Local Men Go To State Prison

Knox County Sheriff's Department officials transported two Munday men to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville last week.

Ronnie Wilson was sentenced to serve six years in the state prison after he pled guilty to a felony charge of criminal mischief in an amount of more than \$10,000.

Andy Masias will serve a nine year sentence for delivery of narcotics. Masias was found guilty in a jury trial several months ago, and the conviction was recently upheld by a state appeals court.

Two Knox City men are awaiting official orders from Huntsville before being taken to the penitentiary. They are both being held in the Knox County jail.

Knox City Youths Qualify For State 4-H Competition

Young horsemen from 23 counties gathered at the Wilbarger County 4-H arena in Vernon Friday and Saturday, June 14 and 15, for the annual District 3 4-H Horse Show. The top 20 horsemen at the show earn the right to compete in the 1985 Texas State 4-H Horse Show to be held in Abilene in July.

Representing Knox County were J. and Justin Emerson and Leah Boone, all of Knox City. All three participants qualified for the state show, earning a combined total of 40 points to place fourth in the district, according to County Extension agent David Tunmire.

J. Emerson was champion break-away roper in the open show, riding his grulla mare, Shifter. In the qualifying show, riding his grulla gelding, Blue Ringo, J. won the stakes race, placed fourth in poles and sixth in barrels.

Leah Boone showed her paint mare, an Apache Beauty, to fourth place in showmanship and seventh place in horsemanship in the qualifying show.

Justin Emerson rode his bay mare, Miss Brockett, to second place in poles and seventh place in the stakes race.

J. and Justin are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. J.M. Emerson, and Leah is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Boone, all of Knox City.

Downtown Goree Is Scene Of Car, Truck Collision

Traffic on U.S. Highway 277 in Goree was blocked for approximately one hour Friday night after a two-vehicle accident that sent two men to the local hospital.

The wreck occurred at 9:45 p.m. when a Pontiac Bonneville driven by Reggie Cruise of Abilene left the Allsup's parking lot and pulled into the westbound oncoming lane of traffic. The car collided with a 1983 Kenworth truck pulling a refrigerated trailer carrying a consignment of meat from Des Moines, Iowa to Fort Bliss Army Base in El Paso and White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico.

Cruise's vehicle was struck on the front side panel and the wreckage stopped in the driveway of Peek's Exxon. The truck turned on its side and slid sideways, coming to rest in the yard of the C.H. Presnalls, where its movement was stopped by a tree.

The Goree Volunteer Fire Department was first on the scene, and blocked traffic on the highway. Others responding to the accident were the Munday Police Department, Knox County Sheriff's Department, DPS troopers, Munday Ambulance Service and the Munday Volunteer Fire Department, which came with the rescue tool. The tool was called for because Cruise was pinned inside his vehicle, but he was extricated without using the rescue equipment.

Cruise and his passenger, Jimmy Crain of Abilene, were taken by Munday Ambulance Service to the Knox County Hospital where Crain was treated and released and Cruise

Members present were Vernal Zeissel, Bernard Brown, Benny Grill, Buster Lowrey, Ray Lynn Hardin, Greg Clonts and Maurine Reeder were absent. Also present was Jerry Burleson, hospital administrator.

At 9 p.m. Zeissel recommended the board go into executive session. Bernard Brown made the motion to go into executive session and Ray Lynn Hardin seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

The motion was made by Ray Lynn Hardin to return to regular session. Buster Lowrey seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. At 9:55 p.m. the board returned to regular session.

Benny Grill made the motion to put Dr. Newton Neufeld on courtesy staff until further notice. Ray Lynn Hardin seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Benny Grill then made the motion to adjourn. Bernard Brown seconded the motion and it carried. The meeting adjourned at 10:50 p.m.

Vegetable Festival On Weekend Agenda

After months of planning, publicizing and preparation, the big weekend is nearly upon us, and the Knox County Vegetable Festival is expected to attract a large number of local and out-of-town visitors.

