Rev. S. H. Young, 66, retired Methodist minister and justice of peace at Stamford, died of a heart attack at his home in Stamford at 12:50 p. m. Thursday.

He had served as pastor and presiding elder in the Northwest Texas Conference for 35 years before retiring five years ago.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Saturday from St. John's Methodist Church. Rev. Hurshel Thurston, district pastor, was assisted by Rev. Marshall Rhew, Methodist district superintendent; Dr. Howard Crawford, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Lamesa, and Dr. O. P. Clarke of Abilene. Burial was in Highland Cemetery.

Rev. Young retired because of a heart ailment. He and Mrs. Young returned here in 1948. He had been ill several times in recent year and suffered a heart attack at Thanksgiving, being hospitalized for more than a week. He had been downtown Thursday addressing Christmas cards.

Born Feb. 5, 1887 in Williamson County, Rev. Young entered the ministry when 26 years of age. Andrews was his first charge. He served successively at Fulvana, Roby, Loraine, Hedley, Stanton, Roscoe, Chillicothe, Floydada and Snyder. He had been presiding elder of the Stamford and Sweetwater districts and pastor of the First Methodist Church at Sweetwater before returning to Stamford to serve as presiding elder of the Stamford district for six years. He was pastor of the Highland Heights Methodist Church in Sweetwater when he retired.

His first wife, the former Allie Hurst, died in 1920. He married Mrs. Clyde Shipp in 1922.

He is survived by the widow, five sons, Horace Young of Bishop, Clyde Young of Eastland, Emmitt and Carl Young of Dallas and Eldon Shipp of Staten Island, N. Y.; three daughters, Mrs. John Gerrety of Lawton, Okla., Mrs. Jack Crockett of Stamford, Mrs. Roscoe Hughes of Fort Worth; 13 grandchildren; three great-grandchildren; a brother, Marvin A. Young of Norman, and two sisters, Mrs. A. E. Shear of Maple Plains, Minn., and Mrs. Ruby Bozer of Mexico, Missouri.

### INCOME TAX LAWS ALLOWS FARMERS TO RECLAIM LOSSES

Texas farmers who suffered a net operating loss in 1953 should investigate provisions of federal income tax laws that make allowances for unprofitable farm operations.

Farmers showing a net loss this year can use the loss to offset income in future years, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist. Also, Bates explains, any farmer who paid federal taxes on 1952 income and who operated at a loss during 1953 is eligible to claim refund.

This is done by refiguring tax on 1952 income taking into account this year's deficit. If all deficiencies are not absorbed, the remaining loss may be carried forward for five years consecutively commencing with 1954.

Whether a farm showed a net loss or gain during the year is determined by the figure derived on tax schedule 1940F, page one, line 10.

"The computation and claiming of a farm loss is not as easy as it first appears," says the specialist. "Farmers desiring to claim deficits should consult a competent accountant or a representative of the Internal Revenue Service."

Bates explains farmers should claim the refund when submitting this year's tax return, using form 843. Otherwise, they lose the chances to file losses for the 1952 period when income was subtracted to tax.

Many operators are hesitant to report their complete losses, Bates concludes, but a careful tabulation from records should be made and all deficits reported. Actual farm records, however, he warns, should be kept to substantiate losses.

KNOX CITY—Irrigation on a small scale paid off for Ancil Waldrup, who owns farms south of Knox City.

From 1 1/2 acres sown to sudan grass he gathered in two cuttings 2,000 pounds of seed. And from 26 acres irrigated he has gathered 15 bales of cotton.

Waldrup plans to put in some irrigated cotton next year where he had grown feed this year. He had 25 acres that he irrigates with water from a 55-foot well, through a four-inch pipe.

His pumping cost is about nine cents an hour. "I use about 1 1/2 gallons of butane an hour," he said.

He says considerable irrigations have been practiced in the area between Knox City and Weinert during the year. Most of the wells from which the water is taken are connected with an 8-inch pipe.

He uses a sprinkler system for a small tract near his house. And he reports it has done good work and made fine plants.

Waldrup said that engineers had made a survey of the particular area and had concluded that the terrain is underlain with a hardpan that holds the water from the rains, but that there is also a strong vein of water-a-terrible subterranean stream—which has not appreciably lowered during the drought.

He recalls a wildcat oil well driller northeast of Munday found artesian water adapted to irrigational purposes at a depth of 1,300 feet. In abandoning the well it was plugged, but it demonstrated that irrigation might be made a big economical proposition during the drought.

