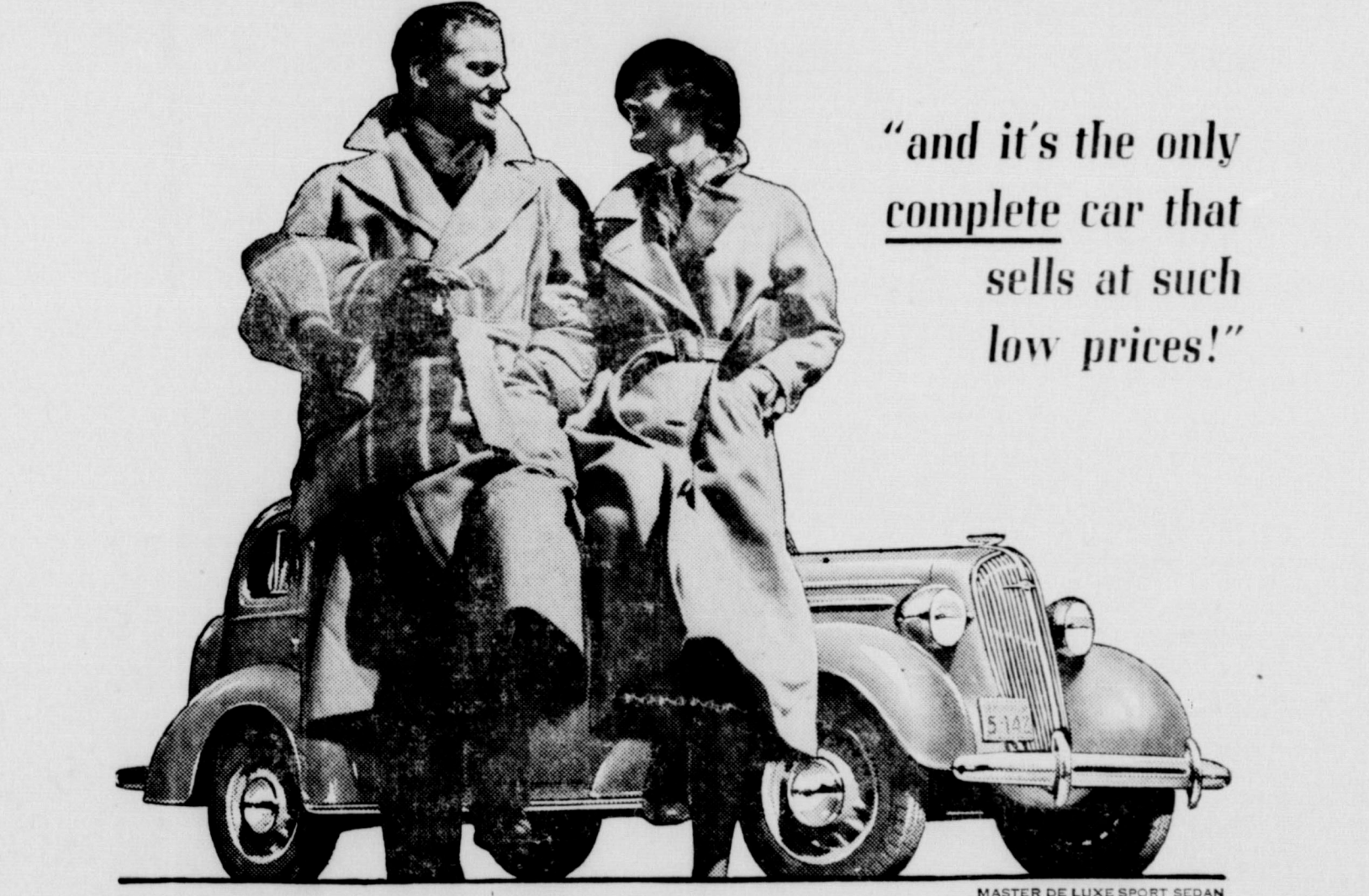

Texas Farmers Pay 25% on Last Year's Resettlement Loans

The Resettlement Administration is rapidly completing plans for the program in 1936. According to A. W. Burkett, supervisor of Hardeman and Foard counties, loans for the month of December averaged \$340.00 per family. The money is usually for the purchase of teams, tools and supplies which the borrowers can not obtain through any other agency. Loans are repayable in cash in one to five years. In Texas as a whole 25% of the loans made last year have already been repaid.

In addition to loans, grants to be repaid in work were made during November and December to 114 families in Hardeman and Foard counties, the average grant being \$20.00 per family. Grants were made for subsistence while farm and home management plans are being worked out upon which loans are to be based at a later date.

CHILI PEPPER POWDER IS HIGH IN VITAMIN A

It is through liberal use of chili pepper powder as a seasoning that Mexicans get much of their vitamin A requirement, says the Bureau of Home Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture. Mexican diet, because of its apparent lack of vitamin A, was a puzzle to nutritionists until someone suggested chili powder. Most peppers are known to be good sources of vitamin A.

For vitamin tests, the Bureau used the particular variety of pepper (chili ancho Colorado) most extensively dried and ground for chili powder. These peppers formerly were imported into this country from Mexico, but are now successfully grown in Southern California. They do not do well, however, in New Mexico and Texas.

Preliminary tests indicate the vitamin A content of air-dry chili pepper is very high—two to three times that of a good grade of butter.

