One day he came into the Times Office whistling some sacred tune, but by this time we've forgotten its name. "Why, do you come in here whistling that old Methodist song?" we asked. He straightened up to his full height and replied, "Why, the Baptists were singing that song long before the Methodists ever thought of it!"

A few days later, he contacted us and asked if he'd in any way hurt our feelings with the sort of indignant way he answered us.

That's the type of person he seemed to us—always cheerful, always pleasant, always fearful of unknowingly hurting someone's feelings.

Although he'd been away from Munday for 15 years, he always received the Munday Times each week. A very loyal friend, Mrs. J. B. Bowden, always saw to that. We saw him only a few times since he left, and he always reminded us of how he enjoyed the paper.

Many hearts shared the family's sorrow in the passing of this minister. And many in Munday, perhaps, recalled far more and fonder memories than we did. His memory will continue to live on in this community.

## Weather Slows Cotton Classing

Sample receipts at the Munday cotton classing office were light during the week ending September 20, according to A. D. Peoples, in charge of the U.S.D.A. laboratory here.

Damp weather followed by a heavy cloud cover held harvesting and ginning to a minimum until late in the week. With dry clear weather harvesting should increase greatly the next few days.

Grades for the week were lower than the week before with only 8 percent white grades, 29 percent strict middling light spots, 53 percent middling light spots, and 9 percent strict low middling light spots and lower.

Staple lengths ran 9 percent 29/32, 44 percent 15/16, 31 percent 31/32, and 16 percent 1 inch and longer.

Micronaire readings for the week were 6 percent 3.0-3.4, 19 percent 3.5-3.9 and 76 percent 4.0 and higher.

Market activity increased a little with light spotted grades that "mike" 3.5 or higher selling at 25 to 50 points over loan rates.

Knox City again came back strong, driving to the Munday 34 on two first downs, then lost possession on another fumble.

After an exchange of punts, the Greyhounds again moved all the way to the Mogul 12, where the Moguls held and took possession on downs.

The thriller for local fans came on the first play after the recovery. Alcala hit the clear after going over right tackle and outran everyone to rack up 88 yards and the third TD. Lane's try for extra point failed. The Moguls had gained the Greyhound 12 again when the game ended.

Alcala led the field in gains, with 151 yards in 19 carries. Flores went 96 yards in 23 tries. Williams led for the Greyhounds with 64 yards on 12 carries and Johnny Montandon had 23 yards in 7 tries.

## Rev. Albertson, Former Pastor Dies On Sunday

Rev. W. H. Albertson, 80, who retired in 1948 after 20 years as pastor of the First Baptist Church of Munday, passed away at noon Sunday in Brownwood after a long illness. He had served as a Baptist pastor for 36 years before he retired.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday from the Coggin Avenue Baptist Church in Brownwood, where he was the first minister to be ordained. Officiating were Dr. H. H. Hargrove and Rev. George M. Slayton, pastor. Burial was in Greenleaf Cemetery in Brownwood.

Rev. Albertson was born on December 19, 1882 in Grimes County and was ordained to preach in 1912 in Brownwood. His first pastorate was at Chadwick, in Lampasas County.

He was graduated from Howard Payne College in 1916 and from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth in 1919.

He was pastor of churches in Wichita Falls, Haskell, Merkel, Munday, Granbury and Garland, in Texas, and in Harrison, Ark. He was preceded in death by his first wife, the former Emily Thomas of Liberty Hill, and their two-year-old daughter. He married Helen Winston of Fort Worth in 1917 when she was teaching at Howard Payne College.

After his retirement in 1948, Mrs. Albertson returned to the Howard Payne faculty and retired in 1957 as assistant professor emeritus of social science.

Surviving him are his wife; two sons, W. J. of San Antonio and H. T. Albertson of Pearl River, N. Y.; three daughters, Mrs. Bob Harvey of Brownwood, Mrs. Marvin Peek of Eden and Mrs. Kenneth Vaughn of El Dorado; two sisters, Mrs. Alma Chance of Georgetown and Mrs. Jennie Hamilton, a long time Baptist missionary to Brazil, now living in Waco, and 17 grandchildren.

