This was in a time when we would be awakened by the alarm clock, and when our nightly activities could never be completed in time for us to secure the amount of sleep we needed.

Like the Russian masses, we couldn't wake up in time!

We complained about the school buses having to run so early that small children had to wait at the bus stops while it was not yet good daylight! And in weather that wasn't fit for a dog to be out in, too!

We complained long and loud!

We voiced our disapproval of our government being dominated by the labor unions--that the big-wigs of labor wanted to get up and go to work while it was not yet day, so they'd have an extra hour of daylight after work for socializing and entertainment.

In short, they were depriving us of daylight in the mornings and adding it to the end of the day--a time when the hard working individual might feel more like hitting the hay than hitting the entertainment trail when the work-day was over.

In essence, if not in fact, we received a message similar to that given the Soviet people: "Turn your clock ahead one hour, on time, Ole Boy."

City's Financial Condition Sound

The 1981-82 budget for the City of Munday was approved by the city council on April 7, showing the financial condition of the city to be good. Inflation is making operations more difficult with existing funds, however.

City services remain about the same as last year, with none being depleted.

Federal and state labor programs are vitilized, when possible, to help contain costs. Taxes have not been generally increased by the city since 1971. Sales tax increases received by the city have helped this happen, even though revenue sharing has been reduced by one-third.

Some improvements made in 1970-71 were completely overhauled, and painting of the water tower and repairing of the concrete storage tank; also other water lines, valves and fire plugs have been replaced.

At present, funds are gradually being set aside for future capitol replacement of two items: 1. A fire truck, and 2. City

hall and fire station for sometime in future years.

To be done this summer is approximately \$31,000 of street seal coating to help save and maintain the streets we have. (Funds set aside now to pay for this.)

Only one item will need to be increased this year, so far as the council can foresee at this time. The garbage department lost about \$7,000 last year, and is scheduled for an increase in the near future.

I want to express thanks to the people of Munday for myself and for all city employees for their understanding and co-operation during the past 12 months.

The mayor and city council should be commended for the job they do. Most meetings are with 100% in attendance. Many decisions rendered by these men are difficult. We in Munday are fortunate to have men of this caliber and dedication to handle our business.

Sales Tax Rebates For April Received

Total sales tax rebates for this calendar year to Texas cities reached \$180.8 million, about 14 percent more than cities took in during the first four months of last year, according to a report of State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock held a rebate of \$5.5 million from Houston, he reported, to clear up a debt owed to the state. It was reported that a state law allows Bullock to withhold checks from the state to persons indebted to the state.

According to the report of April 9, Munday received a rebate of \$1,717.18 for April, as compared to \$1,686.06 for the same period last year. Total 1981 payments are \$14,508.70.

Knox City received an April rebate of \$2,290.52, as compared to \$2,375.10 last year. Knox City's total for this year is \$19,173.89.

Total 1981 payments for smaller towns are:
Benjamin, \$428.66; Goree, \$904.08; Weinert, \$337.12.

Farm and Ranch Wheat Report

Weather patterns continued dry over much of the Hard Red Winter Wheat Belt this past week while temperatures reached above-normal levels. Projections are for continued warm temperatures and little precipitation for this normally rainy period. Wheat stands continued to make rapid progress although the commonly gusty southwest winds began to deplete soil moisture conditions, especially in the sandy soil areas of western Oklahoma and Kansas and the northern parts of the Texas Panhandle. The Oklahoma wheat crop received a fair-to-good rating even though moisture stress is beginning to show in many fields. Considering the past three months' weather conditions, the overall reaction to the condition of the wheat crop is surprisingly good, but with much needed moisture the main element required to insure a crop during the all important head-filling stage.

