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REMEMBER TO VOTE

Primary Elections Set Saturday, May 5

Saturday, May 5, is an important day for voters in Texas, as Democratic and Republican primary elections will be held from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on that day. Several important choices are on local ballots, including candidates for the U.S. Senator's seat being vacated by John Tower. Voters in the Democratic primary will elect a district judge, district attorney, sheriff, county tax assessor-collector and county attorney, and, in some precincts, a commissioner, justice of the peace and constable.

Party conventions will begin at 7:15 p.m. Saturday. Delegates for the state convention will be chosen. Democratic presidential candidates will be voted on by the delegates.

Of particular interest to voters in each party is the race for United States Senator. Democrats may choose between David Young, Bob Krueger, Kent Hance, Harley Schlanger, Lloyd Doggett and Robert S. Sullivan for their party's candidate. Names on the Republican ballot are Rob Mossbacher, Ron Paul, Phil Gramm and Henry C. Grover. It is already being speculat-

ed that a runoff in one, if not both, parties will be needed to elect the candidates who will face each other in the general election in November.

Other contested state races include that for Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, which pits John L. Hill and Sears McGee; Place 2 Justice on the Supreme Court and Place 1, 2 and 3 Judges on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Much interest is being shown locally in the two district races we share with Baylor, King and Cottle counties. Appointed 50th District Judge Tom Schrandt is being opposed by Seymour attorney David Hajek; and incumbent District Attorney W. H. (Bill) Healy faces James M. Morris in the other district race.

In county contests, Sheriff Morris E. (Gene) Nix is opposed by Van Green; and Oscar Mangis and Steve Bisbee are seeking election to the office of Knox County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Precinct 1 commissioner Billy G. Johnston and Precinct 3 commissioner Philip Homer are both running unopposed, as are Don Griffith for Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace, Bobby D. Burnett for County Attorney, Leroy Davis for Precinct 2 constable and David Counts for county Democratic chairman.

One voting place in Munday has been changed. Residents of voting precinct 6 East, who usually vote at the Community Center, will cast their ballots at the Munday City Hall this year. James Smith is precinct chairman and election judge for this box. Dan Sloan is chairman and election judge for precinct 6 North, and voters in that precinct vote at the high school. Voters in precinct 6 West vote at the band hall, according to precinct chairman and election judge W. R. Moore Jr. Harold Jones is judge of the Goree box, and those citizens vote at the Memorial Building.

An average turnout is expected in the local election. The deadline for

voting absentee in person was 5 p.m. Tuesday, May 1, and as of noon on that day, County Clerk Gloria West said 33 persons had voted in person on the Democratic ticket. 13 absentee ballots were sent to voters requesting them by mail. Mrs. West reported six persons had voted absentee in the Republican election.

Whatever your preference as to party, please exercise your right to vote on Saturday. Our government cannot represent the people if we do not make our choices known. Voting is a responsibility and a privilege of which we should all take advantage.

Change Made In Voting Location

Residents of Munday voting box 6 East who normally vote at the Munday Community Center for primary and general elections are asked to go to the City Hall to cast their ballots on May 5. Arrangements could not be made for the voting to be done at the Community Center for this election, so the City Hall was chosen as an alternate location.

Box 6 East is Knox County Precinct 4 in Munday.

Munday Farmer Is Winner Of Soil Conservation Award

Rhoades Allen of Munday was named outstanding cooperators for 1983 at the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District banquet held Thursday, April 26. Guests at the banquet were employees of the Soil Conservation Service, conservation district directors and winners of the district's awards program.

Lonnie Offutt of Munday, chairman of the board of directors, was master of ceremonies. He introduced the directors, Louis Baty of Gilliland, Charles Griffith of Benjamin, Charles Griffith of Knox City and Billy Kinnibrugh of Vera; the secretary, Zoanne Felts of Knox City; and Jerry Pearce, Judy Albus and Charles Ray Escobar, personnel at the Knox County Soil Conservation office.

