Prospects for a million-bushel wheat crop in Foard County next spring and summer were greatly boosted this week when over 2.65 inches of rain fell in the county. This rain practically assures a

good wheat crop. More precipitation has been re-ceived in the county during Jan-uary and the first half of February, than during the same period of any year since 1913. Over 1,000,000 bushels of wheat

was harvested in the county in 1919 and farmers state that the crop that year was the best in the history of the county.

Foard County harvested more than one million bushels of wheat last year, and the soil has a better under-ground season now than at this time last year. One wheat farmer said that prospects were better at this time of the year than he had ever seen, as he believed that this year has as much promise as 1919.
