

# Munday Men Attend TFO Board Of Directors Meet

Congressman Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls was highly praised in a resolution adopted Saturday at a meeting of the Board of Directors of Texas Farmers Union. The meeting of 40 directors and county presidents who compose the Board of the general farm organization unanimously endorsed a statement expressing appreciation to Congressman Purcell for his leadership in the House Agriculture Committee. Purcell, chairman of the Livestock and Grains Subcommittee, is the sponsor of the farm legislation endorsed by a 33-member Coalition of farm groups including Farmers Union.

The resolution stated: "The farmers of Texas owe Congressman Purcell a great debt of gratitude for his distinguished leadership on the House Agriculture Committee and his unrelenting determination to pass a farm program that will increase income to farmers and strengthen the economy in the rural communities."

"Congressman Purcell has demonstrated true statesmanship in his fight to preserve in the farm programs the fundamental principles that are essential to make the programs beneficial to farmers and to give our nation's consumers the assurance of an abundance of reasonably priced food and fiber. These basic principles include parity prices, a supply management program for farm commodities, and a loan program that will give farmers bargaining power."

In related action, the farm organization managing board adopted a strong resolution endorsing the Coalition of farm organizations and its ten-point statement setting forth the minimum essentials which must be included in an acceptable farm program.

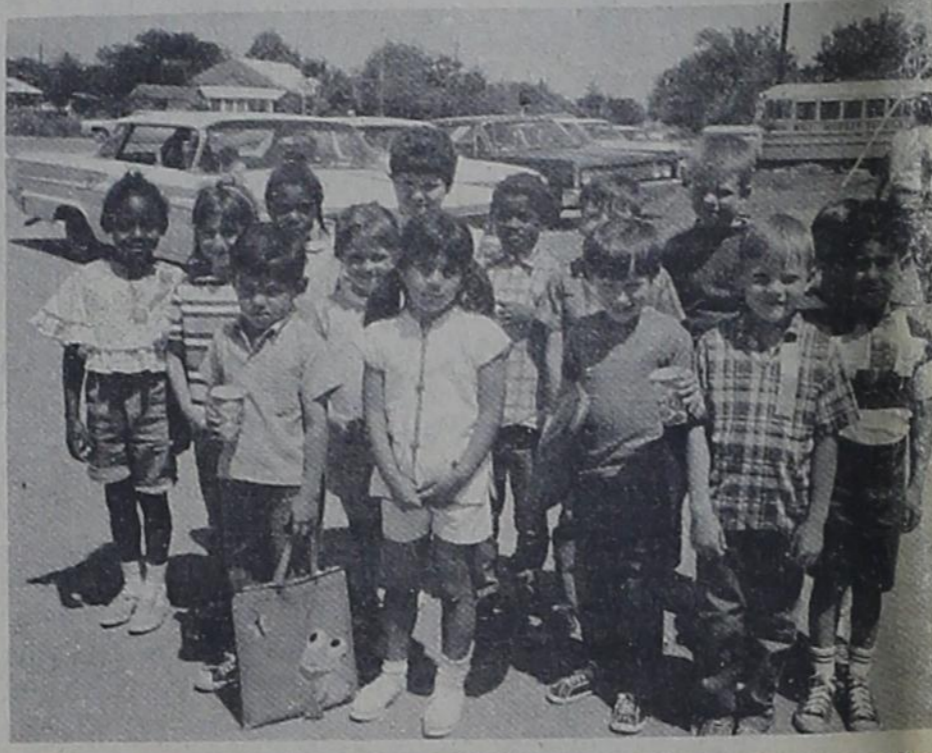

# Cure Leads In Munday Polls; Loses In Precinct By 3 Votes

Races drawing more interest from Munday voters were the contest for Commissioner, Precinct No. 4 and State Representative District 80.

For Commissioner, Precinct 4, J. Omar Cure led in both North and South voting polls. North polls recorded 128 for Cure and 92 for incumbent George Nix. South polls turned in 116 for Cure and 61 for Nix. Nix eked by Cure 31 votes in the Precinct with the final tally, George Nix 263 and J. Omar Cure 331.

