Organized in 1957, the school has produced 700 men trained to operate machinery that knocks over trees or scoops up tons of dirt. Its graduates are not civil engineers or construction superintendents; they work the bulldozers, the cranes, the graders and scrapers and dragline equipment.

The training center is somewhat hidden on the southwestern part of A&M's 5,200-acre campus at College Station. Its official title is the "Highway Construction Equipment Technicians and Operators School." It's part of the Engineering Extension Service program.

Alvin W. Jones serves as the spokesman for the staff, although he simply calls himself an instructor.

"Our staff is small, and rank is unnecessary," Jones commented. The school has four permanent staff members—three instructors including Jones and a mechanic—and others are called in when necessary.

One of the unique features is the immediate benefits realized by the university from the students.

Students, for example, might be assigned the task of clearing a tract of undeveloped land on the university's farm, after they have received basic instruction. In six years, almost 1,000 acres of such land has been cleared.

Others might be asked to make a lake or pond. Previous classes have dug four lakes on pastureland managed by the university's College of Agriculture, Jones pointed out.

Miles of roadway have been made on the campus by these heavy equipment school students. A future project calls for the school to clear runway approaches to the university's airport.

"This job alone will save the university thousands of dollars," Jones said. "The trees have grown taller than the Federal Aviation Agency permits."

The students—some high school age and some nearing retirement age—pay a tuition fee of \$250 for 160 hours of instruction, Jones noted.

"This may seem high, but it costs money to pay for operation and maintenance of this type of equipment and machinery," he added. "It's a small fee considering the additional income the graduate will draw as a more skilled person."

The school, approved for veterans, has 24 pieces of heavy equipment and several trucks, valued at more than \$500,000.

Other instructors are LaRue W. Jones and Charlie W. Brannan, both veterans of the road building business.

Most of the maintenance work is done at the school's shop by students, instructors and Joseph G. Papsun, head mechanic.

A Story Of The Christmas Card

The Munday post office will handle about as many Christmas cards this year as in the past years, Postmaster Chan Hughes predicted today while reflecting on the history of the Yule greeting card.

The local post office can not maintain a count on Christmas cards because there's no way of telling which letter envelopes contain cards, but the greeting card industry estimates several billion will be mailed this year during the holiday season.

Based on research by the national Greeting Card Association, the Postmaster gave this account of the background and development of the cards:

"Today, the greeting card industry estimates six billion greeting cards for all occasions are mailed annually in the United States. Statistically, this is estimated at about 110 Christmas cards per family on the average each year."

"We often think of the custom of sending cards as modern, but the origins of the greeting card can be traced back thousands of years."

"The earliest known holiday greeting was printed from a crude woodcut about 1450 in Germany. It shows the Christ Child standing in the bow of an ancient galley manned by angels, with

the Holy Mother seated by the mast."

"History reveals people have always had a desire to communicate on a sentimental and emotional basis. For example, the ancient Egyptians conveyed greetings with papyrus scrolls."

"In the Dark Ages, the exchange of symbols—gloves, garters and bows—was regarded as a form of sentimental communication."

"The modern custom of sending greeting cards can be traced back through the centuries to the Chinese who celebrated the advent of the New Year with messages of good will."

"The first-known published Christmas card made its appearance in London, England in 1843. It was designed by John Calcott Horsley, British painter and illustrator of the period."

"In 1846, one thousand copies were lithographed, hand-colored and sold by an art shop."

"It is surprising how similar this first card more than a century ago was to many today. Small panels to the left and right show the charitable acts of 'clothing the poor' and 'feeding the hungry' always connected with the Christmas season."

"The date of the first American Christmas card is not known, but an American authority on greeting cards, Ernest Dudley Chase of Boston, found what he believed to be the first."

"Authorities say there can be no question but that his discovery, a card which extends 'A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year' from 'Pease's Great Variety Store'—is a very early card. Mr. Chase believes it to be the earliest known American card."

Noting that he occasionally hears grumbles that Christmas cards are just a "troublesome new-fangled custom," the Postmaster added, "We can see that sending cards is a very old and honored tradition."

"Sending cards can be a pleasure after a little preparation—having a good mailing list and mailing promptly with ZIP CODE on every card."
