Forms for application for payment of soldier bonus arrived Fri-day, according to information re-ceived from John E. Long, adjutant of the Gordon J. Ford Post of the American Legion. By early Monday morning 25 applicants had already filled out the forms for the bonus.

An office for those in charge of the bonus applications has been installed in the Bursey-Long Implement Company and applicants must appear there to fill in the

C. B. Graham, service officer of the American Legion post, and John E. Long, adjutant, are in charge of the forms for bonus payment here.

The forms require the applicants to furnish the adjusted-service certificates (pink slips), their full name with date and place of birth, and an identification by the army, navy or marine service, giving date of entering and leaving the service in the form of a discharge. The form also requires the finger prints of the right hand of the ex-service men.