Experience by Waldrup, he said, had shown that he could pump his irrigation well for hours with the result the water table was lowered somewhat but when the low point was reached the pump no longer reduced the stand of fluid, he said.—Hamilton Wright in Abilene Reporter-News.

W. E. Braly, president of the First National Bank of Munday, announced Tuesday that the bank will close its doors for Christmas at noon Thursday, Christmas eve. "This will give employees a half-day off in order to complete their Christmas shopping or make a trip to visit relatives on Christmas," he said.

Mr. Braly feels that the bank is obligated to be open a portion of the day Saturday, although a large portion of the town will be closed. The bank will be open until noon Saturday, he stated.

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox,  
M. D., State Health Officer  
of Texas

AUSTIN—State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox looked at the calendar today and saw chapping weather ahead.

"Top weather changes—dew

point and barometric pressure—cause skin to chape and crack," the season-conscious Dr. Cox pointed. "Chapping is always more frequent and more severe from December through February."

That is the time of year when weather forecasts are likely to read: "low barometric pressure, moist air followed by sudden high pressure and dryness with low dew point." It adds up to real chapping conditions.

Dew point is the temperature at which moisture begins to condense into visible form. It makes a useful index of actual humidity. When it is low, chapping can be severe.

Wind hastens chapping, too, Dr. Cox commented, especially when skin is wet. Quick evaporation is the big factor here. Dryness might actually be increased by hot water, soap, or the so-called protective oils, lotions, and creams. A day's injury sometimes takes weeks to heal.

A chapped condition can run the gamut from plain dryness and itching to splits and fissures

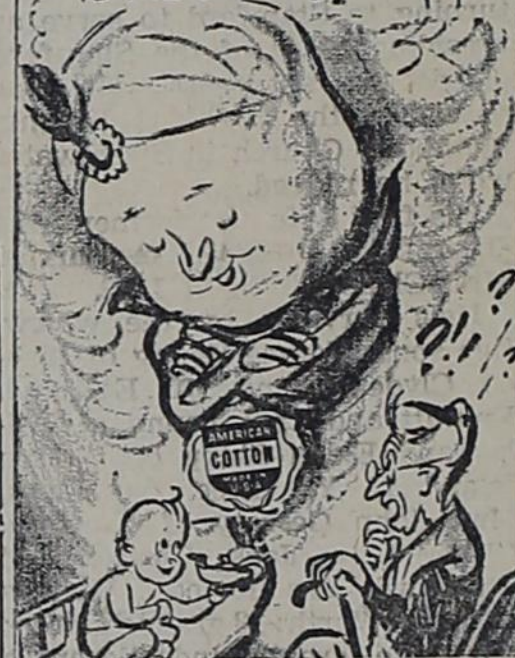

which bleed and crust. An artificial humidifier in the house would be a big help, the health officer said, but you could probably get the quickest relief by checking with your doctor.

And if you happen to have a psychrometer, an instrument which determines humidity, you will be able to foresee chapping weather ahead and take precautions. Don't think in terms of "relative humidity," though. That indicates the percentage of atmospheric saturation at a given temperature, and is unreliable because warm air can hold more water vapor than cold air. For example, relative humidity of 80 percent indicates far less moisture at 40 degree that it does when the temperature stands at 60 degrees.