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### THE FORCES OF FREEDOM

Writing in Nation's Business, Secretary of State Rusk says that several highly important global forces are now acting in our favor and to the long-run advantage of the free world. These are:

The trend toward unity in Western Europe; the rejection of communism by new nations; increasing conflict between the Soviet Union and communist China; the readiness of more countries to negotiate settlement of problems, ranging from world trade to peace.

Mr. Rusk does not exaggerate the significance of any of these hopeful developments—he is too canny and well-informed a hand to take a Pollyanna position. But, as he sees it, "today the strength of the free world is far greater than it was a decade ago, and the keys to a new surge of progress are in our hands. The forces at work to build a free and peaceful world community are showing even more vitality, while the forces opposed to this purpose have lost in relative strength and unity."

If this assessment is correct, we are offered a tremendous opportunity and the task ahead is to make the most of it. We must demonstrate the free world has far more to offer humanity than the slave world—and we must do that with unflinching courage and dedication.

### MEDICARE TODAY

One may be justified in asking "What has happened to Medicare?"—the bill for providing medical benefits of various kinds to everyone drawing social security payments.

When this measure was introduced, it will be remembered, all of the administration guns were brought up in its support. No other domestic measure was pushed so hard, and administration leaders apparently scented success. The result, to use the vernacular, was "no dice." Congress, in the face of all the pressure, just said No, and No again.

Medicare is back—old bills like soldiers, even after repeated failure, never seem to die. But the big guns are silent. Token support comes from its sponsors, but little more.

Why? The answer is that congressional colness is the direct result of several diverse but important factors.

1. The past-65 population group is nowhere near as bad off financially as the Medicare crew

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have asserted. By and large, taking all elements into consideration, they seem to be better off, on the average, than younger groups.

2. Medicare would give the benefits, on a blanket basis, to great numbers of social security beneficiaries who neither want nor need it. At the same time, it would have excluded millions of elderly people not within the social security framework.

3. The cost, according to independent experts, would reach unworkable heights, many billions a year.

4. The existing Kerr-Mills Bill—for providing federal medical financial aid to the elderly in need, under a system of state administration—is working well and is being extended.

5. The voluntary medical insurance plans, offered by Blue Cross and Blue Shield and commercial insurance companies, are doing a superb job of providing protection to all who want it, at moderate cost.

6. There is a very distinct feeling in this country that we've already gone too far in Welfare Statism, and that Medicare would take us a long step farther along the road of government domination of everything and everybody.

And that seems to be the status of Medicare today.

### THE PEOPLE OPPOSE FEATHERBEDDING

The American people—labor union members and their families included—take a dim view of featherbedding. That is the finding of a late Gallup Poll.

Featherbedding is the practice under which more men must be employed than are needed to do the work. It is rampant in numbers of industries, where it inflates costs which must be ultimately borne by consumers of the products and services concerned.

Here are the figures Dr. Gallup presents: 52 per cent of those queried said there should be a law against featherbedding, as against 25 per cent saying no and 23 per cent having no opinion. And 48 per cent of the union group also favored an antif Featherbedding law, as against 32 per cent saying no and 20 per cent having no opinion.

The featherbedding practice, Dr. Gallup states, " . . . has never appealed to the American people." Most people, apparently, believe in an honest day's work for an honest day's pay.



# LONE STAR AGRICULTURE

The red warning light burns a little brighter on screwworm infestation threats from September through November, officials warn.

Although the eradication program has been remarkably effective this year, the fall months are critical. Favorable weather conditions and shearing and other ranch operations usually result in a marked increase in screwworm infestations in both live-

stock and wildlife. More than 2,400 cases were reported during one week in November alone last year.