The other race between W. S. (Bill) Healy and Leon Williams for State Representative 80th District also drew much interest with Munday voters going strong for Healy. North box polled 170 votes for Healy and 38 for Williams while South polls turned in 133 for Healy and 39 for Williams. Bill Healy emerged victorious in the State 943 to 451.

Farmers Union on record in opposition of "set-aside programs, backdoor soil banks, and other programs that will destroy parity concepts, supply management, and a loan program." The statement unequivocally pledged Texas Farmers Union to oppose all programs not including these basic essentials, even if this action results in a stalemate and no new farm program.

According to Texas Farmers Union state President Jay Naman, "The 40 directors and county presidents representing farmers and ranchers from across the state unanimously demonstrated their support for the resolution by a standing vote. This action clearly showed that farmers are willing to forego a new farm program if the only alternative is one that does not assure at least the minimum income of the present program."

### It's Your Community How Do You Want It? Dead Or Alive?

Not long ago, I was traveling down the road, and my path took me within a few miles of a little community where I once lived when I was in Junior High School. I was not in too big a hurry, so I pulled off the pavement, and drove down to this little community. And did I get a big surprise.

At the time I lived there, there were two stores, a lodge, a station, two churches, and a depot as well as a number of houses. How much of all this do you suppose was still left? Not a single thing, and I mean just that. All I could see was a field. The whole thing was gone, even the rails had been taken up, where the track and the trains had run. Can you imagine how I felt? I had to even look carefully to decide where the old store and the post office had once stood.

This gives one a terribly sad feeling. I just can't get over the entire community having been torn down. I drove a mile and a half down the road where the old house, with the big fireplace was in which our family lived, and there too, I just had to try to imagine where the old house had stood.

Now, how do you suppose you would feel, if you got up some morning, and drove down to the downtown area of Munday, and there was not a thing but an open pasture? No grocery store, no dry goods stores, no filling stations - nothing at all - except emptiness? What would you think?

Well, this you may see, sooner than you even think, unless you do something to help prevent it.

Every time you go out of town to buy something you can get from a Munday store, you are casting a vote to close up the local store. And these votes count up faster than you may think, too.

Perhaps there is not a store in town, but what at one time or another in recent years has not wondered as it counted up the expenses, whether or not it could remain solvent, and pay the bills, and continue to operate. And this definitely includes the Munday Times. Many weeks our expenses are larger than the receipts and we are made to wonder, if there may not be a Friday morning soon that you will go to the Post Office and find, rather than a paper, a notice saying "Sorry, we had to close down - not enough business to keep going".

Or, are we mistaken? Do you really care if Munday continues

as a community or not? Are the people of the community really interested in the grocery store, the hardware store, the lumber yard, the car dealers, the cafes, the filling stations, the feed store, the drug store, and yes, even the school and the City Hall, staying here and open for your convenience?

The people in the community are the community and only they can make it a better community. You can do something to make Munday a better community, but you can't do it, giving out-of-town businesses preference over the home town merchants.

### Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

More than 500,000 children will swallow poison this year in the United States and 90 percent of all cases reported will involve children under the age of five.

The tragedy of the situation, says the Texas State Department of Health, is that most all accidental poisonings are preventable.

Why are young children the greatest victims of accidental poisoning? The pre-school child has an inquisitive nature. Closets and cupboards are great places to hide and investigate. A child will taste, bite and swallow anything he can reach, and teething time calls for chewing on furniture, toys and window sills.

At about the age of two, a child takes to "mountain climbing," using chairs, tables or stools to open medicine cabinets and any other reachable places. Accidental poisonings don't just happen. They take a special mixture of factors which normally have a formula which reads: A contributing thing, plus a contributing surrounding, plus a contributing individual. The result of this formula is poisoning.

Many of us are unaware of the potential dangers of medicines and other household substances. Even salt and pepper may produce an injurious or deadly effect when used in large amounts. A five-year-old youngster in

"Resources and Renewal", the theme of this year's observance, underscores the responsibility which each citizen has in dealing forthrightly with current issues involving stewardship of renewable natural resources. The Wichita Brazos Conservation District and some 3000 companion districts throughout the nation along with their state and national associations are sponsoring the event for the sixteenth consecutive year.