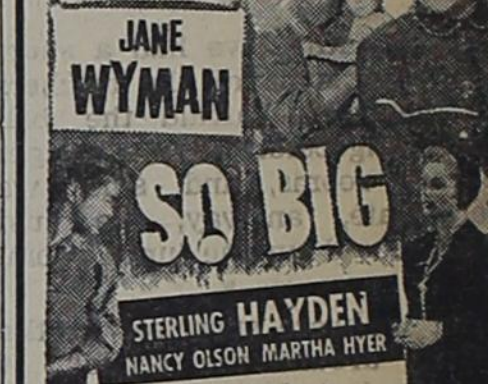

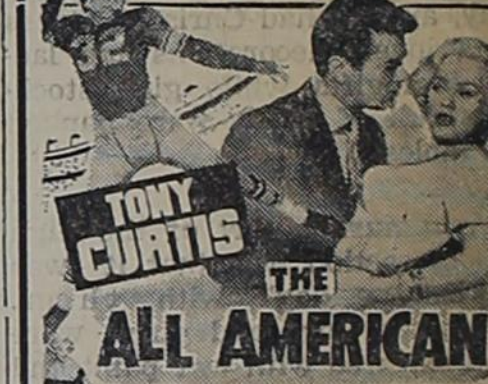

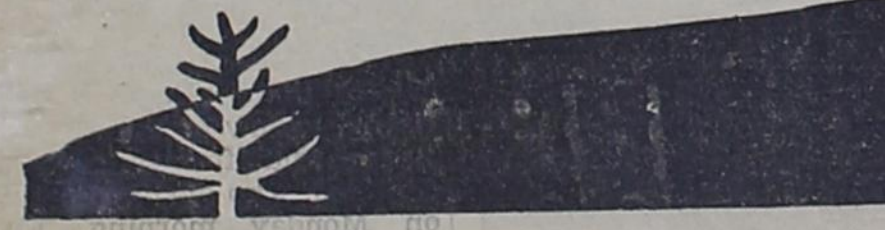

The new sock is a handsome ribbed style made of the finest

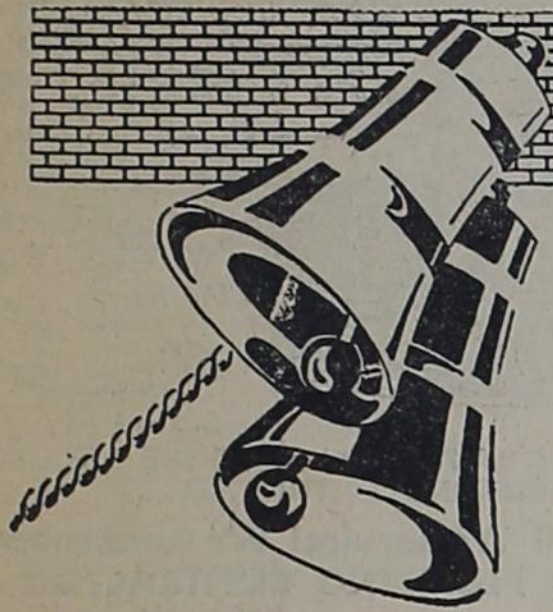

Prices being what they are today, perhaps a younger generation would be interested, amused or even amazed to learn that when I was a boy back in 1910, when we came from Coldwater, Miss., to Memphis (by train of course), we looked forward to dining at the Waldorf Cafe. It

was a good restaurant and good food, and the price for a complete dinner was 25 cents.

If you wanted to put on a little more style you could eat at Floyd's for 35 cents.

But if you wished to feast on the best to be had, you went to the dining room of the Arlington Hotel. There, in old Southern surroundings (quiet, and leisurely), the guest was attended by an attentive and deferential waiter in evening clothes.

The dinner consisted of soup, meat of course, and six vegetables, served in little dishes that almost encircled your plate, a drink and ice cream with cake—and the price was 50 cents.

At that time, a seat in the

grandstand at Red Elm Park (home of the Memphis Turtles of the Southern Association) was half a dollar but, if either my chum or I obtained so vast a sum, the lucky one invited the other and we occupied two-bit bleacher seats. Sitting out in the sun is a lot more fun than being in the grandstand when you're 12 or 13 and the fans could josh the left fielder and he would josh back.

And for 25 cents you could get a seat in the gallery at the Lyceum theatre and see stage shows, ranging from "Julius Caesar" to Al G. Fields' minstrels. Have you ever sat in the gallery? You would go in at the

door on the alley and climb and climb and climb and when at last you got to the gallery, the seats were almost straight up and down. But you could see well and hear every word, and this was long before the loud speaker was invented.

As for that new-fangled entertainment, moving pictures, why, the price of admission for a boy was five cents!

### McMurry Granted Approval On Two College Programs

ABILENE — McMurry College has been granted full approval on both its undergraduate and graduate degree programs by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools Dr. Harold G. Cooke, president, reported Saturday.

Twenty-eight per cent of the McMurry faculty have the Ph. D. degree, including all professors

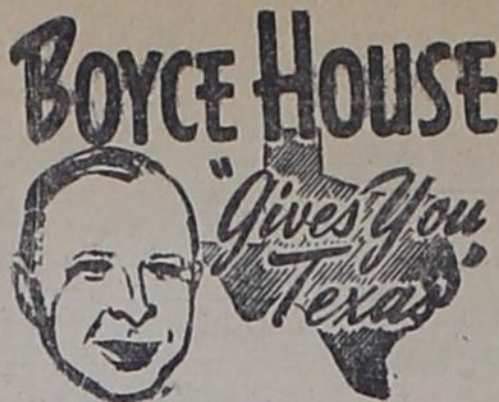

New Orleans is indeed a storied city—especially the French Quarter.

