

Oil Showing Found In Wildcat Test North of Rayland

Gilbert's No. 1 Robert Weekley, about one and a half miles north of Rayland, continued to show oil Tuesday as stuck drillstem was removed from the hole. The showing was found in a porous lime formation at 3,867 feet.

As soon as the drillstem can be cleared from the hole, Mr. Gilbert plans to run a drillstem test or an electrical survey in the hole also indicated that drilling might be continued a few more feet into the formation.