Allen has been a cooperators with the district since June, 1977, and is nearing completion on his contract with the Great Plains Conservation Program. Through the GPCP program, Allen has completed 37,000 feet of terraces, 24 acres of waterways and 4,350 feet of diversions. He has carried out proper management on 748 acres of cropland, 360 acres of rangeland, six acres of pastureland, 24 acres of grassed waterways and 29 acres of other land uses. His efforts have resulted in significant improvement in the soil and water resources of his farm and serve as an excellent example of what can be accomplished with a good soil and water conservation program.

Also receiving awards were winners of the 1983 conservation essay and poster contests. Tammy Tischler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Van Tischler of Benjamin and Wilda

Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Smith of Munday, accepted trophies for their winning essays. Grand champion essay winner, Becky Underwood of Knox City, was not present to receive her award.

Kacy Longan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Longan of Munday, was grand champion poster winner in the district and was one of three state poster champions. Receiving a runner-up award for her poster was Cynthia Fernandez, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Fernandez of Munday. Shannon Hicks of Knox City was another reserve poster winner, but he was not present at the banquet.

A meeting of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors was held immediately following the banquet.

Reddens Going To Lockney

Robert Redden, head basketball coach at Munday High School for three years, has accepted a position with the Lockney Independent School District. He will be basketball coordinator at Lockney High School, coaching both boys' and girls' varsity basketball teams and coordinating the entire basketball program.

The Mogul record under Redden has shown a total of 52 wins against 26 losses, with one district championship in 1982. Junior high and junior varsity records have also been better-than-average.

Redden commented, "I have appreciated the Munday schools, the administration and the community for their support during my years here. I feel a large part of the reason for our successful athletic program is the school and community support. My family and I have enjoyed living here, and we leave with mixed feelings, but I feel the opportunity at Lockney is one I can't afford to turn down. It seems to be an ideal set-up for my coaching interests."

Changes In Store For Local School System

Texas public schools are in the process of making major curriculum changes. Munday High School principal Doug Donoho has announced that slight changes will occur in the Munday schools next year, with major changes to be implemented in the 1985-86 school year.

These curriculum changes are mandated by the Texas Education Agency as a result of House Bill 246, which became law the last legislative session.

Basically, the changes demand

stricter graduation requirements, tighter structure in courses offered and more consistency and continuum from kindergarten through grade twelve. Teachers will be held more accountable for teaching and students will be accountable for learning.

It will be the purpose of the Munday schools, Donoho said, to provide a well-balanced curriculum and to deliver effective instruction to all students. A well-balanced curriculum will include the following classes

es in grades K-12:

English language arts, other languages to the extent possible, mathematics, science, health, physical education, fine arts, social studies, economics with emphasis on the free enterprise system and its benefits, business education, vocational education and Texas and United States history as individual subjects and in reading courses.

Added to the traditional courses will be classes at both ends of the scale - some more rigorous and some less rigorous than present ones. In high school, beginning with freshmen entering this fall, both a regular academic program and an advanced academic program will be available.

The regular program will require a total of 21 state credits in order to graduate. Local school credits may also be added to these requirements. Credits will be required in the following: English language arts, four credits; mathematics, three; science, two; social studies, three; physical education, one and one-half; health, one-half; electives, seven.

The advanced program will require a total of 22 state credits for graduation, and local school credits may be added to these. Requirements are: English language arts, including English IV advanced, four; mathematics, three; science, three; social studies, three; physical education, one and one-half; health, one-half; Spanish, two; computer science, one; fine arts, one; and electives, three.

Of the credits required for either the regular or advanced program, at least 20 credits will have to be in

courses other than physical education, athletics, band or driver education. None of the less rigorous courses will count for credit in the advanced program.

The new course programs will only affect those students entering the freshman class next fall.

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

Controlling Fleas and Ticks

The warm weather we have been having has already caused some fleas and ticks to be active. If you have dogs and/or cats, it is time to start thinking about controlling these pests.

Tommy Mangis of Knox City is going to use a three-phase method to control fleas and ticks. By treating the yard, dog and house at the same time, he will prevent one from reinfesting the other. This is the key to this control method.

