ing cheated. The Oklahoma man picked cotton for Mr. Patton in the fall of 1926 and was paid 40c per hundred and board. At that time he charged Mr. Patton for picking 2,000 pounds that he didn't pick.

The cotton picker has become a Holiness preacher and since that time his conscience had bothered him and he decided to pay the old debt.


