

Section 1. That Section 49-b. Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so the same will here-

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a govern-mental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Vet-erans' Land Board. Said Board shall tutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. 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

The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take of






