# FOARD COUNTY **EX-SOLDIERS** TO GET \$93,000.00

### Payment Marks End Of Prolonged Legislation

A large portion of \$93,000 in "baby" bonds due World War veterans of Foard County arrived at Crowell on the 12:22 p. m. train Monday and delivery of the bonus money began immediately afterwards at the post office.

Bonds for 91 veterans were received at Crowell Monday noon and by mid-afternoon more than 70 of the veterans had received their money. Although the deliv-ery of the bonds had been formerly announced at 6 o'clock, news of their early arrival traveled rapid-

Approximately 150 veterans of this county were entitled to bonus money. Between 25 and 30 of the bonds went to Thalia, 15 to 18 to Foard City and 8 to 10 to Margaret, Alva Spencer, local postmaster, estimated.

Although the special letters were marked with the pre-caution to deliver to the "ad-dressee only," Mr. Spencer said that there had been little difficulty in identifying the veterans.

To those who wished the cash for the bonds receipts were given Thirteen Crowellites, members of a one-act drama, "Memories," to the veterans. In order to cash the play in Dallas at the National Folk Festival which is being held at the Texas Centennial all this week. The Festival started Sundary June 14.

Veterans who received their mail on rural routes obtained their special delivery letters carrying bonus money Tuesday. They likewise had to be identified by the carrier before they were allowed to have the "baby" bonds.

Bonus money will be used for various and sundry reasons, according to the veterans, themselves. Some plan to cash them immediately and pay off obligations, others plan to buy homes, furniture and other long-wanted comforts and luxuries, and others plan to keep the bonds and allow them Foard History to draw three per cent interest.

After all the bonus bonds have been distributed, it is estimated that a face value of \$1,900,000,-000 would go to 3,500,000 erans. Approximately 38,000,000 fifty-dollar bonds will be issued to ex-World War soldiers. This distribution is the United States

The payment of the bonus ended legislative drive begun shortly after the war to pay the soldiers. It was vetoed by every president from Coolidge to Roosevelt, inclusive, but was finally passed over the veto. Several treks were made to Washington by ex-World. War soldiers in behalf of the pay-ment of the soldiers' bonus.

Financiers have predicted that most of the bond money will be placed in immediate circulation in spite of many warnings to the vet-





Q. Payments will be based upon need as required by law?

A. Yes. Payments will not on-ly be based upon need but upon the amount of need. Old people who need more money will receive larger grants than those whose needs require less.
Q. Is it true that after the first

job of investigating the 190,000 applications, the operating expenses of the Commission will be paid by the Federal Government?

A. Yes. We believe that a large part, if not all, of the actual costs of operation-after the 190,000 applications have been investigated—will be paid by the U. S. Government. CREATION OF PETROLEUM ANTEDOTES ANIMAL LIFE

Oil is of inorganic origin, having been made by the interaction of certain elements inside the earth's crust while that body was aging into its present condition. Another theory is that it is of organic origin. This latter is the most generally accepted and it has the bulk of evidence to support it even though most of it is circumstantial. According to this theory oil was formed through an unusual and gradual breaking up of vast amounts of organic matter. Some of this organic matter was plant life but most of it was animal and microscopic animal life at that.

Knowing the countless billions of gallons of petroleum that have been taken from the earth and knowing of the billions of gallons that still remain in the subterranean reservoirs this might seem a bit incredible. But that is because we are unable to realize the extent of a million years or the number of animals that can live

and die during that time. The process which eventually led to the creation of petsoleum started hundreds of millions of years before the first blade of grass grew or before the first bit of animal life moved about on dry land .- Pathfinder Magazine.



Moving Freezing Point

Water will freeze when inclosed in a vacuum; it will freeze at a point 1 1-100 of a degree higher than the ordinary freezing point. To freeze, water must expand. By placing a great pressure upon it and limiting its expansion, it is possible to reduce the freezing point. Experimenters have kept it from freezing, by this method, until it was several degrees below the zero of the Fahrenheit scale. Correspondingly, by reducing the normal pressure on the water expansion is freer and the freezing point is raised. The atmosphere pressure being comparatively slight, the creation of a vacuum serves to raise the freezing point only a small fraction of a degree.





### Queen's Portrait on Stamps

The portrait of Queen Victoria graced all Grenadine postage stamps from 1861 until 1899, when the design was changed for the first time. This British colony in the West Indies lies at the southern tip of the string of islands forming the Windward group. The three important islands are Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent and Grenada and a number of small islands in the Grenadine chain. They really form distinct colonies, since they all maintain their own institutions. They are, however, united under one governor-general who resides at Saint George's, located on Grenada. The name of the group comes from their position, being more exposed to the trade winds of the reighboring seas. Grenada, including all the small islands has a to-tal area of 133 square miles. The soil and climate are favorable for agriculture, and many tropical products are raised. Sugar, cotton, arrowroot, corpa, cocoa, and spices being the principal crops.

It signifies the pioneering spirit so colorfully written in the pages of Texas history. 



# NO RATTLE PROVIDED FOR THE BABY RATTLESNAKES

rattlesnake has no rattle. Biologists of the United States Department of Agriculture say the young rattler has a button on the end of ts tail at birth. Within a few days it sheds its skin; in 2 months it sheds its skin again, and then the first ring of the rattle appears. Shortly after these snakes are born

which the rings of the rattle form. When a rattler sheds, all the skin comes off entirely, wrong side out-all except the part that covers the cap on the tail, which cannot come off because of the shape. This part of the skin, however, is dislodged and moves backward to become an additional ring on the rattle. The rattling noise is made by these rings of dry skin jiggling around when the snake vibrates his shaker. The biologists say a