Among the local events designed to encourage widespread recognition of Soil Stewardship Week are stewardship programs presented to the Knox City and Munday Lions Club by the Soil Conservation Service. The WBCK will distribute booklets created particularly for this year's observance of churches of all faiths in the district.

The booklets were prepared by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in consultation with a Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee composed of leading church men in the nation. The committee consists of the Rev. E. W. Muller, Lutheran Council in the USA; the Rt. Rev. John George Weber, National Catholic Rural Life Conference; the Rev. Harold S. Huff, Methodist Church; Henry A. McCanna, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; and Dr. C. Wilson Brum-

ley, Southern Baptist Convention. Members of the Wichita Brazos Conservation District Stewardship Committee are L. D. Offutt, Jack Idol, W. L. Ballard, Emil Navratil, and Tiffen Mayfield.

Featured speakers will include Dr. T. D. Tanksley, Associate Professor of Animal Science and Extension Animal Husbandman at Texas A&M University; Norman Brints of Vernon, Extension Area Farm Management Specialist; Jim Humphreys of Guthrie, Manager of the Pitchfork Land and Cattle Co.; and Charles Graf, Vernon swine producer.

Also, Carl Black and Dr. Don Brother, Paducah swine producers; R. D. Brown of Vernon, President of the First State Bank; J. L. Hill of Stamford, Rolling Plains Production Credit Association; and a representative of the Farmers Home Administration. Closing remarks will be made by J. Fike Godfrey of Spur with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Sponsoring the conference will be the West Texas and Vernon Chambers of Commerce, Rolling Plains Pork Producers Association, Rolling Plains Economic Program, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas A&M University.

Everyone in Knox County who is interested in swine production should make plans to attend this important conference.

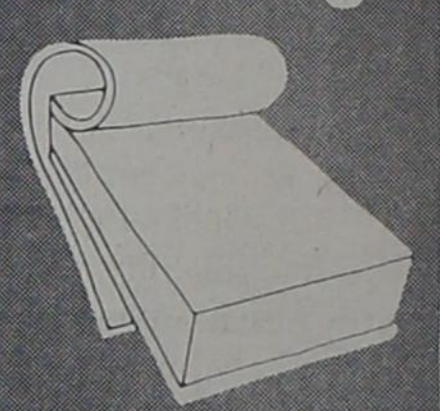

SWINE PRODUCTION CONFAB SLATED FOR MAY 8 AT VERNON

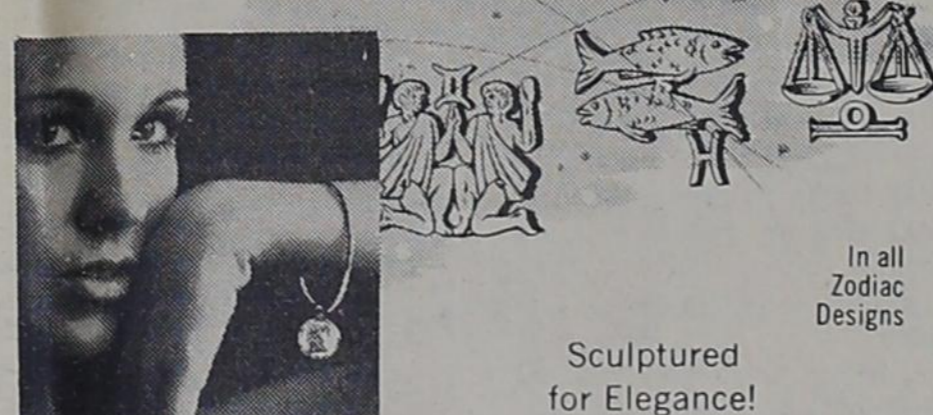
The swine business is growing by "leaps and bounds" in the Rolling Plains and from the looks of things, it will continue to expand rapidly during the coming months.

