sult of carelessnes sand neglect. Following is a list of things to help prevent fires:

1.—Don't smoke in the or in bed. Never discard but. ing matches. 2.—Keep furnaces, stoves

3.—Store gasoline and kerosene in approved containers at least 40 feet away from main

ground. 4.—Hire a competent electrician to do electrical work. Make sure that you have enuogh circuits properly fused and of ample capacity to carry the load of modern electrical equipment.

Replace frayed cords. 5.—Use fire-resistant roofing such as asphalt shingles, asbestos or metal, on all buildings.

6.—Cure hay properly. Moisture frequently leads to spontaneous ignition even several weeks after hay has been stored. If heating is suspected, test hay temperature periodically. If temperature rises to approximately 170 degrees, seek the advice of your fire department.

7.—Get rid of trash. Old newspapers, magazines, and other debris can serve as tinder for any chance spark. 8.—Keep oily rags in covered,

metal containers. 9.—Provide boll pullers with safety matches and stress the importance of being careful with sparks around the cotton

In addition to that the New Testament has been published in 252 tongues. There are 602 additional languages in which a Gospel or another whole book has been published.

In 1885, one hundred and one scholars gave to the world the Revised Version. These men were from England and America. It contained many idioms native to England. It was newly edited by the American Revision Committee in 1901. This is know as the American Standard Version. No doubt, this is the most accurate version to date. The scholars had the advantage of the three oldest manuscripts that former scholars did not have. It gives the Bible to us in every-day

Many other private translations have been made. Such as Moffets and Goodspeed and others. These are good for study and comparison but are not accepted as standard or authoritative.

The last version we mention is the Revised Standard Version. It is more up to date than the King James and in a few instances made clearer than the American Standard Version. However, its modernistic tendencies and impressions has caused it to be rejected as authoritative. Its subtle implications must be watched and rejected. It is good used as a comparison but do not lay aside your King James nor the American Standard.

No-Backlash Door

THE MAMA Pig needn't say, "Get away from them swingin" doors, girl," when she and her family live in a hog house outfitted with no-backlash doors. There'll be no bruising of hogs with these automatic swinging doors, which let little pigs and big ones through without any spanking.

The no-backlash door, which anyone can make in short order, consists of two pieces of Masonite 1/4" Tempered Presdwood hinged to-



gether and from the top of a lumber framework. It also solves the problem of

keeping the live stock comfortable in winter. William Hulsebus, a Carnarvon,

Ia., lumber dealer, invented the door, which swings back into place slowly and therefore does not strike the animals after they pass through. Young pigs move in and out of the house through a panel six inches high, hinged to the larger panel above. When they grow, they join their elders in using the big panel, which is 25

inches high and 21 wide. Fasten the hinges to the Tempered Presdwood with nuts and bolts, and cover the cracks (see illustration) with fabric, which may be fastened with a heavyduty stapler. The fabric will serve to keep out drafts in coid weather.

Further tests showed that if a high rate of fertilizer, 150 pounds per acre of 3-12-6, were placed The advantage of fertilizer in contact with the grass and clover seed at planting time, then the stands of clover was surpressed. Growth was also slow if the bands of fertilizer were one inch below and one inch to the side of the seed. Therefore, the method of placing fertilizer one inch directly below the seed proved superior to all other tests .






