Drew Pearson and McMullen (sports writer) were the most widely read newspaper writers.

Maureen Daly was the favorite writer of fiction listed by the largest number of girls, and Will James received the greatest number of votes from the boys.

The fiction book most popular among the girls was Seventeenth Summer by Maureen Daly and fiction choices of the boys were listed as "horse books."

The non-fiction writer with the most votes from both girls and boys was Frank Gilbreth Jr. and Cheaper by the Dozen and Bells on their Toes were chosen as favorite non-fiction books by a majority of the students.

Outside work was the reason checked by most students for not doing more outside reading with heavy school assignments a close second.

When asked, "If you could subscribe to one magazine only, which would it be?" the overwhelming response was The Saturday Evening Post. Following it in order were Seventeen, Life and Look.

The Fort Worth Star Telegram received the majority vote for favorite newspaper. The Foard County News was second with the Wichita Falls Record News and Wichita Daily Times third and fourth, respectively.

The comics was the newspaper part read most frequently. Other popular features were front page news, sports and picture features, the Wildcat. Few of the students

were attracted by the editorials. Dick Tracy was the favorite comic strip with Mutt and Jeff and Blondie in second and third places respectively.

About one-third of the pupils stated that they read comic books frequently. The majority of the students read them occasionally, and a few said not at all. Freshmen reading of comic books was stronger than that of the upper classmen and boys higher than girls.

GASOLINE IS CHEAPER

Harold Fleming has written a factual study of the effect of competition on oil prices. As "proof of the pudding," he takes gasoline, which is the oil industry's principle product and the one used in largest quantity by individual consumers.

Since 1925, we all know, the price charged for practically everything we buy has greatly increased. In many cases it has doubled and tripled. Yet in the summer of 1925 the average price of gasoline, not counting the state and federal taxes over which the industry has no control, was 21.93 cents a gallon. The average price some 26 years later, less taxes, was 20.31 cents.

So the price charged for our gasoline, before these taxes, has not increased. And today's gas is a very different product than the gas of 1925. According to the engineers, it has been improved at least 50 per cent — in performance, miles-per-gallon under comparable conditions, and in other ways. Today's motorist can get about the same service from two gallons of fuel costing 42 cents before taxes as his father did from

three gallons costing 66 cents in 1925.

This is the result of research and competition, which has forced everyone in the oil industry to provide a better, more economical product. Mr. Fleming summed up his findings on the price of gasoline in these words: "Even with the increased taxes it would be hard to find a bigger bargain among all the things that Americans eat, wear or use."

An injunction preventing operation in Texas of a union tagged subversive by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has been dissolved. It is a sharp setback in the fight against unions accused of being communist-dominated.

District Judge Charles O. Betts declared in lifting the injunction, "Texas laws do not prohibit a communist-dominated union from doing business in Texas. I can't legislate in this court."

All of which means that there will be a concerted drive by the opponents of communism to pass an anti-communist law at the next regular or special session of the legislature.

State attorneys served notice of appeal from the decision. Judge Betts continued in effect, however, a temporary injunction against Emanuel Coutlakis to restrain him from organizing labor for the union involved, the International Fur and Leather Workers.

In this action, the judge backed Shepperd's charge that Coutlakis had not submitted proper credentials to receive an organizer's permit from the secretary of state, and that the union had failed to file certain records with the secretary of state as required by Texas law.

Union attorneys presented evidence before Judge Betts showing that the required records had been filed since issuance of the injunction.

An air of expectancy is beginning to form as the time for decisions in the governor's race draw near.

Governor Allan Shivers declared he would announce his future political plans "some time after the first of the year," but he added, "I can't say how long after."

Shivers said he knew nothing of the plans of House Speaker Reuben Senterfit, Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Congressman Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr., of McAllen, and Houston Mayor Roy Hofheinz, all of whom have been mentioned as candidates for governor.

A series of local organization meetings will be held by Texas Young Democrats during January. They will elect delegates to a state convention to be held in Mineral Wells February 26-27.

A state committee representing the two factions of the Young Demos promised recognition of all clubs which hold open meetings. Both factions were denied seats

at a national convention recently held at St. Paul, Minn.

Governor Shivers may soon face the question of whether to call a special session of the Legislature to again tackle the problem of raising teacher salaries.

A subcommittee representing the governor and the Texas State Teachers Association has unanimously approved a compromise plan to give teachers \$402 more per year.

If the full 25-member committee endorses the plan when it meets January 19, the special session issue will be in the governor's lap.

More than 88 per cent of school administrators are reported as favoring the plan.

But even if legislators also favored the plan, the lawmakers will still face the problem of finding money for the pay increase.

However, if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds the gas tax law, the pay increase problem will be solved.

Estimated cost of the pay increase, to the state, based on an 80 per cent share, is nearly \$23 million. Local school districts would pay 20 per cent, instead of a fixed total of \$45 million per year.

State assistance on construction costs of about 20 per cent is calculated by giving each district \$100 credit per teacher against their local fund assignment.

