Munday Elects New Mayor and Aldermen

More than usual interest was shown in both the City and School Board elections in Munday last Saturday, as approximately 273 voters selected a new mayor and two new aldermen for the Munday City Council.

James Reid won his bid for mayor and will replace Mayor A. Dale Selzer, who did not seek another term. Reid received a total of 151 votes, defeating M. L. Wiggins by less than 30 votes. Wiggins received 122 votes.

The two new aldermen are former mayor Dale Selzer and Larry Smith, who defeated an incumbent challenger to win the two open spots on the City Council. Smith received a total of 163 votes, and Selzer garnered a total of 161.

Jessie Andrade, incumbent, received 150 votes but lost his bid for another term. J. M. Christensen, the other candidate, received 71 votes.

Hospital Board

According to unofficial returns reported Saturday night, Vernal Zeissel and Richie Smith were re-elected to new terms on the Knox County Hospital Board.

Zeissel received 484 votes; and Richie Smith, 381. Others on the ballot were: Mike Newton, with 247 votes; Billy Kingston, 238; and Cora Jean Collins, 161.

The 303 votes cast in Munday were as follows: Zeissel, 179; Smith, 164; Kingston, 145; Collins, 96; and Newton, 6.

Goree Names Councilmen And Trustees

Three persons were elected to the City Council and school board positions last Saturday in the elections held in Goree.

Three new members were named to the Goree City Council. Kent Trainham received a total of 59 votes; Chester Smith, 58; and W. D. Robinson, 48, to win places. Incumbent C. W. Shipman received 36 votes.

Four names were on the ballot for three positions on the Goree School Board.

Elected were incumbents Gerald Myers, James Peek and Billy Don Hutchens with 64, 58, and 58 votes respectively. Wayne Birkenfeld, who received 48 votes, lost his bid to the board.

Incumbents Re-Elected At Knox City

All three incumbents were returned to office in the Knox City election for members of the city council.

They were Charles Aurburg, with 212 votes; Celso Gonzales, 152; and L. V. Worley, 149. Also receiving votes were James Hewitt, 129; Gene Sutton, 124; and Dean Homstead, 96.

In the school board election for Knox City-O'Brien, Henry J. Jones and J. B. Rutherford were elected. Jones, an incumbent, received 263 votes; Rutherford, 233, and Jimmy Tankersley, 224.

At Benjamin

Oscar Gideon and J. P. Tolson Jr., incumbents, and Claude Stockton won three positions on the Benjamin City Council last Saturday.

Stockton received 59 votes; Tolson, 62; Gideon, 61; and one write-in vote was cast for Homer Ralston. In the water district election, incumbents Billy Benson, 60 votes, and Jack Idol, 69, were re-elected. Write-in candidates were Jimmy Collins, three, and J. P. Tolson, Jr., four.

Also re-elected to positions on the school board were incumbents Billy Benson, with 46 votes, and Stanton Brown, 69 votes. Write-ins were Jimmy Collins with 20 votes, and Brice Lindsey, one vote.