The festival has something to entertain almost any taste, with exhibits of historical pictures, antique and modern commercial farm equipment and agriculture-related tool displays, a flower show, arts and crafts judging and sale, vegetable and baked and preserved food judging and educational materials available. Two queens will be crowned at the pageant planned for 7 p.m. Friday night at the Munday High School auditorium.

In keeping with the theme of the festival, a producers' market will be set up on City Hall lawn, and a supply of locally-grown vegetables will be available for purchase. For those wishing to learn more about vegetable production in the area, a tour of processing sheds and other related facilities will assemble at the City Hall at 9 a.m.

A variety of foods and drinks will be offered at different booths, and entertainment for youngsters is scheduled throughout the day. The adults will get into the act at the Anything Goes contests set for 6:30

p.m. at the football field, and a dance at the Rhineland gym will conclude the day's activities, with the Country Gold band providing music from 9 p.m. until 1 a.m.

A schedule, map and detailed stories about the Vegetable Festival events can be found inside the special tabloid section of this issue

of the Munday Courier. All the activities will take place at the Munday City Hall and in the surrounding block, and the festival is sponsored by the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Make plans to attend the festival. It will be a full day of entertainment designed to please everyone.

City Council Votes To Buy New Fire Truck

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met Tuesday, June 11, in regular session at the Munday City Hall.

Members present were Mayor Doris Dickerson and Aldermen Richard Albus, Jessie Tucker, Von Marr and Garon Tidwell. Jessie Andrade was absent.

Mayor Dickerson called the meeting to order. Minutes of the May 28 special meeting were read. Marr moved minutes be approved as written, Tucker seconded, motion carried.

Mayor Dickerson next recommended that Lee Bruce be reappointed to represent Munday on the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority board of directors for the period of June 1, 1985 to June 1, 1987. Marr moved the recommendation be accepted by the council and Lee Bruce be appointed to the board. Tucker seconded, motion carried.

The airport farmland lease was discussed. Tidwell moved the lease be extended one year on the same contract basis; price, terms and conditions are to be exactly as the June 1984 to June 1985 lease. Marr seconded, motion carried.

The council next discussed the overtime policy mandated by the Supreme Court as it applies to some city employees. After discussion, Albus moved that overtime in excess of 40 hours a week (to those employees determined applicable) be paid at 1½ times the regular rate of pay. The City Administrator is to limit all overtime except that absolutely necessary. Marr seconded, all members voted for.

Next discussed was a drainage problem at the intersection of Munday Avenue and Jean Street. The council discussed culvert installation after viewing grade levels, etc., as prepared by City Administrator Hertel. The council, after review and discussion, recommended that Administrator Hertel call Larry Smith and install a dip section due to lack of fall needed for good

culvert installation. Also, should Jean Street ever be paved, a dip would work better with paving.

After discussion, Tidwell moved that Ray Herring's garbage be picked up at Drainage District Bridge designated, once weekly, at 1.5x regular residential rate. Marr seconded, motion carried. (If rate is satisfactory to Herring).

Von Marr next discussed police department business. The June work schedule for the department as proposed by Marr and City Administrator Hertel was deemed fair and in accordance with council wishes. The schedule was presented. Some changes, due to Morton's knee therapy, is being made in the work schedule. Moving of the police radio and telephone to Dancer's residence are to be delayed at this time until Morton's further therapy needs are determined. Police communications and location will be reconsidered at subsequent meetings.

The audit covering the period of city operation for 1984-85 as prepared by James Castagna was examined. Albus moved it be approved and the auditor be paid. Tidwell seconded, motion carried.

Tucker moved bills be paid as follows: from airport funds, \$59.19; from ambulance funds, \$464.03; from swimming pool funds, \$571.01; from operating funds, \$16,626.70. Albus seconded, motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday met Friday, June 14, 1985 in special session to open bids on a new fire truck.

Present were Mayor Dickerson and Aldermen Garon Tidwell, Richard Albus and Jessie Tucker. Also present was Ed Lednicky of Boardman Company and Fire Chief Freddie Caram.

