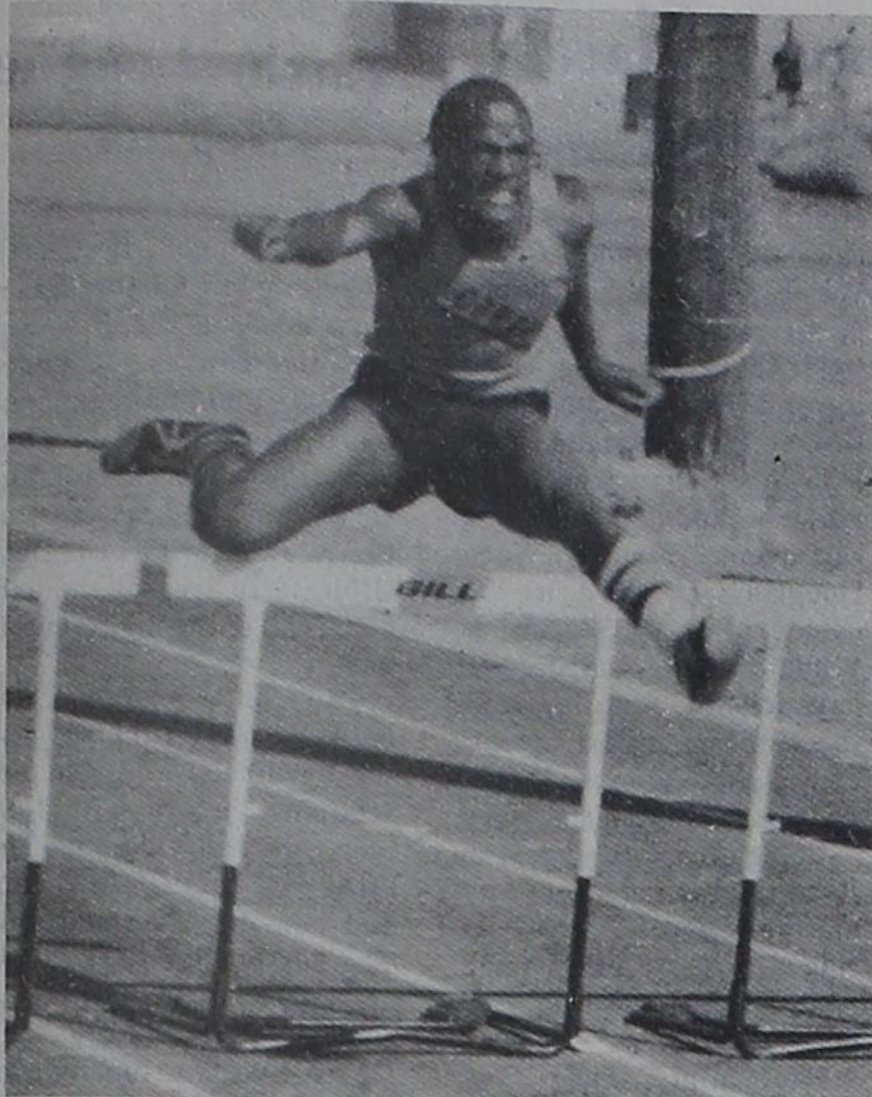

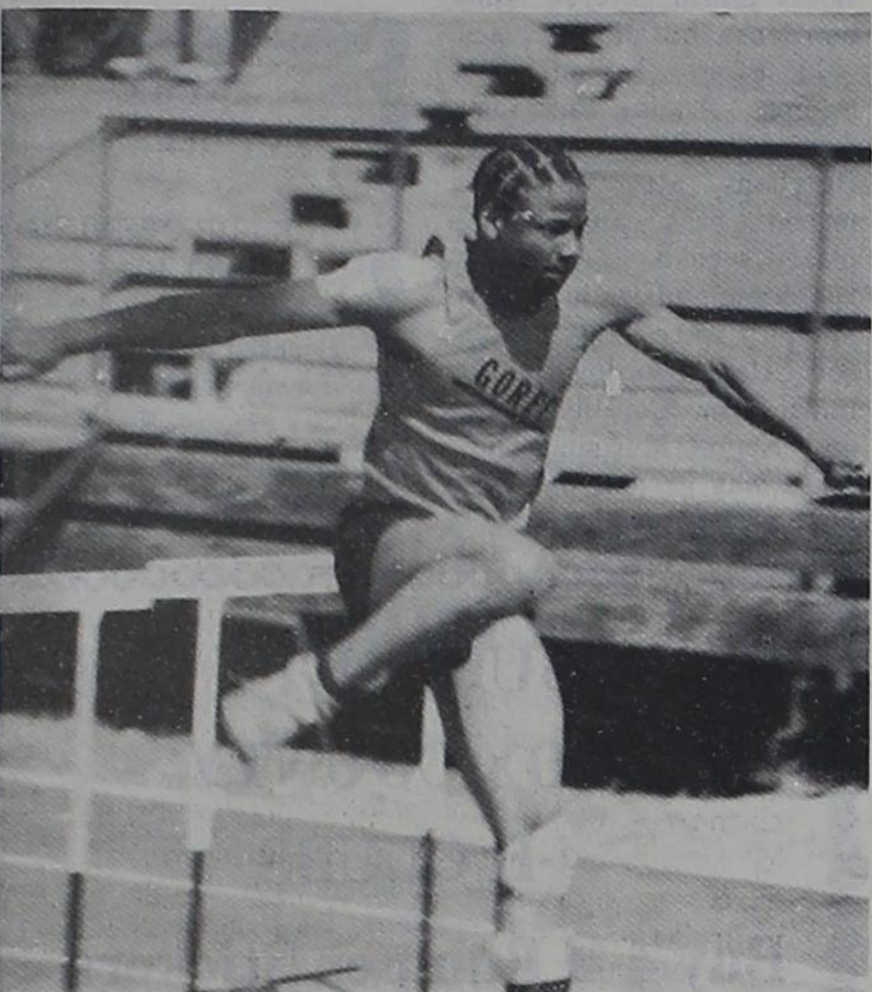
Billy won first place in the intermediate hurdles at Graford's Jackrabbit Relays and Olney's Cub Relays. He also took second place at

## Why Not More Federal Grant Funds For Munday?

This question is sometimes asked at City Hall. The answer to this usually lies in the fact that some programs, usually geared for Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's), larger cities, just are not offered or will not work in Munday.

Many programs which require at least a 50-50 match with local funds, are very restrictive as to compliance requirements such as those offered for ambulances, or have other undesirable features.

Two or three times a month some item telling of federal fund availability comes through the mail. If at all prospective, City Hall personnel will contact West Central Council of Governments, H.U.D., or other appropriate agencies and usually find the proposed grant unworkable here.

Munday has fared well or above average in grant receipts in the last eleven years with its \$1,000,000 drainage ditch, Miller Creek Lake Grant Funds, a \$100,000 storm sewer grant (also a \$102,000 5% loan for paving), as well as Federal and State Funds for the Airport in the amount of approximately \$178,400.

Many programs offering

grants or matching funds just are not worthwhile. For example, a state sign program some five or six years ago required reports, immediate replacements, etc., which when figured over an app. five year period would have cost as much as the 50% match they offered. The City installed and paid for the signs that were being required. The same held true for the rigid requirements in regard to Federal Funding of ambulances, according to reports from the Ambulance Service.

