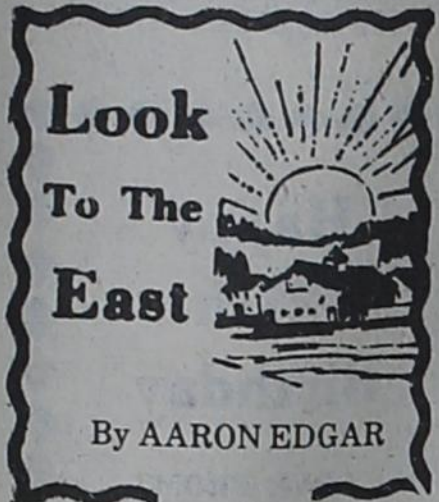

## Wheat Harvest Is Drawing to Close

With combines pulling out daily since last Thursday to follow the "harvest trail" northward, indications last Monday were that the wheat harvest was fast coming to a close in the Munday area.

With three harvest crews leaving Monday, one elevator operator said he had only three continuing in the area. It's just a matter of days until it's all over.

Maynard Moore of Farmers Grain Co-op, said the yield was better than expected. He gave the better yields as due to no extremely hot weather lingering on for days, coupled with cool nights. His elevator processed about 60 percent of last year's yield.

Wheat on the tight land was surprising, with reports of yields of from 18 to 25 bushels per acre. Some of the hail damaged crops yielded from 20 to 25 bushels.

Joe Decker of Knox Prairie Seeds gave a report that wasn't so good, with yields running from 8 to 24 bushels per acre. "Most of our customers were in the hail damaged area, with much of the acreage taking a severe beating. Harvest will be completed within the next two or three days."

## Steps For Obtaining Industry In Munday Outlined at Meeting

Steps for securing industry for the Munday area were outlined at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce industrial committee last Thursday night in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Members entered into a discussion of plans and a review of the many benefits of having industry locally. Three very important committees were named to enter in the industrial planning state. They are:

Brochure: M. L. Waggoner, chairman; Callie Ann Combs, M. C. Hurst, Dr. Bill Kingston, Douglas Myers, Robert Nix, and James Smith.

Industrial Sites: Charles Baker, chairman; Walter Hertel, Leon Ivey, Frank Jackson, Clint Norman, Mayor Jim Reid, and John Lee Wilde.

Industrial Development Corp.: M. L. Wiggins, Bobby D. Burnett and Gary Schur. As president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Schur will be ex-officio member of all committees.

The brochure committee is charged with preparing a complete brochure of Munday giving community data and information on utility rates, population, schools, transportation, financing, recreation, taxes, water quality, general wage scale, competing industries, union activity, housing, hotels, churches, medical facilities, postal services, civic clubs, airport information, insurance rates, construction costs, local economy, natural resources, including agricultural opportunities, and other pertinent facts.

The sites committee will investigate available sites for industry, sales price, topography, cost of extending utilities, accessibility to highways, zoning restrictions, easements, ownership, maps, and available existing buildings.

Obligations of the Industrial Development Corporation is to incorporate a non-profit organization and set up by-laws. It will also look into the prospects of buying/and or building land and facilities by issuing tax exempt bonds and secure the bonds by pledging both the property and lease of property to the industrial prospect.

It was pointed out that industry would benefit the community by providing more jobs for its people, inciting a general increase in wage scales. Merchants would benefit by higher wages providing more new business and increased sales. Taxing units would receive industrial property tax, increased residential property for taxing purposes, and increased sales bringing in more sales taxes. Area farmers would benefit by virtue of the additional taxpayers which would lower the tax rates on farm property.

Reasons for the influx of northern industry to the state of Texas were outlined: Fewer industrial taxes, in that we have no state income taxes, and unemployment and state welfare related taxes are lower; more favorable climate than the industrial north, less severe winters mean lower heating costs and comparatively an abundance of fuel, fewer unions to hamper right to work laws.

"Industry is already coming to Texas", it was

agreed, "and we can help justify Munday as an industrial site by preparing the information and 'paper

work' necessary for making the Munday area an inviting place for locating an industry."

## Ben Hoaldrige Named Director Of Mogul Band

The Munday Independent School Board has employed Ben L. Hoaldrige, presently of Breckenridge, as Munday Mogul band director.

Mr. Hoaldrige has been associated with the Breckenridge school district since 1977. He has served as band director for the junior high band and assistant high school director. He has

directed both the junior high and high school choir. He worked with beginning band students and stage band. A 1968 graduate of Burleson High School, Hoaldrige attended both Cisco Junior College and Midwestern University. He received a B.M.E. degree from Midwestern in 1977.

During his college years, he participated in marching band, concert band, jazz ensemble, solo and ensemble work, chous, and acappella choir.

Mr. Hoaldrige will be moving to Munday in the near future.

## Area Towns Get Sales Tax Rebates

Area towns have received their June city sales tax rebates. The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's sales tax and is rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected, by the Comptroller's office.

Munday received \$5,930.91 for June. For the same period in 1979, \$5,784.13 was received. Thus far in 1980, Munday has received \$20,193.58.

Knox City's June rebate was in the amount of \$5,784.13. In 1979, Knox City received \$7,070.20 for the same period. In 1980, \$27,315.66 has been rebated to Knox City.

Benjamin received \$484.97 this month. For the same period of time in 1979, \$443.99 was received. To date, Benjamin has received \$900.88 in 1980.

Goree received a \$892.08 June rebate. Last year for this period, they received \$1148.36. In 1980, Goree has received \$2760.68.

Weinert received \$382.34 rebate for June. For the same period in 1979, Weinert's rebate was \$329.73. Thus far in 1980, Weinert has received \$788.30.

Motion was made by Bobby Roberson, and seconded by Billy Johnston to transfer \$1,800 from Revenue Fund account to Knox County Aging Services, Nutrition Services Account Title III C Pilot Project, and to give the County Judge the authority to sign contracts for Aging Services, and Interlocal Cooperating Agreement with Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District to facilitate

the operation of the Knox County Aging Service Program. All voted in favor. Bids were opened for the sale of a 1979 Chevrolet Impala sheriff's car. One bid was received, this being from Don Hertel for \$1,002, which was accepted, upon a motion by Billy Johnston and seconded by Bobby Roberson, with all voting in favor of said motion.

Motion was made by Lee Patterson and seconded by Philip Homer to enter into the minutes, to become a permanent record the following letter, to Judge Melton, from Ronald D. Champion, executive director of Southwest Texas State University Texas Justice of the Peace Training Center: Dear Judge Melton: During the week of May 27-30, 1980, Judge D. E. Whitworth successfully completed a twenty hour course in the responsibilities of the office of Justice of the Peace. Article 5972 of the Texas

Revised Civil Statutes requires each newly elected/appointed Justice of the Peace to complete a twenty hour course each year thereafter. This article encompasses all justices who took office since August 30, 1963 and are not licensed attorneys. The funding of this program, which provides free room and board for the judges at the seminar, is made possible through a grant from the Governor's office, Criminal Justice Division. /s/ Ronald D. 