Superintendent Henry Stilwell of Texarkana, a teacher representative, said he hoped a special session could act in time to give teachers the raise for the current school year.

State tax officials were a little more hopeful over the revenue outlook as the Railroad Commission boosted the January oil allowable, halting a five-months decline.

Texas oil quotas for January were hiked by 29,443 barrels daily. Resumption of full production in the Spraberry area of Texas will provide the increase.

These wells had been limited to curb gas flaring, but now pipelines will be available to them.

An allowable reduction of 8,000 barrels daily in five months has cost the state more than \$1 million in taxes.

Concerning the outlook for 1954, Commissioner Olin Callison asked refiners to help a "worse situation" in gas than already exists.

He said that gasoline still may be "dangerously high" April unless corrective steps taken now. He asked refiners take the lead in reducing the plus.

Short Snorts: Governor Shivers will attend the Rice-Alabama Cotton Bowl game in Dallas on Year's Day. He named Elmer E. Box of Lubbock as his official representative at the January Gator Bowl game in Jacksonville, Fla., when Texas Tech plays Auburn.

The State Board of Insurance Commissioners will early in 1954 on a request for a 10 per cent increase in the insurance rates.

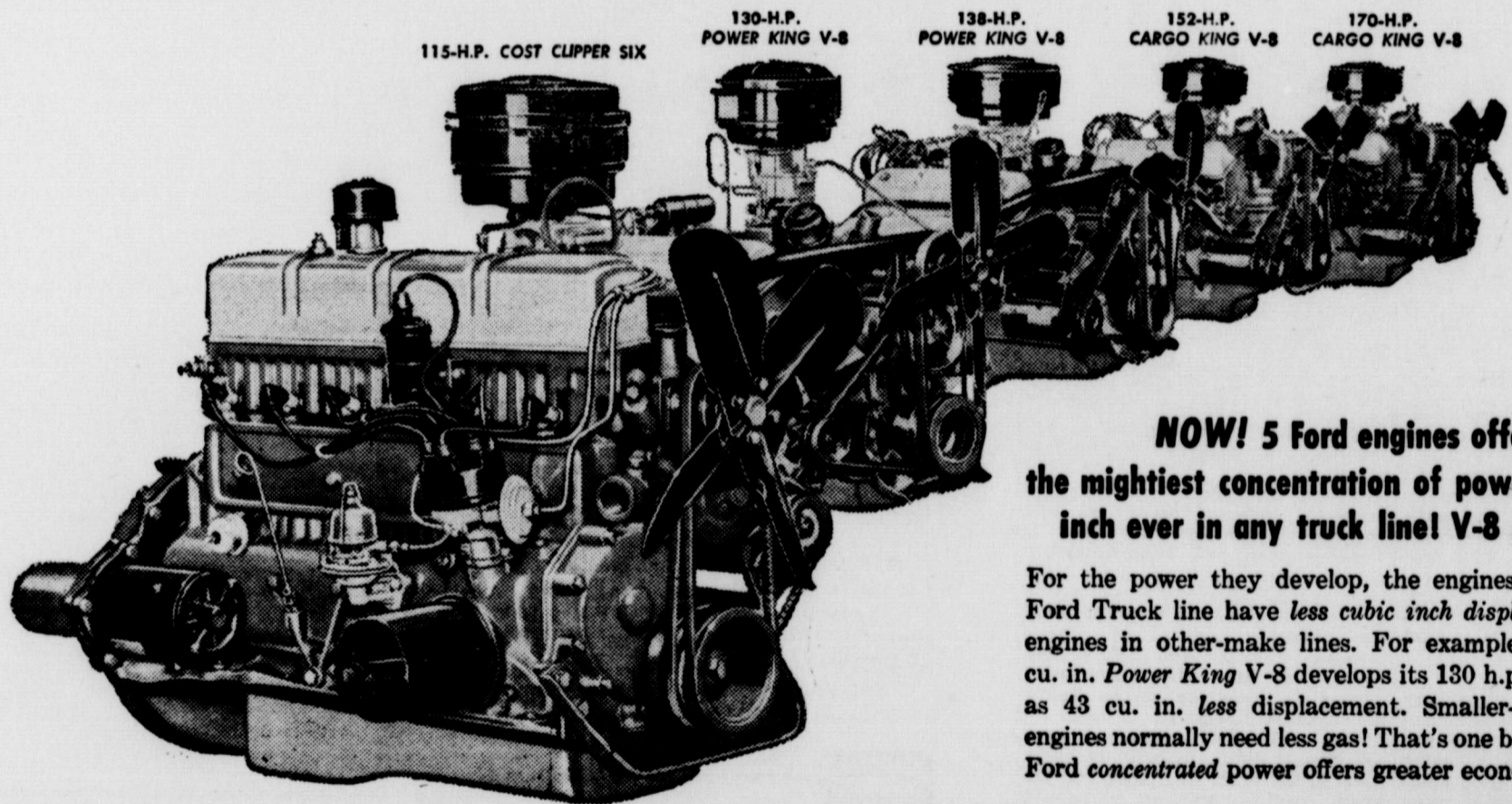