That the automobile buying habits of a nation can be changed, and that the liberal and aggressive use of newspaper advertising is one effective way of changing them, is evident from the experience of the Chevrolet Motor Company, according to W. E. Holler, its vice president and general sales manager, who cited an array of sales records dating back to the new car announcement Nov. 2, 1935, by way of proving his point.

Although Mr. Holler's comment was occasioned by the recent used car selling achievements of Chevrolet dealers, it applies with equal force, he said, to their new car activities. The early announcement of new models, coupled with wide use of advertising pointing to the advantages of early purchase, resulted in the case of Chevrolet in a complete upset of the old order—a complete reversal of the industry's experience in the past, when November and December were two of the quietest months of the entire year.

"The Chevrolet Motor Company," said Mr. Holler, "had every reason to believe that, economic conditions being favorable, the public stands as ready to buy in the fall as it does in the spring. "In preparing for its early announcement, Chevrolet banked on its ability, by means of advertising and showings, to convince the buying public of the benefits it would derive by buying new cars in November and December. As we pointed out, the early buyer insures against cold-weather driving troubles, by obtaining a mechanical unit that is new throughout. Further, such an investment is sound from the economic standpoint, for the car bought in the winter remains a current model longer than the car purchased in the spring.

Game Reserve Open To Archers in Oregon

Unique among game reservations is the Canyon Creek Archer's Game Reserve maintained by the United States Forest Service in the Malheur National Forest, Ore. This is an established refuge for wild game, but was opened to hunting for devotees of archery by the 1935 Oregon State Legislature. Archers are credited with being good sportsmen. Those who prefer to hunt with the long bow instead of high-powered rifles should find another Sherwood Forest on the Malheur, says the Forest Service. Headquarters are at John Day, Ore.

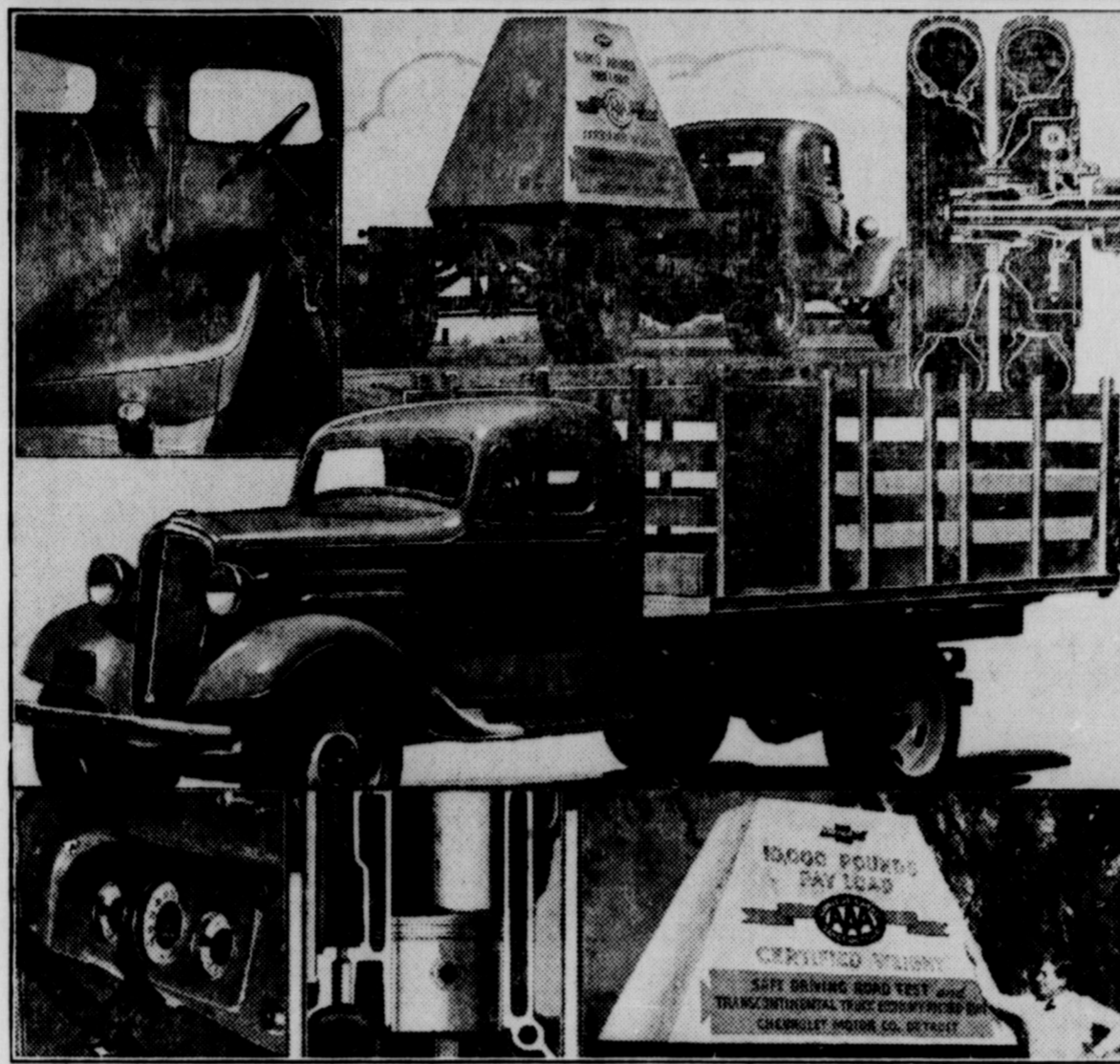