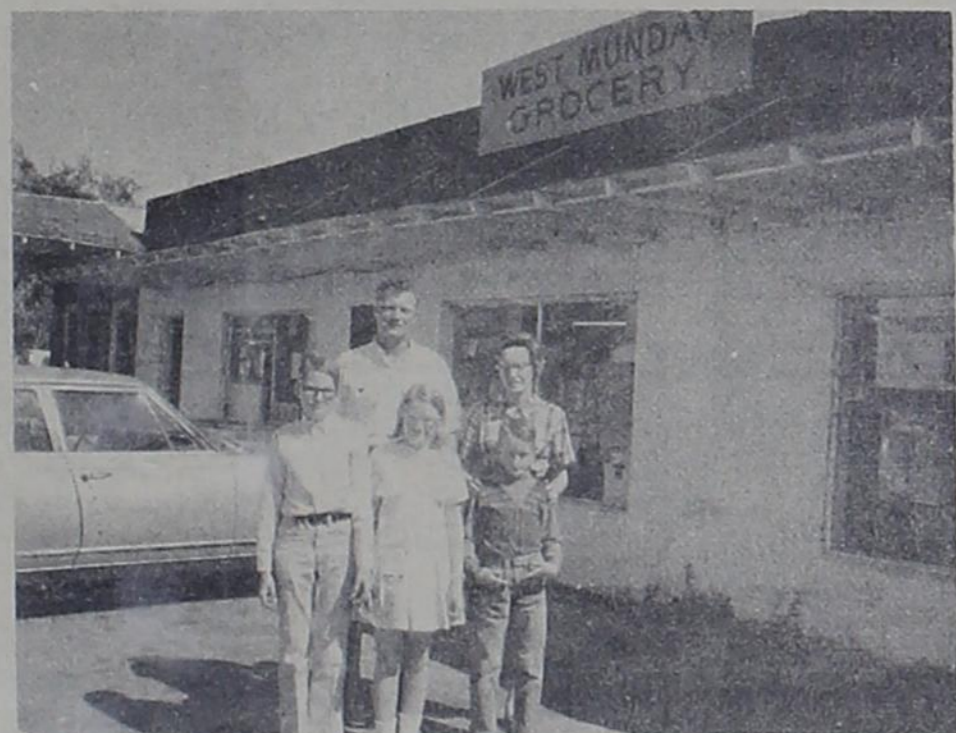

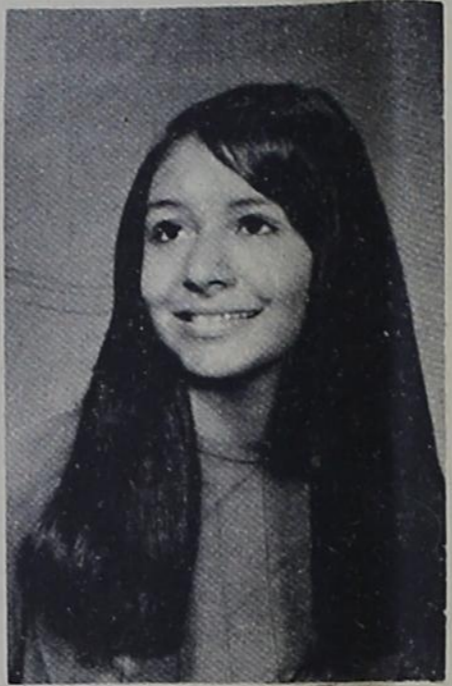

### Former Teacher Honored At Tech

Knox City - A former Munday resident and teacher, Mrs. Elizabeth F. Smith, State Director of Homemaking Education, Texas Educational Agency in Austin, was one of three outstanding women honored during Ideas and Issues Day Saturday, April 24 by students, ex-students, and faculty of the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. The three, Mrs. Smith, Mrs. Florence Wilkinson Low, and Dr. Bernice Milburn Moore were recognized at the noon luncheon meeting for their contributions to Home Economics in the state and the nation.

Mrs. Smith is director, Division of Homemaking Education, Department of Occupational Education and Technology, Texas Education Agency. Other positions have been high school homemaking teacher, executive secretary of the State Nutrition Council, county home demonstration agent, and area consultant for homemaking education with Texas Education Agency.

She is the recipient of special awards and recognitions from the National Association of Vocational Home Economics Teachers, Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America, State Association of Young Homemakers of Texas, and Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association of Texas.

Mrs. Smith directs Texas Vocational Homemaking Education programs which are designed to prepare individuals for the occupation of homemaking and for

gainful employment in occupations requiring home economics knowledge and skills. Also under her direction are the programs of the Texas Association of Future Homemakers of America and the State Association of Young Homemakers of Texas. She works with all Texas colleges and universities approved to prepare teachers for vocational homemaking education. Currently, 2172 high school homemaking teachers, working with both youth and adults are employed in 954 school districts. In cities and junior colleges, 51 teachers are employed to work with adults only.