Garon Tidwell, Mayor pro-tem, read the bids. Several options were offered.

Three bids were received. They were from the Boardman Company, Emergency One and F.M.C. Corporation. After opening bids and examination of same, Mayor Dickerson called a special council meeting for 8 p.m., June 14, 1985, to further evaluate bids and to take any action the council believed needed at that time.

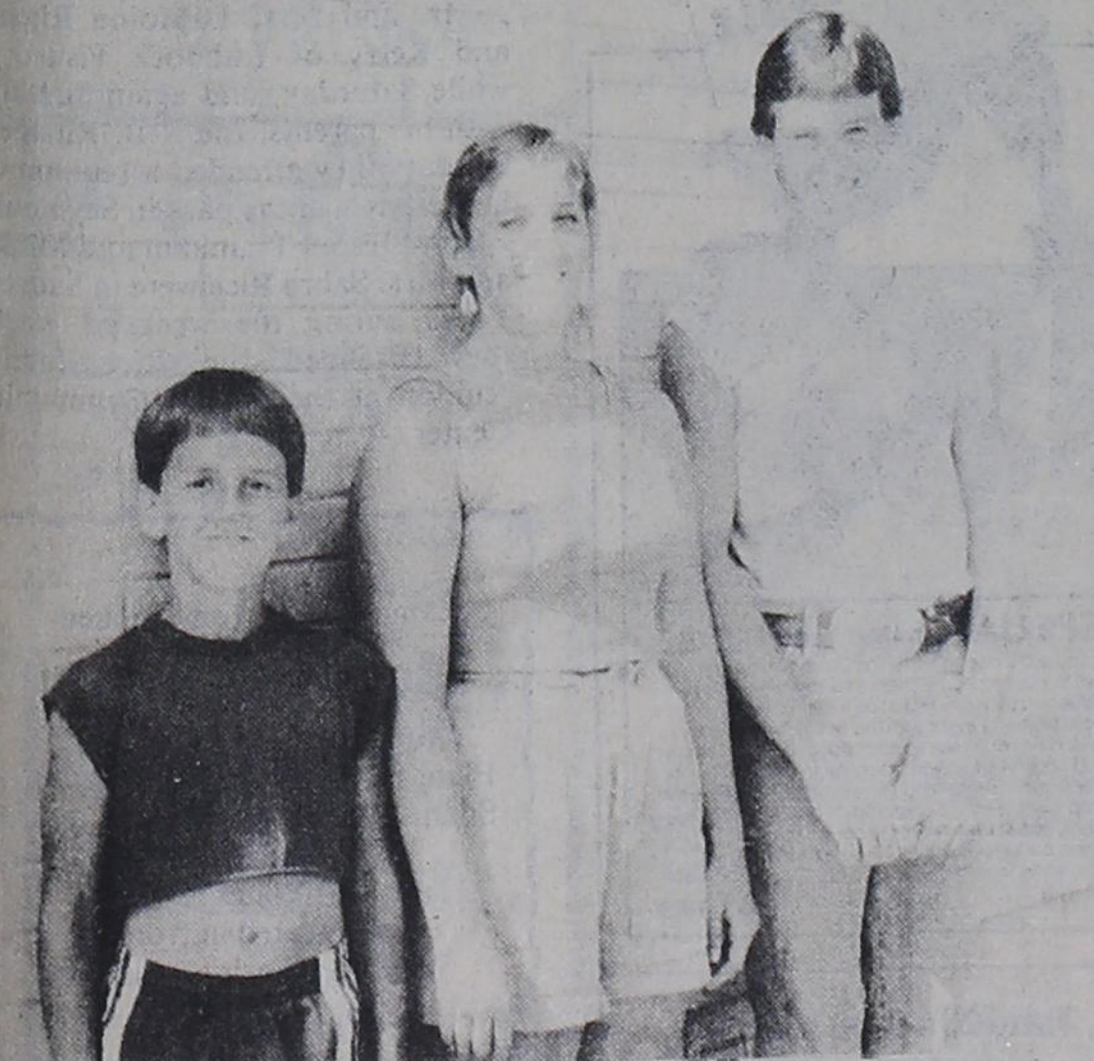

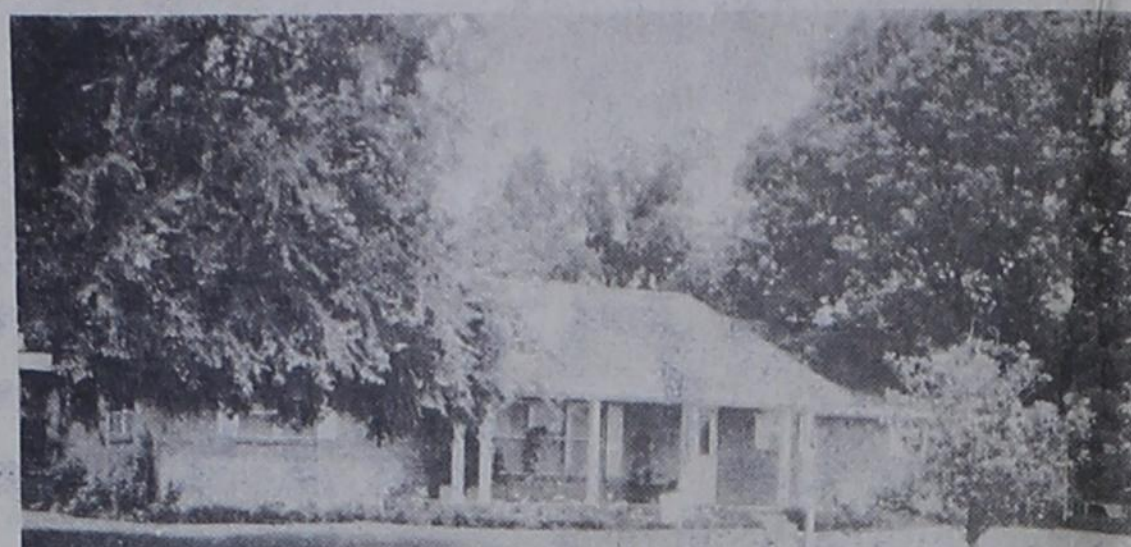

tion on a complete unit, including chassis, amount \$57,900. delivered F.O.B. Munday with one year service and parts free at Munday Fire Station.

Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met in special session June 14, 1985 at the Munday City Hall.

Present were Mayor Doris Dickerson and Aldermen Richard Albus, Garon Tidwell and Jessie Tucker.

Von Marr and Jessie Andrade were absent.

Also present were firemen Ray Lynn Hardin and Bill Williams.

Mayor Dickerson called the meeting to order. He announced that bids on a new fire truck had been opened at 1 p.m. the same day. The purpose of the special meeting, he said, was to further evaluate bids and award the bid if the Council so desired.

Bids were examined by the council. Again F.M.C. Corporation was apparent low bidder on a complete unit with a gasoline engine with pre-January 1985 emissions standards. Further examination and discussion followed. Garon Tidwell moved F.M.C. Corporation be awarded the bid on their low bid of \$57,900. Approximately 180 days are to be allowed for delivery with unit to be paid for, or if financed, the rate is to be not in excess of 7 percent for not more than seven years simple interest with a 20 percent down payment.

If financed, the balance of CD's above 20 percent of truck cost in the fire truck funds is to be kept separated and earn interest until such time truck is paid for. If decision by Mayor and City Administrator is to pay for truck, balance is to be borrowed from First National Bank in Munday and set into the 1986-87 budget for full payment. Tucker seconded, motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.

New Cable Network Now Showing On Channel 5

Harmon Cable Communications has recently added Cable News Network to its programming lineup in Munday. CNN, owned by Ted Turner, offers up to the minute news, weather and sports 24 hours a day. It can be seen locally on cable channel 5.

Gigi Barnett, manager of the local firm, stated that the original plan was to replace KFDX Channel 3 with CNN because of the continuing reception problems and complaints.