Eradication teams are active in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. The pest has been known to cost the livestock industry of the Southwest as much as \$100 million per year.

Research officials stress that livestock producers should watch closely for animal wounds infested with larvae. They should save samples of the larvae and report the discovery immediately to their county agent or veterinarian.

Anxious to protect gains made so far in this cooperative Southwest program, officials urge producers to use preventive sprays and to treat all animal wounds to eliminate opportunities for the pest to multiply.

The 19-month-old program has already reduced the annual incidence of infestation a whopping 39 per cent. As fall operations approach, screwworm cases are now at an all-time low for the season. Only one case was reported during August in the 65,000-square-mile area of southern Texas where the screwworm can

survive the winter. This area, which provides the source of screwworms that usually infest other regions following winter, must be kept free if eradication is to be achieved.

Capacity for producing sterile screwworm flies is at an all-time high. More than 140 million sterile flies per week can be released to mate with native flies and prevent reproduction.

The barrier formed by continuous release of sterile flies along the U.S.-Mexico border is in operation and being widened to prevent reinfestation.

### Tax-Man Sam Sez:

It's been some time since we talked about self-employment taxes. Self-employment tax is real popular with the fellow who is about a hop, skip and a jump away from a social security retirement check.

There are quite a few other people who either don't know that they are liable for self-employment tax, or conveniently forget about paying it. The self-employment tax—like other taxes throughout history—is not optional for those who would like to pay the tax. If you make more than \$400 a year of self-employed income and haven't already paid social security taxes up to the maximum of \$4800 income you just don't have any option—you owe self-employment tax.



## Knox Prairie Philosopher Claims The Farm Problem Is About Like Cuba; Nobody Knows What To Do About It

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek is back on the farm problem again this week, his letter indicates.



J. A.

Dear editor:

I haven't been invited to attend one, but I understand the Secretary of Agriculture is holding a series of meetings around the nation to sound out us farmers on our ideas of what kind of farm program we ought to have.

Secretary Freeman says he wants to "listen to what farmers are saying and thinking and to find out what sort of farm legislation they want." He's scheduled 13 meetings in all sections of the country, and will talk with thousands of farmers.

I'm not sure this is going to be a very fruitful trip. What I mean is, the fewer farmers you talk to, the less confusion you have over what they want.

If us farmers knew what kind of farm program we want, we'd have said so long ago.

I'm like the farm program like I am about Cuba. I think something ought to be done about it, but don't ask me what. Me and a lot of Congressmen stand shoulder to shoulder on this proposition.

The farm program is like high government spending. Everybody is in favor of cutting costs while he's running, but when he gets elected and gets the facts he changes his mind fast. There hasn't been a President in the last 20 years, Democratic or Republican, who hasn't asked Congress to raise the debt ceiling.

If Secretary Freeman stops by this Johnson grass farm, I can tell him straight out the kind of farm program I want is one that guarantees me high prices, low costs, and 100 per cent freedom. If he asks me how we can write a bill that'll do this, I'll have to leave at once to plow, whether my tractor will start or not.

As I've said before, the last thing us farmers want is a farm

program written by farmers. It won't work, and if you're going to have a farm program that won't work, it's a lot more comfortable to have one thought up by somebody else.

The Secretary of Agriculture's job is to think up a farm program. The farmer's job is to tear it apart.





The number of screwworms confirmed last week jumped to 49. The big increase was in the Trans-Pecos area which is being hot spotted at the present time. With the rains we received in Knox County in the past couple of weeks, we have a potential outbreak here. Please, for your sake and your neighbors, collect samples of all cases that might be screwworms. Let's stop these outbreaks before they go beyond one or two cases. The distribution center at Sweetwater has been closed due to lack of activity in this area. Let's keep it closed. Collect at least 10 worms and place in any kind of bottle before you treat the animal. Send the sample to me or to the Screwworm Eradication Lab. at Mission, Texas. Send information, also, on where your farm is located, animal collected from and location of wound on animal.