As a member of Texas Education Agency Task Forces, Mrs. Smith is active in early childhood education and curriculum development for nutrition education. She serves, or has served, as representative for policy and planning, curriculum development, and adult and youth leadership in numerous national conferences, workshops, and committees. These include the Heartland White House Conference on Children and Youth; and the national project for identifying concepts and generalizations - their place in high school home economics curriculum development.

Others include the Workshop on Utilization and Training of Auxiliary Personnel in Home Economics, and the Policy and Planning Council of the American Vocational Association. Primary consideration has been given recently to new guidelines for Consumer and Homemaking Education provided for by the Vocational Education Amendments of 1968.

Mrs. Smith is currently serving as a member of the Public Information Committee for the National Association of Home Economics in the American Home Economics Association. She is treasurer of the National Association of State Supervisors of Home Economics; is the advisor to the president of the National Vocational Home Economics Association; a member of the 1970 Home Economics Advisory Council at Texas Tech University.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith are former residents of Munday. Elizabeth taught homemaking in the Munday High School and C. H. was employed by the First National Bank.

## Brazos River Authority Fights Air Pollution

The Brazos River Authority, since the mid-fifties, has carried out a multi-pronged program to protect the environment of the Brazos Basin against both natural and man-made pollution. Carson Hoge, director of planning and development for the Authority, told an Earth Day Seminar at Baylor University recently.

And, Hoge said, the Authority has expanded its activities in this area substantially in the last several years, especially in the field of guarding the ecology of Brazos Basin streams against man-made pollution, and "there is every reason to believe this program will be increased as future needs dictate."

Hoge listed three major sources of pollution threats to the quality of water in the Braz-

os River, two of them man-made:

1. The most critical water quality problem in the Brazos Basin is caused by natural salt pollution which enters the Salt Fork of the Brazos from tributaries in the area of Stonewall, King, Kent and Dickens Counties. Hoge said the flows from these tributary streams are small but at times the salt content is five times greater than that of sea water.

2. One of the earliest, and still one of the most serious, potential sources of threat to water quality in the Brazos is from activities associated with the oil industry, the flow of brine, crude oil and other materials from abandoned and unplugged oil wells, of which the ownership is unknown.

3. The third major threat to Brazos River water quality is from a second man-made source, the effluent and wastes from the rapidly developing urban and industrial areas on the main Brazos and some of its major tributaries.

Hoge said the Authority's program, for guarding the quality of water in the Brazos River, has included special aspects individually tailored for each of the water quality threats and that the Authority also cooperates with state and federal agencies in a continuing survey and inspection of the water quality of the Brazos and its tributaries to find and correct the source of pollutants.

"Since the mid-fifties," Hoge said, "the Authority has carried out an aggressive program aimed at developing a solution to the natural salt pollution source in the upper section of the Brazos Basin."

"The Authority has in recent years enlisted the aid of the Federal Water Quality Administration, the Texas Water Development Board and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers in studies directed toward development of facilities that will provide for substantial alleviation of this problem," Hoge said.

The Authority has been studying this problem since about 1955 and terms it the

greatest pollution problem on the Brazos.

In the field of guarding against man-made pollution, Hoge said the Authority is at present initiating construction of an area-wide regional sewerage treatment system to serve six cities in the Waco Metropolitan Area and is either making or cooperating in studies to develop plans for control and treatment of sewage wastes in four other major urban and industrial areas.

The studies are being made for the Bryan-College Station Metropolitan Area, the Temple-Belton-Killeen Metropolitan Area, the planning area of the West Central Texas Council of Governments, centered on Abilene, and the Sugar Land sub-area of the Houston-Galveston Metropolitan Complex. These studies also include the immediate watersheds of Somerville, Belton and Stillhouse Hollow Reservoirs.