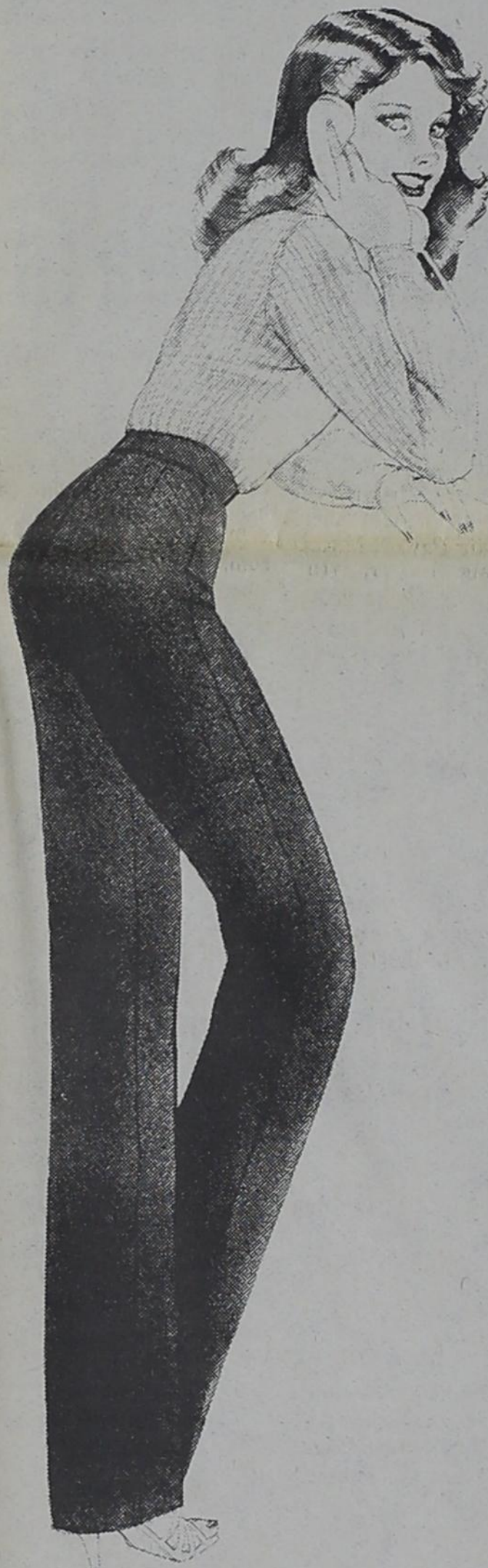

Public Hearing Set For Senior Citizens Programs

A Public Hearing to gather facts for planning Senior Citizens services will be held at 11:00 a.m. on April 29, 1980 at the Community Center building in Knox City.

The Hearing, conducted by West Central Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging, will be one of 19 held throughout the West Central Texas Council of Governments region. It will be open to all residents of Knox County, but will be directed primarily at persons age 60 or over.

Included in the Hearing will be discussion about operation of Senior Citizens services under the Older Americans Act, National, State and local priorities will be reviewed with opportunity for input from the audience.

The bulk of the Hearing will be spent getting information from those present about the needs of older persons. This information will be used by the Area Agency on Aging in preparing its Regional Aging Services Plan for the period beginning October 1, 1980. Results of this Public Hearing will directly influence the future of Senior Citizens Programs in Knox County as well as in the West Central Texas Council of Governments region.

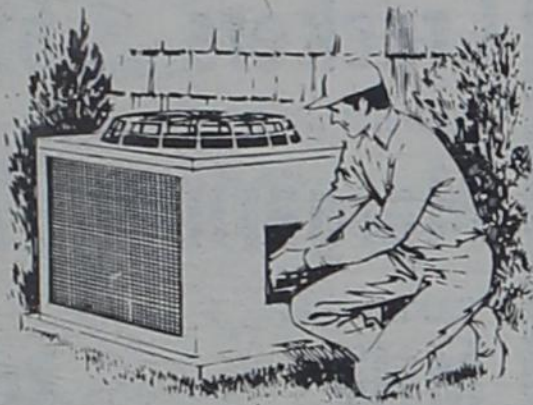
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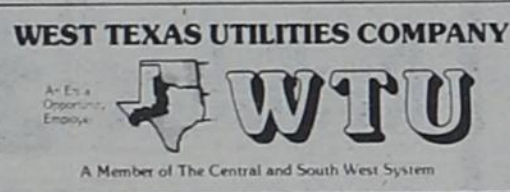

Ambulance Volunteers Have A Smooth Running Organization

As the Munday Ambulance volunteers lay the ground work for future fund raising projects for a new ambulance, and at the same time, fulfill their obligation as volunteers, one notices that the complete volunteer organization runs very smoothly.

The Munday Ambulance Service, in its beginning, did not experience nearly the problems that a number of towns in the state have. From the very first, what we might call problems were mere steps that "had to be ironed out", and this was done in a very efficient manner. One proven asset, which cut down on a number of "troubles", was the employment of Bobby Hutchinson. He has done, and is continuing to do, a fine job and works with the volunteers excellently.

From day one there has been interest enough among the volunteers that the paid ambulance man never really had to "hunt" anyone to help. It seems someone was always readily available.

In talking with several of the volunteers, we asked for comments both on the organization and why they became volunteers. One person stated, "I feel the ambulance service became more of a community project when the first ambulance was purchased through donations instead of federal and state funds. This helped my decision to be active as a volunteer." Another volunteer mentioned "teamwork and cooperation" as the key factors that exist to make this a smooth running organization. "To help the people in the community"

was stated by several as their reason for being a volunteer.

Jeanie Carden, Munday Housing Authority administrator, mentioned that her concern for the elderly people living in the apartments near her office prompted her to sign up as a volunteer. She is now an EMT and feels this may help these people feel more secure.

Several (agreeing it does take a great deal of time) said they were glad to do it and it helped to have their families behind them. Whatever their reason, we need them. We could not do with

only one paid ambulance employee unless we had our volunteers.

Obviously, they do not perform this function for personal glory or pay. The minimal amount of \$4.00 paid for each run would not likely attract anyone to the position of volunteer. The City decided to pay this amount, hoping it might help with expense of a torn garment, etc., that the volunteer might experience in their line of work.

When asked for a comment, Bobby Hutchinson summed up his feelings in this way: "The response I get from all of them is great."