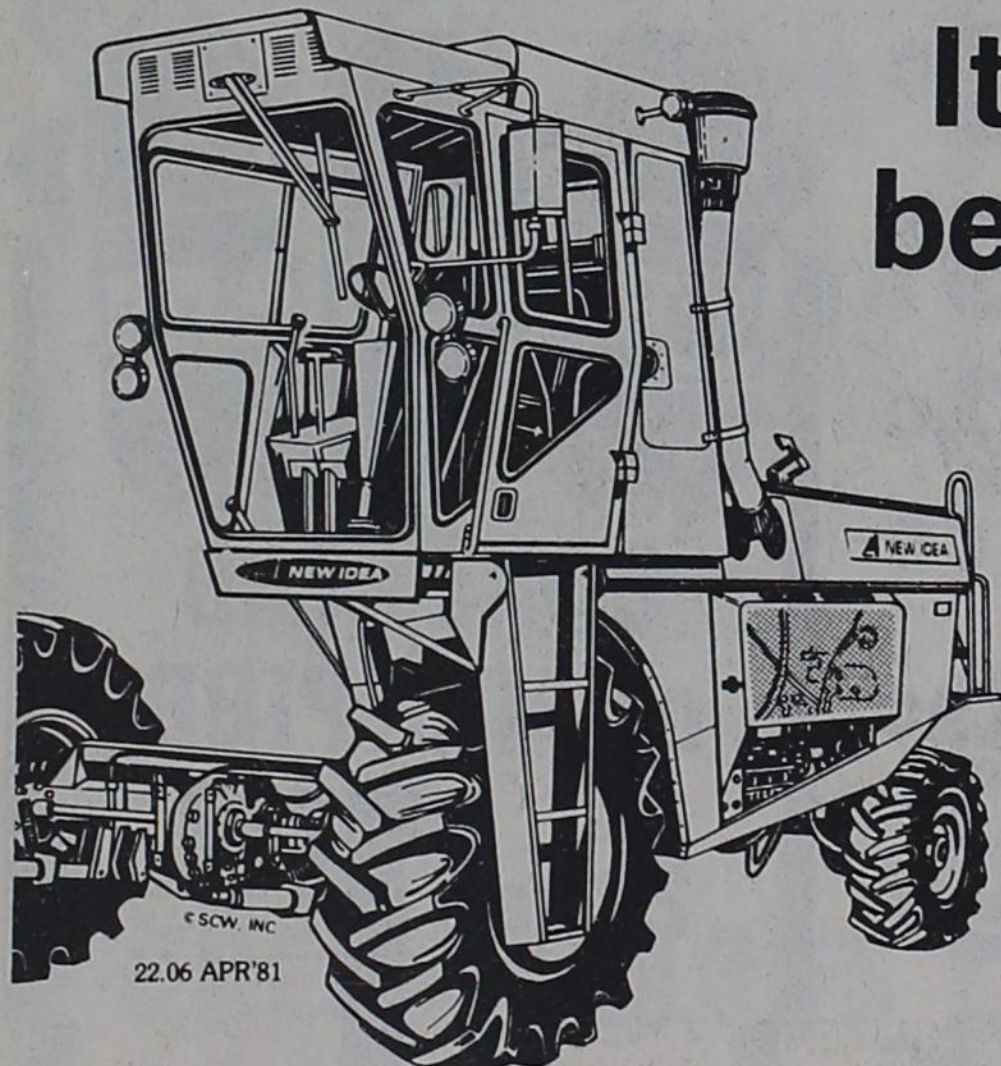
Thomas Edward Allen, 45, a resident of Goree, died at 9:40 p.m. Friday in a Wichita Falls hospital after a long period of illness.

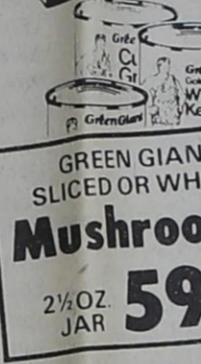

City Council Minutes

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met April 7, 1981 at the Munday City Hall in regular session at 7:30 p.m.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Donald Hobert, Ray Lynn Hardin, Larry Smith, A. Dale Selzer and M. M. Booe.

Members absent: None. Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. Minutes of the March 10th regular and March 30, 1981 meetings were read and approved with no alterations.

Election returns of the April 4, 1981 City Officers election were examined. Results found were as follows: J. M. Christensen 143, Ray Lynn Hardin 265, Donald Hobert 321, M. M. Booe 290 and Norman Anderson (1 write in). Smith moved Hardin, Hobert and Booe be declared elected for a two year term. Selzer seconded. Carried, all in favor. New members were duly sworn in.

Hardin reported to the Council on ambulance operation. Some rate in-

crease for ambulance service will be necessary in the near future, he said. After discussion Smith moved Bobby Hutchinson's salary be increased \$25.00 a month commencing April 1, contingent on a daily check of ambulance vehicles and fire trucks. (Monday through Friday.) Hobert seconded. All for.

After discussion, Hobert moved the City Administrator secure prices (bid type) from three firms on some needed waterworks supplies. (Meters, valves and fireplugs.) After securing same, Administrator is to report back to Mayor Reid and Alderman Hobert as to costs, etc. Decision is to be made by Reid, Hobert and Hertel as to items to be purchased. Booe seconded. All in favor.

Mayor Reid next informed the Council that Munday's H. U. D. Grant application for paving and drainage, etc., in the Fir Street area and other areas previously designated has again been turned down. No council action was required.

Centex Cable Company reported the following additions to Cable service on Fir Street and adjacent areas: Ida Jo Stinnett, Jessie Thomas, Jack Bradley, Louise Jones, Horace Spells, Lustine Hemphill, Jessie Tucker, Ivory Shields and Adda Lee Smith. A problem has developed to add others to the Cable since the Railroad Company wants a \$500.00 fee for crossing the R. O. W. Another letter is to be written requesting per-

mission without cost.

Munday's street lighting bill has been increased approximately 250% since rates have changed. Steps are to be taken to try to lower this cost by removing some lights, installing lighting using less energy, etc. The Mayor, Administrator, some councilmen and the local utility manager are to check at Haskell in a few days to examine steps they are taking to lower rates. A report is to be made to the council at the next meeting.

Next business was conducting the final hearing in regard to the budget. No one other than those mentioned above came. Total estimate receipts from all sources was \$396,900; total estimate disbursements was \$422,423. (Note approximately \$26,000 in Capitol funds set aside last year will be spent in the 1981-82 budget.) Full copy of budget is available at City Hall from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday for public examination. Hobert moved the 1981-82 budget as prepared by the City Administrator be adopted. Hardin seconded. All members voted in favor.