Mangis will treat his yard with Dursban or diazinon. These materials are available in either a spray or granular form. It is important to follow label instructions for use and rate.

He will dip his dog in a regular dog dip. Many dips are available but dips containing a systemic insecticide are usually more effective.

The home is where Mangis will have his toughest problem. The first step is to vacuum all the rugs. Several materials are available to treat indoors. These include: Ficam-W, Baygon, household diazinon and Knox Out. Some of these materials will cause staining so read label instructions carefully for usage.

This three phase attack, when done at the same time, will give good results on the control of fleas and ticks. Yard and home treatments should be repeated in three weeks or follow label instructions if different.

APPLY ZINC TO PECAN TREES
Bud break has occurred on most pecan trees in Knox County. This means it is time

for the first application of zinc.

Zinc as a foliage spray will probably help as much as anything in developing a healthy, fast growing tree. The spray should be directed to cover the leaf surface of the tree. Recommended forms of zinc include: NZS, NZN, and zinc sulfate.

Foliage sprays are limited on the amount of zinc which gets inside the tree from a single spraying. Therefore two follow-up applications are recommended. These applications should be made when the leaves are one-third grown and in the first week of June.

Zinc deficiency in pecan trees causes the development of a rosette appearance. This means the leaves tend to

grow in bunches. This bunching is caused by short node development or lack of growth at the terminal shoots. When adequate zinc is available, the pecan tree develops a dark green color and makes excellent terminal growth.

God doesn't force any man to be saved or lost. He has been given his own free will, his own choice. Thus man can choose to go to Heaven or go to Hell. It's your choice. To live in the world, to live in Christ. What choice will you make?

I love people who love God. I fellowship people who love God and have chosen to be His disciple. A person who is living by God's rules is Number 1 on my list. However, Jesus had a mission to seek and save the lost. The whole do not need a physician. Therefore it's my decision to be around people and try to help them make the right choices before it's everlastingly too late.

Religion is not the way to receive salvation. The Jews had more religion than the world needed. As a matter of fact, they made many wrong choices. They substituted tradition for commandment. I'm not saying that we shouldn't be religious, but in our religion we should seek to please God rather than men. We should listen to scripture, rather than church doctrine. (2) 1 Pet. 4:17: "For it is time for judgement to begin with us first, what will be the outcome for those who do not obey the gospel of God?" (3) 1 Thess. 1:7ff: "... Lord revealed from Heaven with His mighty angels in flaming fire, dealing out retribution to those who do not know God and to those who do not obey the gospel of our Lord Jesus. And these will pay the penalty of eternal destruction, away from the presence of the Lord, and from the Glory

of His Power."

What about the great commission! (4) Mk. 16:15, 16: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation. 16. He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved; but he who has disbelieved shall be condemned." (5) Acts 2:38: "And Peter said to them, Repent and let each of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

There are many more like scriptures, but I think God's word has been made very clear. You see, I don't care what church doctrine teaches, if it does not agree with sound doctrine. What do you believe about God's plan of salvation? What choices have you made concerning belief and obedience? I hope that we all can make the choice that Peter did in Acts 5:29: "We must obey God rather than men." How about you? What choice have you made concerning God's laws? Some say it doesn't matter what you believe, or what you obey. I say it does. There has never been a time when disbelief or disobedience was pleasing to God. Be careful with your choice. It will decide your destiny. It's your choice!

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





WTU Buys Cheaper Gas Means Lower Fuel Clause

Efforts to obtain cheaper boiler fuel for its power plants are paying off for West Texas Utilities Co. and its customers.

Through an agreement reached earlier this year, WTU is receiving 20 million cubic feet of lower cost natural gas daily for use at its Fort Phantom Hill Power Station near Abilene.

The savings in WTU's fuel

bill this year will amount to about \$7.7 million, which will be passed along to the customers. The only hitch is that the customers will have to wait until the Company's fuel cost factor is adjusted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

Under new PUC rules, the fuel factor, which is the amount WTU is allowed to charge its customers for fuel, is set for a 12-month period, or until the utility's next rate case. Under the old system, the fuel factor was automatically adjusted each month to reflect the current cost of fuel.

