# Texas Voters To Decide On Constitutional Amendments

Absentee voting has been light for the November 5 amendment election, but area voters are reminded to cast their ballots on these issues.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and all Munday voters will vote at the City Hall. James Smith is the presiding judge, with Juanita Nelson assisting. Sunset voters will cast their ballots at the Knox City Community Center, and all other boxes will remain the same.

The Texas Research League has prepared a brief synopsis of each of the amendments to the Texas Constitution on which we will vote next week. In layman's language, these explanations follow.

Voters in Texas will be asked to cast their ballots for or against the following propositions:

1. Authorizing the issuance of an additional \$980 million of general obligation bonds to finance water development, water quality enhancement, water conservation and flood control.

2. Authorizing the issuance of \$200 million of agricultural water conservation bonds.

3. Enabling cities to spend public funds for replacing water lines on private property and to assess the cost against property owners.

4. Permitting proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund.

5. Authorizing the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts.

6. Permitting state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities in other states pursuant to an interstate agreement.

7. Allowing Chambers County to be divided into two to six justice of the peace precincts.

8. Providing \$500 million in additional general obligation bonding authority for the Veterans Land Board to finance more low-interest loans to veterans.

9. Permitting the legislature to provide for the prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of appropriated funds.

10. Authorizing the Veterans Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to create the Farm and Ranch Finance Program to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land.

12. Granting to the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appelate court.

13. Creating the Judicial Districts Board, providing for the reapportionment of district-court districts and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of the courts.

14. Abolishing the office of county treasurer in Andrews and El Paso counties and the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson and Randall

The Munuay Moguls' awesome in the season and 1-2 in district action. The undefeated Moguls now have a one-game lead over their district foes, followed by Throckmorton and Archer City with 2-1 records, Chillicothe and Bryson at 1-2, and Windthorst is in the cellar

DON'T YOU DARE TACKLE ME! says Munday in the Moguls' win, but punished the Eagles through the air with seven completions in seven attempts for 185 yards and several touchdowns.

Munday scored ten touchdowns and a safety in their romp over Chillicothe, racking up almost 600 yards in total offense while holding their opponents to just 101 yards. Mogul quarterback Dent Offutt, a likely candidate for all-state nomi-

nation, was seven for seven in the

passing department for 185 yards. In other individual statistics, Anthony Stinnett rushed 84 yards on two carries and caught a pair of passes for 39 yards. J.B. Jones also had yardage in both rushing and in pass receptions - 60 on the ground and 75 in the air. Todd Thompson ran for 74 yards, Ronny Lowrance for 53, Offutt for 38, Jerry Shields for 32 and Jeff Bruce for 28. Kregg Sanders gained 58 yards on three Offutt passes, and Scotty Jackson gathered in another toss for 13

yards. The Moguls lost no time in getting on the scoreboard. On the first play from scrimmage Offutt lateraled a pass to backup quarterback Anthony Stinnett, who lofted the ball to J.B. Jones. The 75-yard play was good for six points, and Lowrance kicked the extra point with 11:38 showing on the clock.

Three plays netted the Eagles two yards and a five-yard penalty on their first possession, and the punt was returned to the Chillicothe 23. From there a long run by Lowrance set up a two-yard plunge by Jones for his second tally. The point after attempt failed.

The Eagles did manage their first of six first downs on the next series, but were soon forced to punt, and penalties assessed against them helped push Munday down the field along with runs by Thompson and Jones, who made it three in a row at 5:24 in the first quarter. Offutt ran the ball in for the two-point conversion to make the score 21-0.

Beginning on their 24, the Eagles drove just across midfield before another penalty and Munday's defensive strength stopped them. The Moguls were on the Chillicothe 6 when J.B. Jones lost control of the ball and Chillicothe recovered. But it was a costly move for the Eagles, as they fumbled in the endzone and Munday took the two-point safety. Later in the period, Lowrance capped a five-play drive with a twoyard shove across the goal, then kicked the PAT.

Kregg Sanders set the stage for the next score by sacking Eagle quarterback Bluford Jones. Jones' next running attempt lost three yards and the Eagles punted. Offutt promptly fired a 30-yard scoring pass to Sanders, and with the successful PAT, Munday led 37-0 at

The Moguls were flat to begin the second half, losing a fumble and having to punt for their first and only time in the ballgame. But at 4:37 in the third period, Offutt again found a big target in Sanders, who scored his second touchdown. After another dismal series by the


Ditto lead their attack. The Wildcats have plenty of returning starters and good experience, as they have been in the playoffs before. We will have to play well to keep our string intact.