Here is Jackson Square with the heroic statue of the victor of the Battle of New Orleans, flourishing his hat on a rearing charger, the entire statue supported only by the horse's two hind feet.

On one side of the square is the St. Louis Cathedral, a building of severe gray but quite beautiful within: stained glass windows and many paintings. A marble slab near the altar marks the tomb of the man whose generosity two centuries ago made the structure possible.

Beside the cathedral stands the Cabildo, which was the Spanish seat of government. Just inside the entrance is a painting of

Louis XIV, the Grand Monarch of France for whom Louisiana is named. To one side of the patio is the cell from which, tradition says, Pierre Lafitte broke out. Between the two ancient buildings is a narrow lane—for pedestrians and cyclists only—which is known as Pirate's Alley because of its association with Pierre; his more famous brother, Jean, and other smugglers and buccaneers.

Today, along the fence of the cobbledstone alley, artists hang their sketches and paintings, then stand by hopefully. Some of the artist shave tufts of hair on their chins and all have bushy hair. One wears a beret. There is a woman artist also; she is known as "the Gypsy" and dresses the part. Other artists offer their productions for sale on the sidewalk of Jackson Square. Prices are as little as \$1; some pictures are \$5; a few, \$15; some, not marked, are probably higher.

You can have a picture of yourself drawn in charcoal in 15 minutes; or there is an instantaneous photographer with an old-fashioned tripod and black cloth who confesses, "Every now and then, I make a good picture

—by accident." On opposite sides of Jackson Square are two buildings, each a block long, said to be the first apartment houses in America. They were built over a century ago. In the corner of one is a wine shop with the ends of barrels displayed, like a wine cellar. The vintages are from France, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland, Chile, Holland and other countries.

The park, enclosed by an iron fence, sees little boys and girls at play, watched over by colored nurses; dogs, unleashed for a few moment's romp, and elderly people, including a man with shaggy hair, who wears a large metal emblem on each lapel. A romancer could make a short story out of him, no doubt.

## Drive And Walk In Safety; Help Your Traffic Officer

"Pity the traffic officer in this Christmas rush—and help him by driving and walking carefully."

That plea was made by Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation. He was discussing the local traffic situation and the current holiday hazards program which the Texas Safety Association is conducting in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"The job of traffic officer becomes more difficult as the holidays draw nearer," Co. Tilley explained. "People aren't too conscious of traffic laws any day in the year. And when the holiday mania gets in their blood, they are inclined to forget the rules and regulations altogether."

He believes people in the grip of holiday mania have a one-track mind when they use the streets or sidewalks. "They're grimly intent on getting from where they are to where they want to go," he said, "and neither hail, rain nor traffic is going to keep them from their appointed course."

According to Col. Tilley, this leads to much confusion. Motorists seem oblivious to traffic signals and speed regulations, and they often weave through traffic craning their necks in search of parking places. Pedestrians scurry along sidewalks at a break-neck pace, sometimes almost hidden behind umbrellas or piles of packages.

They dash out into the street in mid-block. When they do use crosswalks, they often fail to look out for cars before stepping from the curb.

"The traffic officer is sort of a middleman in this whole picture," he said. "He's got to bring order out this traffic chaos. He must persuade walkers to stay on the curb until it's safe to cross, keep addled motorists from snarling up traffic, and answer all sorts of sensible and senseless questions into the bargain. Walkers and drivers should give themselves and the traffic officers a break this Christmas by staying alert and alive in traffic."

