

Area towns have received their June city sales tax rebates. The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's sales tax and is rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected, by

the Comptroller's office. Munday received \$5,930.91 for June. For the same period in 1979, \$6,141.47 was received. Thus far in 1980, Munday has received \$20,193.58.


Is Now In Planning Stage

Lankford will fill the position of head boys basketball coach, and assist in all phases of coaching at Munday High School. In football he will coach offensive and defensive backs. High School social