"We feel that our subscribers deserve a much higher quality picture than we are able to offer with KFDX."

After reviewing this plan and discussing it with several Munday residents, she decided to leave KFDX on the air and also carry CNN. Many of the citizens said they would rather receive KFDX with reception problems than lose it completely.

With the addition of CNN, the channel lineup will be more diverse and since CNN is received by satellite, it will not be affected by fluctuations in the weather as some off-air signals such as KFDX might be.

She would also like to point out to residents of Munday that CenTex Cablevision did not sell their business, but only changed their operating name to Harmon Cable Communications. There has been some confusion in this matter and she would like to make it clear that

the company is still being run by the same staff that has operated it for the past several years.

Problems of the past few months have been strictly weather related with thunderstorms the town has been experiencing.

EARLY SEASON COTTON PEST CLINIC

The Knox County Crops Committee has scheduled an early season cotton pest clinic for 8 a.m., Monday, June 24. The clinic will begin at the Farmers Grain Co-op in Munday then move to the field for some "hands on experience."

Emory Boring, Extension entomologist, will discuss which insects producers need to be watching for and how to identify their damage. Boring will include some tips on when control measures are necessary. The 1985 boll weevil outlook will also be discussed by Boring.

Vernal Zeissel, chairman, encourages all area cotton producers to attend this informative program. The other members of the Knox County Crops Committee are David Albus, Ray Escobar, Louis Baty, B.M. Brown, Maynard Moore, Clarence Brown, Wayland Hardin, Larry Smith and Randy Jones.

GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

Grasshoppers in weeds and grasses around cotton fields in Knox County are a potential threat to young cotton plants. Grasshoppers can destroy the cotton stands.

The lubber (jumbo) grasshopper is the major threat and there appears to be a large hatch of these grasshoppers in parts of the county. If there are two lubber grasshoppers per square yard in the vegetation around fields, the grasshoppers should be controlled now. If there are more than 20 grasshoppers per square yard of other species in the vegetation around the field, these should also be controlled prior to planting.

As cotton comes up, until it reaches the six leaf stage, the stand can be damaged by grasshoppers. One lubber grasshopper or 10 other grasshoppers per three feet of row can cause stand loss. Grasshoppers often move into fields at the same places that were most heavily

damaged in past years. Field inspection should start in these areas.

Some insecticides that might be used to control grasshoppers in non-crop areas are carbaryl (Seven R) 80S, XLR and Sevimol R, malathion (91 percent ULV and 57 percent EC), Orthene 75S and Pydrin. If there are no weeds in the area to be sprayed use malathion. The same formulations of carbaryl and malathion might be used to control grasshoppers in cotton. Carbaryl baits (5 percent and 20 percent) are also available to protect young cotton from grasshoppers. Several applications of these baits will probably be required to provide effective control. Toxaphene can be formulated into a bait when available and labeled for that use. The directions on how to formulate the bait can be obtained from the Knox County Extension office.

Where grasshoppers are expected to be a major problem use a seed treatment such as phorate (Thimet (R)) or use an in-furrow systemic insecticide such as Temik (R), Thimet (R), or DiSyston (R). The seed treatment or in-furrow treatment might be used on the first 16 rows on the side of the field where grasshoppers historically cause their damage.

Where grasshopper populations are heavy and continue to move into field margins control measures will be needed prior to planting and as the cotton stand develops. Field inspections once or twice weekly will be needed as cotton emerges through the four to six leaf stage to determine the need for additional control measures.

State Food Program To Include Knox County

More low-income women, infants and children who are at nutritional risk will be receiving food assistance and nutrition education in Knox County this month, due to the WIC program.

Local officials of the Texas Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) are encouraging those who feel they may be eligible to apply for WIC services. To apply for WIC benefits, contact your local WIC office for an appointment at 888-5585 or 864-3430. Offices are located at 101 E. Nevada St. in Seymour or 530 S. 2nd St. in Haskell.