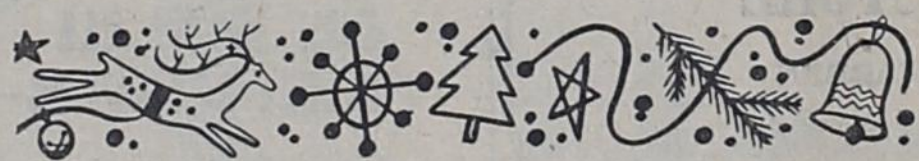

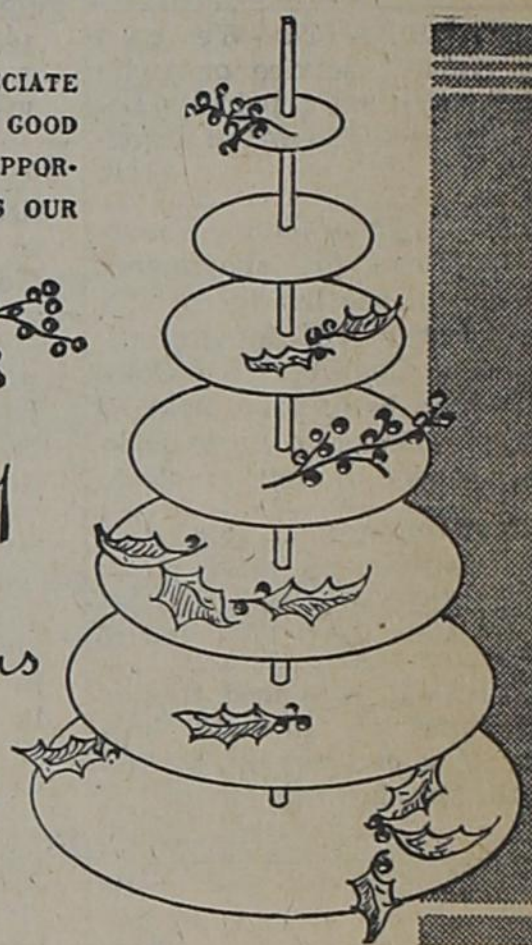

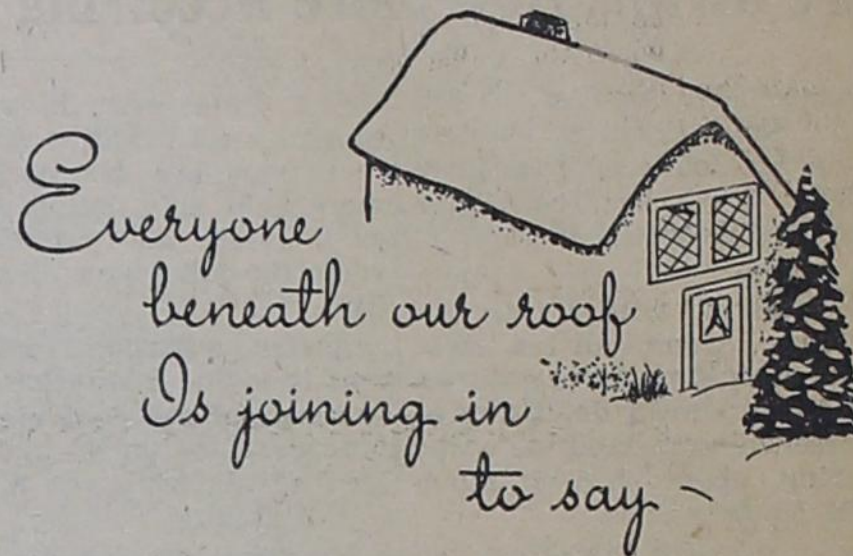

### Giant boy



Recently, a group of scientists and engineers was asked to predict what's next.

Now that we have electrified farms, factories and homes, is that the end? The answer appears to be no, that the electrical industry is a "giant boy" with its great growth still ahead. Here are some of the predictions.

Take a personal thing first. Millions of homes will have heat pumps to heat and cool automatically—using electricity for fuel.

You can expect to cook food someday by electronics—in seconds. Electrical incinerators will consume your waste paper and waste food. Dust will be taken from the air electrically. The day may come when TV screens hang like pictures on the wall, with only a tiny wire to the set.

Nuclear fuels are on the timetable of the scientists. Energy from the atom will eventually be a major source of power, regardless of whether fossil fuels are seriously depleted. By century's end, most new plants generating electricity will operate with atomic (fission) fuel. Aircraft, battleships and the like will measure fuel consumption in grams.

Storing heat from the sun is another long-range project of scientists, with billions in savings as the potential result.

The year 2000 looks big and distant. Actually it is only 47 years away. By then, any puny prognostications made today will have been rewritten many times. But larger. Electricity has always been a field where each new fact generates many more things new. The years should be interesting to watch.

To Frame Door Opening

HOME craftsmen on occasion need to frame a door opening in a wall or a partition. American Builder, trade magazine authority on building construction, offers the correct procedure, quoted here, and the accompanying illustration.

Studs (a) above the opening are toenailed to each part of the lintel with 10-penny nails. The long studs (b) are



nailed to ends of each part of lintel with two 10-penny nails and toenailed to the sole plate with two 10-penny nails.

The double studs (c) are nailed together with 10-penny nails spaced 16 inches and staggered as shown. Studs alongside the opening (d) are nailed into the end of the sole plate with two 10-penny nails. Note that studs supporting the lintel do not rest on sole plate but on subfloor and joists.