City plans are to re-apply to H.U.D. for a paving grant for the east part of Munday at the appropriate time, unless council policy changes in this regard. This project is badly needed to upgrade streets and drainage in that area.

The City of Balmorhea, Texas (population 655) reports huge public works construction costs savings by avoiding federal grant assistance. If the city had sought financial assistance from the Environmental Protection Agency for a recently completed sewage treatment facility the cost

## Farm And Ranch News

By JIM MAZURKIEWICZ

A uniform planting date, scouting of hot spot fields and early season boll weevil control where needed are important parts of the boll weevil management program.

For the past three years, boll weevil damage in cotton has been light. A uniform planting date of May 15, 1980 will help insure that boll weevil damage will be light in Knox County during the 1980 growing season.

The uniform planting date is the critical first step in the cotton pest management program for counties in the

Rolling Plains of Texas.

The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs during the last week of May or the first week in June. Overwintered boll weevils live from 10 to 22 days after they emerge. When cotton is planted after May 20, it will be the second week in July before 1/3 grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will survive in squares until the squares are 1/3 grown. Research has shown that only a small percentage of the over-

wintered boll weevils survive until the second week in July.

The uniform planting date

also limits the boll weevil populations to hot spot fields. These are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat.

When boll weevils are detected, one insecticidal application just prior to the 1/3 grown square stage will usually control the overwintered weevils.