The cheaper gas is being purchased from Central Energy Transportation Co. and pipelined from Erath County by Lone Star Gas Co., which is WTU's principal fuel supplier.

"This is only a small amount of gas, considering the total volume used at our eight power stations, but we try to take advantage of every opportunity to reduce our fuel costs," said Walter Meller of Abilene, WTU's manager of System Production.

"Deals like this help offset the higher price we must pay

under our major contract for a dependable, long-range supply of natural gas," Meller explained.

The Central Energy contract runs to September 1985. Total savings to WTU through the term of the contract will be approximately \$13.7 million.

For the past two years WTU has been buying a quantity of cheaper low BTU gas and blending it with pipeline quality gas for use at its Paint Creek Power Station.

Fuel costs have risen sharply every year since the Arab oil embargo of 1983 started the world energy crisis. In recent years, fuel expenses have accounted for at least half of WTU's total annual revenue and for a major portion of customer bills.

All of WTU's existing power plants burn natural gas as a boiler fuel. The Oklahoma Power Station, now under construction near Vernon, will be the Company's first coal-burning plant and also will be the largest plant in the WTU system.

Gym-Dandeez Bring Home The Gold







Microwave Ovens: Cooking Utensils

Today let's take a look at microwave oven cooking utensils. The number of made-for-microwave cooking utensils and accessories is increasing by leaps and bounds! After lagging behind microwave oven sales, manufacturers of these products now realize the potential market for such things as bacon and roasting racks, cupcake or muffin rings, and bundtlike pans and ring molds. It is estimated that the average microwave oven owner spends \$50 for microwave accessories within the first few weeks of microwave oven ownership.

Is this necessary? Only you can say. Each individual or family's lifestyle and presently-owned cookware will determine which, if any of these utensils, you want and/or need.

1. What utensils do I already have that are suitable

for microwave cooking? Most heat-resistant glassware, such as pie plates, cake pans, muffin cups and measuring cups of all sizes, work well. Glass ceramic and stoneware casserole dishes and dinnerware are also convenient to use. Some plastics, paper, wood, and straw items can be used for short heating periods.

2. What cooking functions do I perform that need special made-for-microwave utensils? If you frequently bake bundt-type cakes, a tube pan might be convenient; for bacon lovers, a special bacon rack could simplify the task. Some of these utensils are a good microwave shape and can be used for other cooking. A tube pan is good for casseroles and meat loaf. Be sure whichever ones you choose will stand up under the use you give them - the longer cooking time, the greater the heat, the tougher the utensil required.

3. Where would I store new utensils? Cupboard space is limited in many homes. You may find it necessary to clear out the old,

battered, and unusable cooking utensils to make room for the new. It may also be possible to trade cookware with some of your neighbors or relative who do not have microwave ovens. Trade your conventional utensils for glass or others that are microwave suitable.

4. How much money do I want to spend? Well (and some not-so-well) designed made-for-microwave utensils tend to be somewhat expensive so they should be selected carefully.

5. How versatile is the piece of equipment? Is there more than one use for it? Several casserole dishes have lids that can double as a platter, a cake pan, or a shallow saucer. A muffin pan can be used for cupcakes, individual meat loaves and quiches. Multi-use utensils cut down on the total of items needed which in turn saves both money and space.

6. Is the design of the utensil compatible with microwave cooking patterns (donut being the ideal shape)? Characteristics to check for include: a round shape, rounded corners, and handles and lips for easy handling. The interior surface needs to be smooth and impervious to stains, and of course, the item should be dishwasher safe and durable.

Before you buy a made-for-microwave utensil, check the warranty on the product. See if the company backs up the claims it makes on the carton or in its advertising. When in doubt, buy products from well known companies that have been in business a long time and have reputations to protect.

This completes our series on microwave cooking. I hope you have gained something from it.