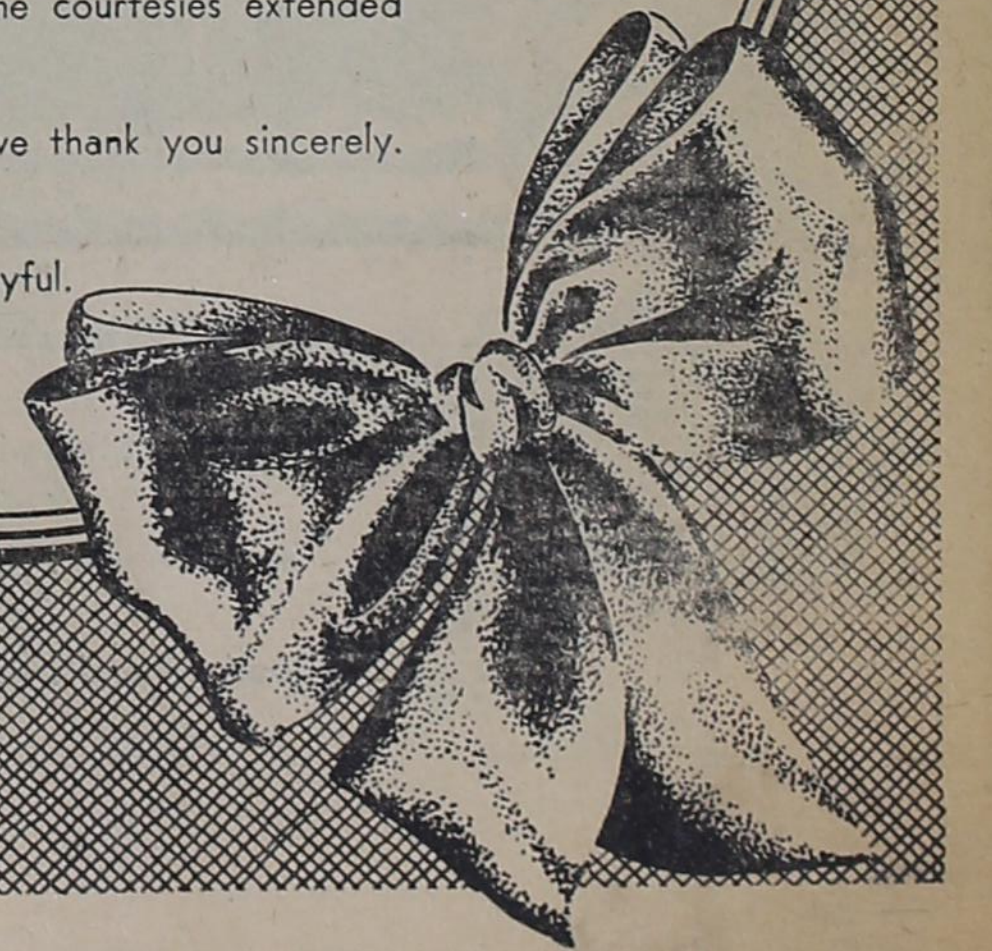

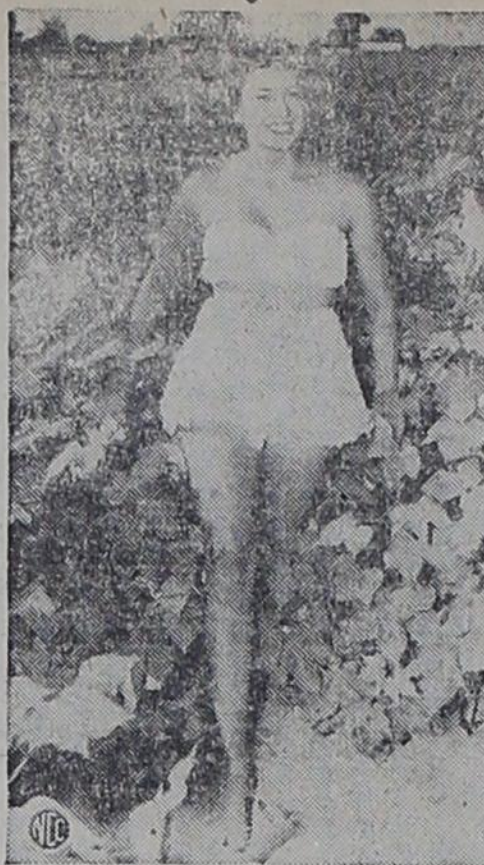

...the days of the Pilgrim Father, the turkey has been the traditional festive dinner for holidays and very special occasions. In those early days it was a game bird and was most likely tough and wiry, as wild birds usually are. The turkey is no longer a rare luxury.