WIC participants receive a monthly supply of nutritious foods such as milk, eggs, fruit juice, iron-fortified cereal and iron-fortified infant formula. Monthly nutrition education classes are also provided so WIC participants can learn about the relationship between health and good nutrition and how to buy and prepare nutritious meals.

To receive this assistance, participants must have health or nutrition-related problems and meet specified low-income criteria.

"Eating a nutritious diet is one of the most important things a pregnant woman can do to help assure a healthy baby; but eating a nutritious diet isn't always as easy as it sounds," according to Catherine Litteer, nutritionist and chief administrator of the WIC program in Texas. That is why she is encouraging low-income pregnant and breastfeeding women, infants and children up to five years old, who have been found to be the most vulnerable to the effects of malnutrition, to apply for WIC services.

"Some pregnant women simply can't afford a nutritious diet, and some don't know how to plan one," explained Ms. Litteer. "The consequences of poor prenatal nutrition can be anemia, toxemia, prematurity, low-birthweight infants, complications in delivery or other maternal or infant illnesses."

The benefits of good prenatal nutrition, achieved through the WIC program, has been documented in a study conducted by the Harvard University's School of Public Health. The study found that every \$1 spent to aid pregnant women avoided \$3 in hospital costs that would have been spent for treatment of their babies. The cost to taxpayers is less to prevent complications than the costs resulting from complications. Since the program is funded through local health care dollars, WIC also encourages frequent prenatal and delivery care. The ultimate

positive change in dietary habits that will improve participants' nutritional status. The futureistic nature of the program, training young mothers, who will in turn teach their children good eating habits, has far reaching potential.

