## FARM LOANS AVAILABLE AT **COURT HOUSE**

Farmers Who are Able To Borrow Money Not Eligible

Application for emergency crop loans for 1936 are now being re-

be made only to farmers who can-Farm Credit Administration. Pall bearers were Z. P. Pilgreen, money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1936 crops and in no instance may exceed \$200 to one farmer.

or other concern. Farmers will also be considered ineligible if they have an application pending with Resettlement Administration, have received assistance from that organization this year or are in debted to the Resettlement Ad-ministration for an unpaid loan.

As in the past, the security for an emergency crop loan will consist of a first lien on the crop financed. Landlord or others having an interest in the crop to be financed will be required to waive their claims in favor of a lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the emergency crop loan is repaid.



If the Delinquent City Taxes are not paid, the City Council will be forced to take more extreme measures.