How this amazing transition came about is a fascinating story. It is a story of science and industry working hand in hand with the farmer—as they have in so many ways on the farm—each contributing to the work of the other to the ultimate benefit of all. The first advance was in the field of genetics, the science of breeding. Then came the endless and patient work by the turkey-breeder to select strains of birds with a broad breast and well formed thigh, etc. The field of nutrition where science and the farmer now have about 30 different nutrients that go into a turkey's diet. Growers have to be constantly alert to watch for disease, for, as you know, nature takes care of this factor in a wild state by keeping her animals separated, or in small units. But on a farm, if disease gets into a flock, it might kill half the flock. For years this has been the farmer's hazard. Today, however, science has come to the rescue and found many drugs, vaccines and chemicals which can hold these ever-present diseases at bay. One of these is the "wonder drug" Aureomycin, which, when fed to the birds in feed or water, can prevent the invasion of a large number of disease germs. The turkeys then grow better and faster and more economically and go to the nation's tables at a price everyone can afford to pay.

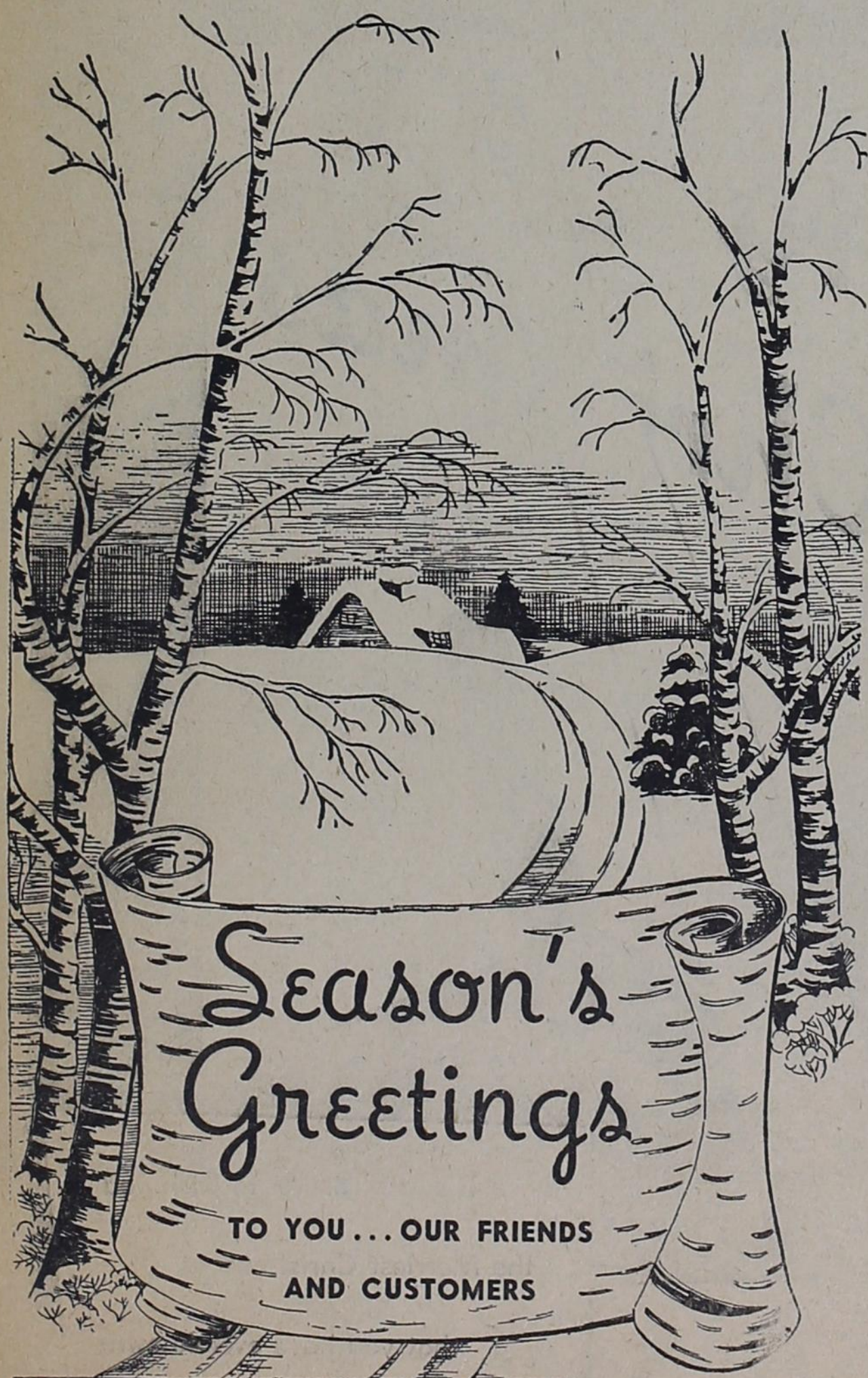

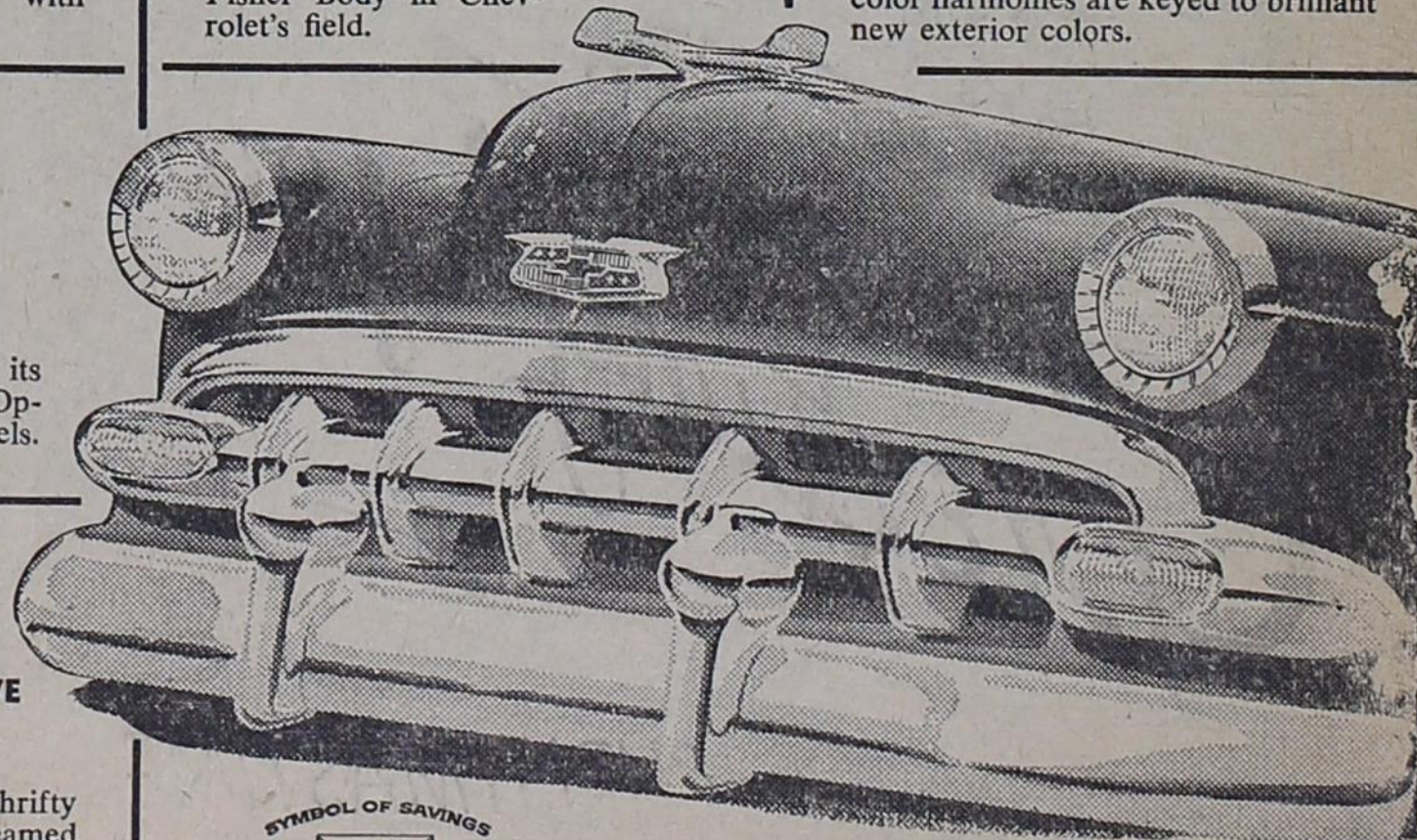