Let me put it this way; I don't know what in the world I would do without them." *****

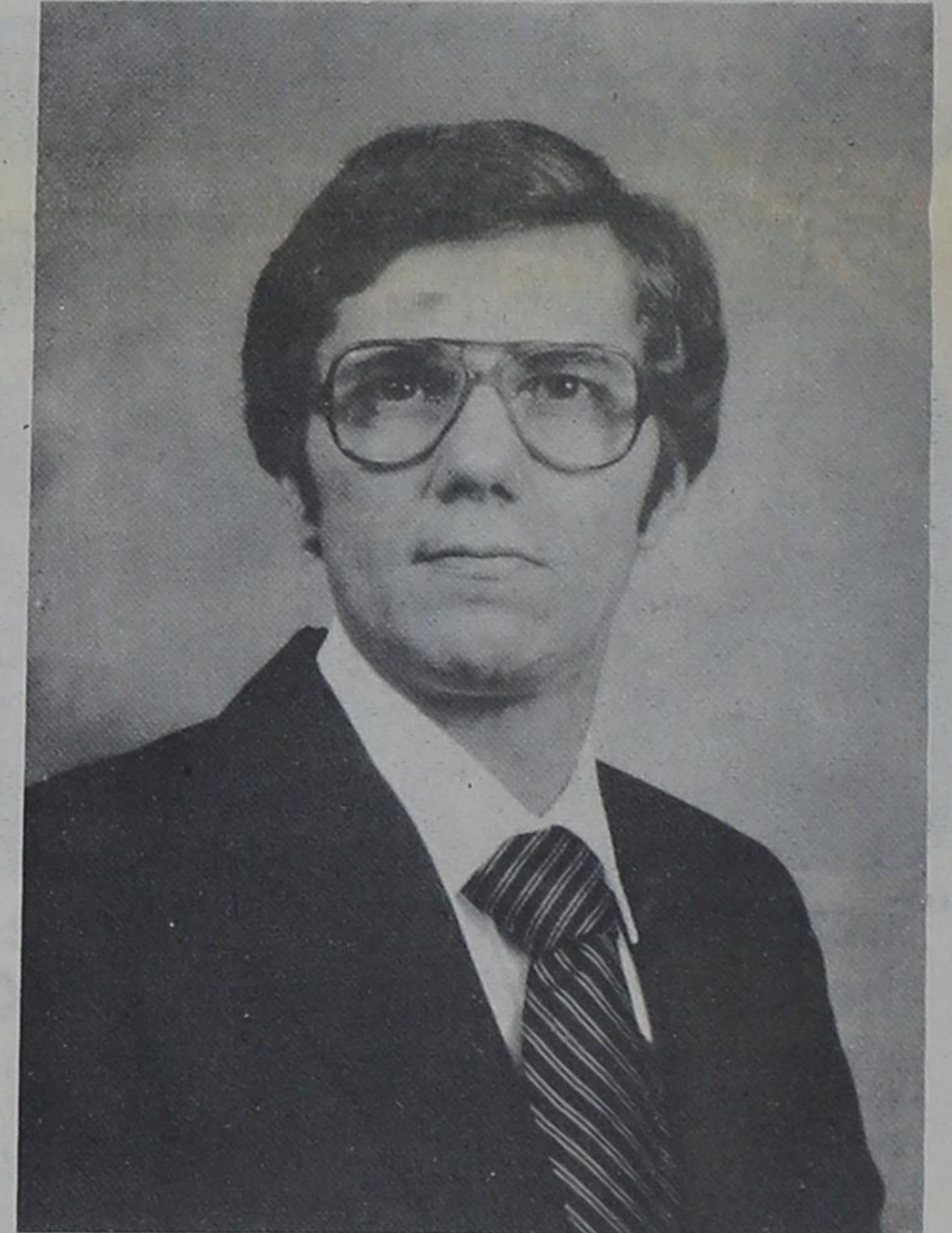

IN TOUCH

Where would you turn in your Bible to find the "Great Commission?" Were you aware that the words "Great Commission" are not found in the Bible? Why then do men call it "Great?" One way is to contrast it with the "Limited Commission" that Jesus gave in Matthew 10:5: "Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. And preach as you go, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" The Great Commission, as is written in Mark's account says, "Go ye into ALL the world, and preach the gospel to EVERY creature." Obviously, the contrast here is great, and yet this is not really what made/makes the Great Commission "great." Let's consider some other factors.

The author of the Commission makes it "great." Jesus was a blend of both man and God. Luke describes Him as "...great, and will be called son of the Most High; and the Lord God will give to Him the throne of His father, David." (Luke 1:32). Jesus hinted at the coming commission in his words in Luke 19:10: "The son of man has come to seek and save the lost." His plans were evident from the beginning of the scriptures till the end of time - Jesus had a plan to save us.

