Supt. Olaf South of Sweetwater, superintendents of Baird

schools from 1939-46, was guest speaker for the occasion. South mixed reminiscences with comments on modern education in his address.

He commended the community on its new school building, occupied in March. He spoke in the new auditorium.

Between 400 and 500 persons inspected the new building.

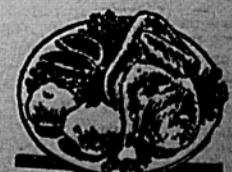

## New Tests Set In County

A proposed 2,350-foot rotary test well was staked four miles northwest of Putnam. It is Patrick A. Doheny of Dallas No. 5 Norman L. Finley. The test is two-thirds mile west of the Finley (Moran) Field, but separated by a dry hole.

Drill site is 990 feet from the north and east lines of the southeast quarter in Section 11, D&DAL Survey.

Doheny No. 4 Norman L. Finley was spotted as a 2,350 foot rotary try in the Finley (Moran) Field.

It is located 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of the northwest quarter in Section 10, D&DAL Survey.

Fourth well has been completed in the Marge (Jennings Sand) Field 10 miles southwest of Putnam. It is Callihan Interests, Inc., et al. of Abilene No. 3-A C. M. Caldwell, Section 14, Block, SP Survey.

Daily potential was 40.49 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water. It is pumping from 40 perforations at 2,817-27 feet where the formation was ruptured. Casing is set on bottom at 2,880 feet.

Callihan Interests, et al. No. 13 J. P. McCord, T. H. Brown Survey 218, was completed. Location is nine miles northwest of Cross Plains in the A. O. Scott (Cross Plains) Field.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of 45.25 barrels of 42 gravity oil and 20 per cent water. Production is from 16 perforations at 1,842-46 feet and 32 perforations at 1-822-30 feet. The formation was ruptured and treated with 200 gallons of mud acid. Casing is set at 1,898 feet, two feet off bottom.