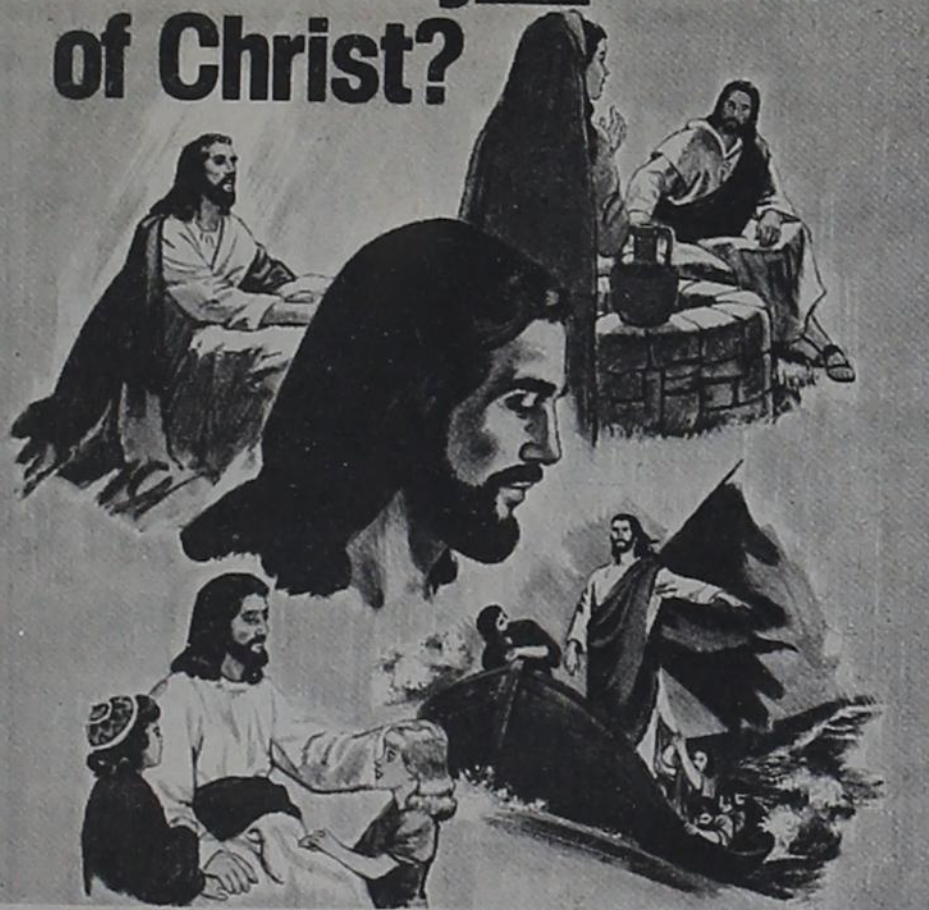

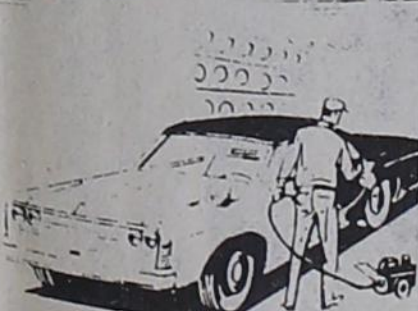

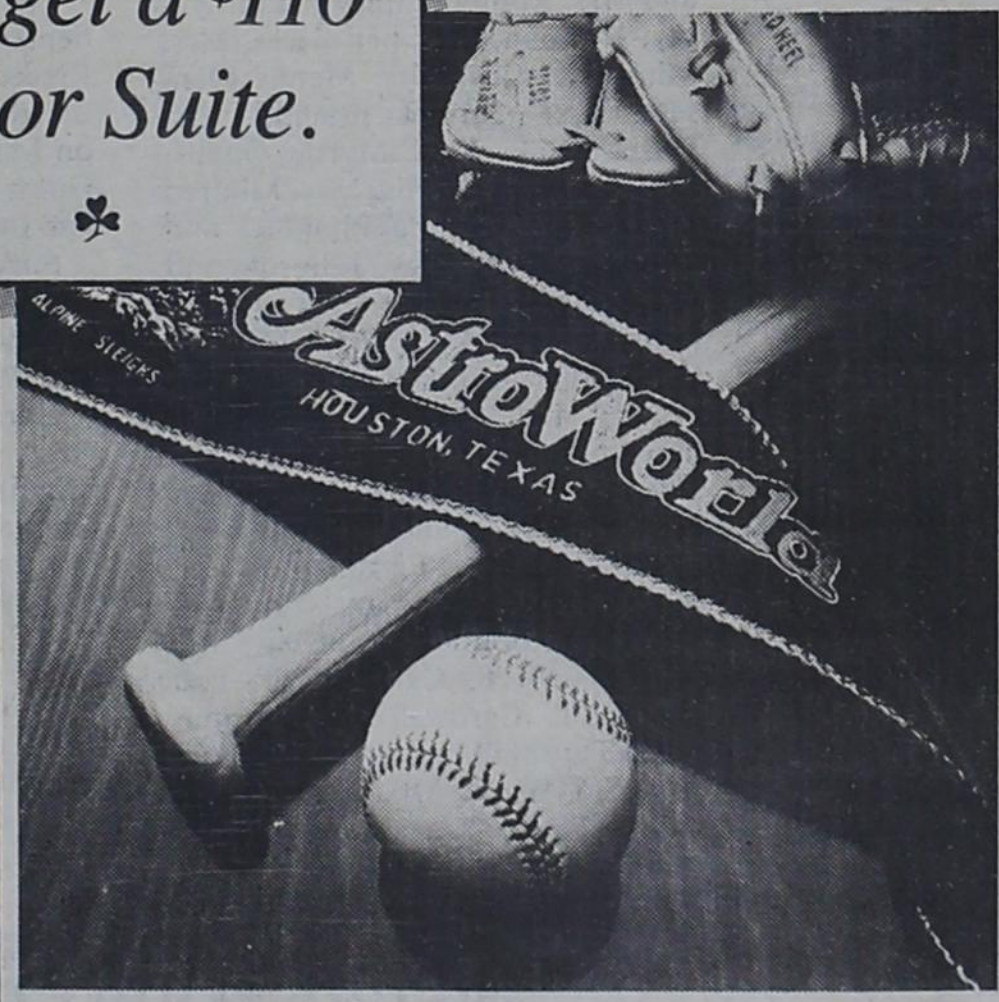