The sewerage treatment system being constructed for the Waco Metropolitan Area will be built, owned and operated by the Brazos River Authority. The study for the system was made by the Authority at the request of the six major cities in the Waco Complex. The central system will replace two sewage treatment plants now in existence and will eliminate the necessity for construction of two others in the metropolitan area. The system will gather and efficiently treat the wastes from a population estimated at 135,000, almost 95 percent of the population of the entire Greater Waco Area, in which it is located.

In the effort to prevent pollution from abandoned oil wells, the Authority cooperates with the Texas Railroad Commission in the location and plugging of these lost-identity wells throughout the Basin.

In addition to the three major activities in its anti-pollution program, Hoge said the Authority has cooperated for many years with the United States Geological Survey and other state and federal agencies in a continuing study of the Brazos through a network of gaging and sampling stations, which furnished the water quantity and quality data so necessary to proper water resource management.

One of the newest moves of the Authority to guard the quality of the Brazos waters has been made in cooperation with the Texas Water Quality Board. The Authority, Hoge said, has become concerned with possible pollution of its lakes by sources connected with lakeshore developments. It has, with the help of the Texas Water Quality Board, initiated a program whereby the Texas Water Quality Board would adopt regulations for control of individual waste disposal facilities around Lake Granbury, the Authority's newest lake on the Brazos. Public hearings have been held and the Board adopted the order on April 24 subject to the concurrence of the State Health Department. Under this order, the Brazos River Authority will be responsible, as an agent of the Water Quality Board, for licensing and controlling septic tanks around the Lake.

"Although the Authority may act as an agent of the Water Quality Board, it does not carry out an independent enforcement program," Hoge said. "The Authority does cooperate on a day to day basis with both the Railroad Commission and the Water Quality Board in the administration and enforcement of the state's water quality laws and regulations."

"We are not resting on the work that has been or is being done to control pollution of the Brazos water," Hoge said. "We are even now starting a program which will eventually develop a comprehensive basin-wide plan for all overall water quality management program. It is anticipated that this study will be carried out with the cooperation of the Texas Water Quality Board and the Federal Water Quality Administration, and will provide a framework and guide for water quality management decisions and activities . . . at all levels of government within the basin."

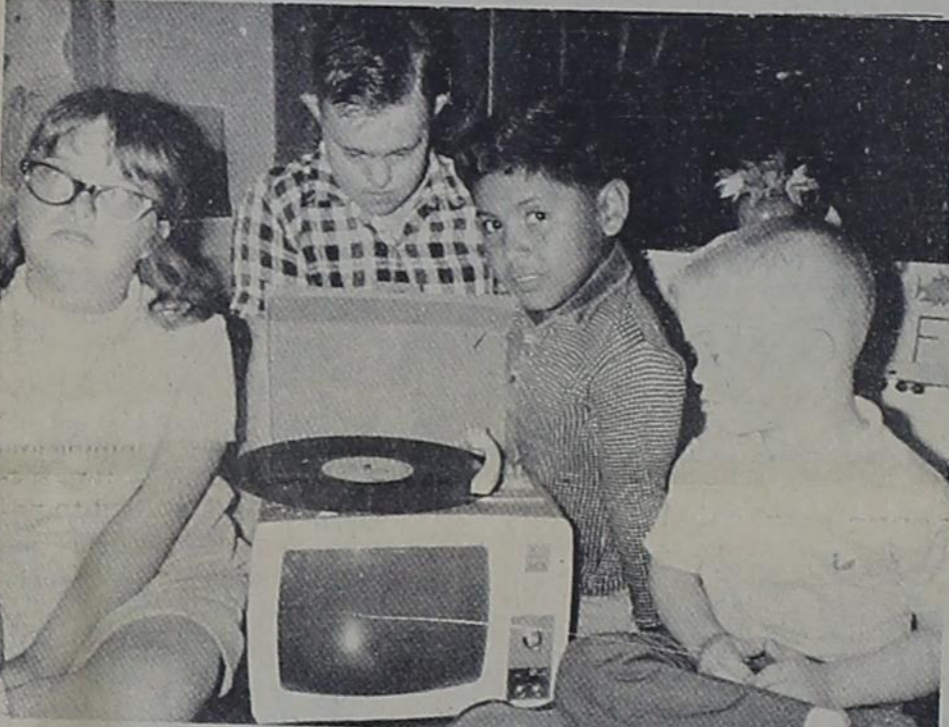