The cost of the Great Commission also makes it great. Everyone had a part in paying for salvation. God paid his part - "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son... (John 3:16). God loved us enough to give, and it cost Him. Jesus, likewise, paid a price for redemption of mankind. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9). Philippians 2:6-11 tells us that Jesus humbled himself to become a servant, that he was born in likeness of men, and that he became obedient to death, even death on the cross. Surely He did pay the debt we could not pay, and yet, mankind also must "pay his dues." This is not discounting the effect of God's grace, and yet dis-

How do you respond to the Great Commission? Read Hebrews 5:8,9 and 2 Thessalonians 1:7-9 and see the contrast of those who obey or reject the commands of Jesus. The choice to obey is yours. Have you obeyed Jesus' Great Commission?

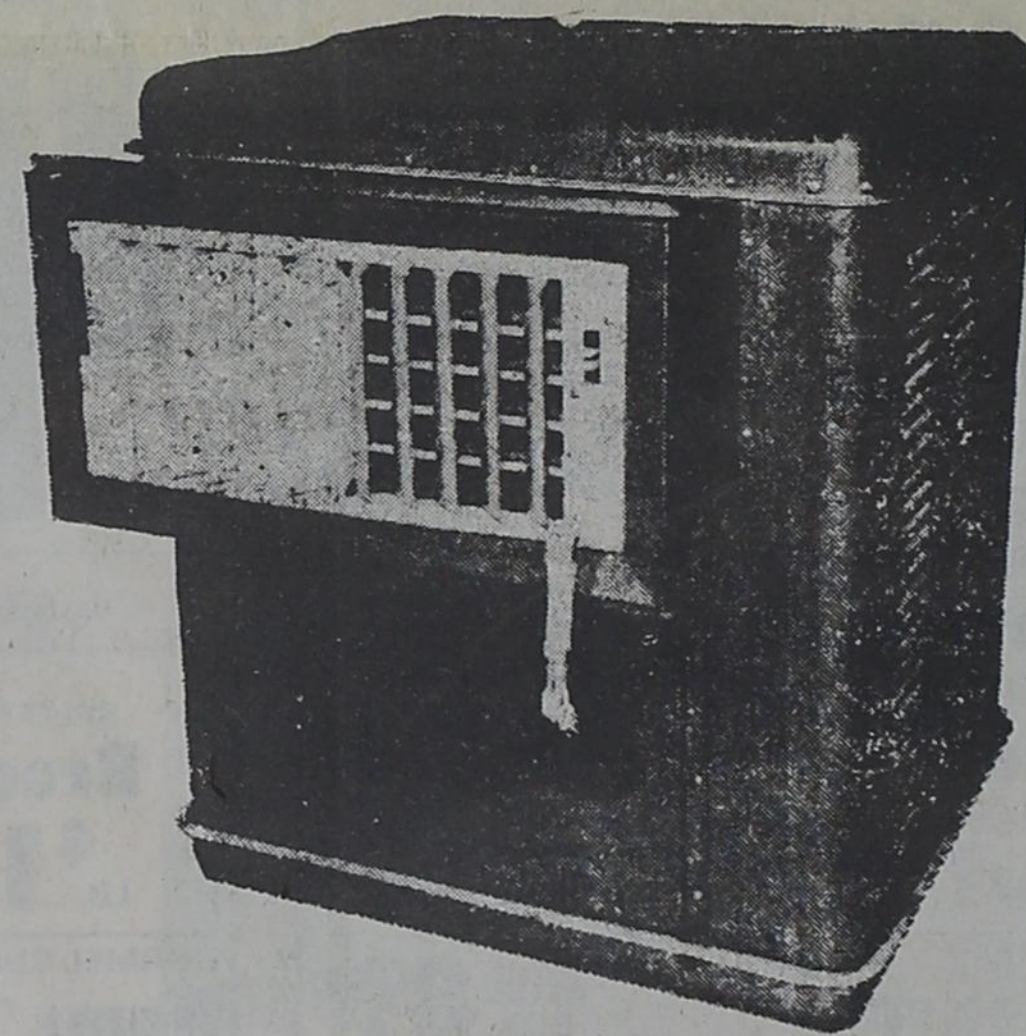

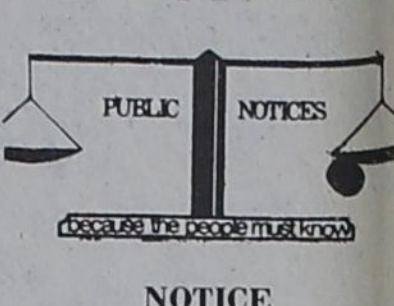

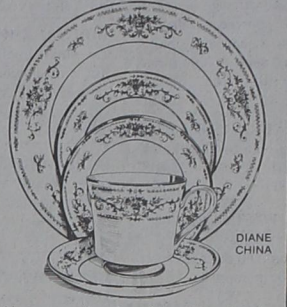