Next discussed was a questionnaire from the Texas Energy Resource Center from A&M Council action, at this time, consists of steps to lower street light energy consumption, and possible other steps maybe taken later.

The City Administrator is to check with one or two small cities in regard to T. M. L. insurance and report back to the council.

After discussion, Hardin moved that Salvador Sosa insurance allowance be adjusted in credits toward new hospital insurance to equal the allowance of other employees from 3-1-1974 until present date and no salary deduction be made until this amount is compensated for. Selzer seconded. All for.

Booe moved bills be paid as follows: from Airport fund \$36.68; from Ambulance fund \$510.54; from street paving special \$259.38; from Operating fund \$13,698.75. Selzer seconded. All in favor.

Mayor Reid reminded the Council that it was his job to designate each councilman a department. His appointments were as follows:

1. Mayor Pro-Tem - Water, Sewer-Garbage - Donald Hobert
2. Airport and Parks - A. Dale Selzer.
3. Streets - Ray Lynn Hardin.
4. Ambulance - M. M. Booe.
5. Police Commissioner - Larry Smith.

Hardin moved for adjournment. Hobert seconded. Carried.

An End And A Beginning
This week is special for persons who are Christian. It is special because we remember the last week in the life of our Lord Jesus Christ as he lived as a man on the earth. The week began as he entered the city of Jerusalem mounted on a donkey. The people cried, "Hosanna!" and welcomed him as a king. It seems the people wanted him to set up a kingdom on the earth and continue the miracles he had done among them.
Jesus, however, had no plans for doing such a thing. He had rejected the idea earlier in his ministry. But the people continued to cry, "Hosanna!" They wanted him to help them through the oppression they knew.
When Jesus entered Jerusalem, He went to the Temple of God where He saw the graft and exploitation of people by those who had set up their booths in the Temple Court. He began to drive them out saying to them, "It is written, 'My house is to be a house of prayer,' but you have made it a den of robbers." (Matthew 21:13) This made the chief priests more hostile to Jesus and they became more serious about finding a way to deal with this young upstart of a teacher. But Jesus went about his business of teaching in the Temple and helping persons to know God's way more fully.
Plans were made and preparations completed for Jesus to eat the passover meal with his disciples. At that meal Jesus took some bread and broke it and gave it to the disciples and said, "Take, eat, this is my body." He passed a cup to them and said, "Drink of it, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." (Matthew 26:26-29)
From the passover meal Jesus went with the disciples to the Garden of Gethsemane for prayer. He experienced a tremendous struggle in the garden, but remained faithful and obedient to God's will. Before long a great crowd came with clubs and swords and arrested him. He was taken to the High Priest and placed on trial. It was an ordeal of conviction and a sentence of death - all without the required testimony of two witnesses who agree which support the charges.
Since the Jews could not really give a death penalty, it was necessary to take Jesus to the Roman governor, Pilate. Pilate sought to release him, but bowed to the pressure of the crowd. He then tried to cleanse the stain from his soul by washing his hands. Jesus was taken from the judgment hall of Pilate to Golgotha and crucified. Even as life was ebbing away, he spoke words of forgiveness, comfort, and encouragement to those around him - even his enemies. Then some friends took his body and placed it in a tomb.
The arrest, trial, and crucifixion had a great effect on the disciples. Their leader was dead, their hopes dashed and their spirits broken. They no doubt thought, "Another brave attempt at reform has been crushed," and they didn't know what to do.
As the first day of the week dawned, some women went to the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus, but found the tomb empty. They were told Jesus was alive, but they didn't much believe it. Jesus appeared to some of them and the light of God began to radiate in their lives. They knew the presence of the risen Lord.
As we observe this Holy Week, let us repent of our sin, develop spiritual disciplines in life and the light of the risen Christ will radiate in and through us. The Lord is risen! Hallelujah!

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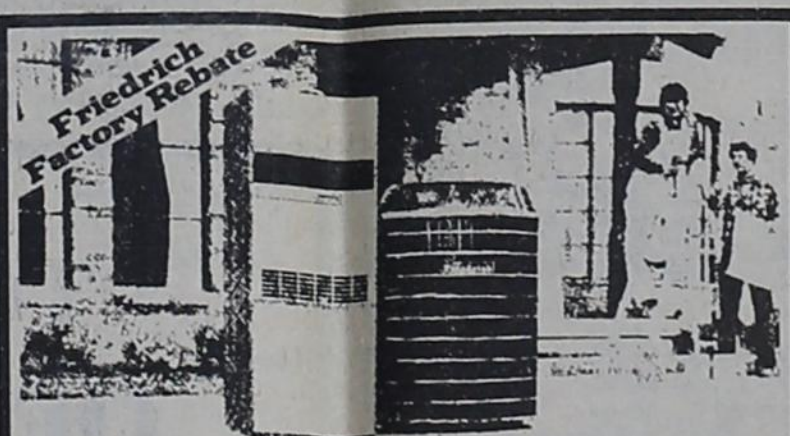
