New Additions Makes **Crowell School Plant** One of Best in State

GRAMMAR SCHOOL BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION; SIX ACRE CAMPUS

Crowell has one of the finest chool plants to be found in a own of its size. The campus of the public school contains six acres and the eleven-room high school building, which is a new building, being constructed in 1927, occupies the southwest corner of this tract. One wing of the building

A new grammar school building is being built about fifty feet east of the high school building and it is expected to be completed for the opening of the 1937-38 term in September. When this building finished, Crowell will have two of the finest school buildings in Vest Texas.

ered football field in 1935. There are fifteen rows of seats, 180 feet in length, in the stadium and the first row is seven and one-half feet above the ground, insuring

good vision. The lighting system consists of twenty-four projectors mounted on four 60-foot poles on each side of the playing field with a 1,500 watt lamp in each projectors watt lamp in each projector.

Two tennis courts were erected this year. In addition to all this there is ample room for several softball diamonds.

The three buildings are lighted by electricity. The gymnasium is heated by natural gas, but the school buildings are steam-heated. Faculty
