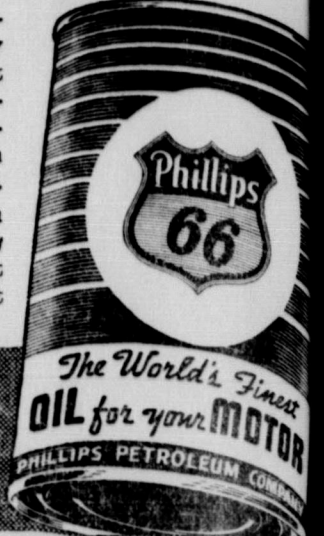

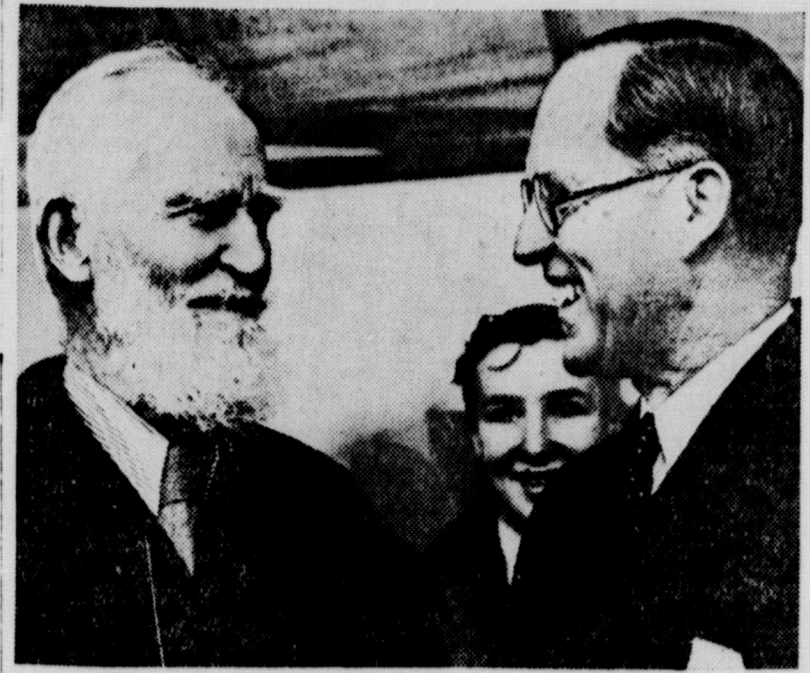

Washington Day By Day

Terse Commentaries on People and Places... Gentle Iconoclasm with Politics Eschewed BY DR. JAMES E. POPE Special Washington Correspondent

(Editor's Note—Dr. Pope's opinions are his own, and his articles do not necessarily always reflect the editorial policies of this paper.) Would Remove Vice From Mr. Garner Henry Ford came to town and dropped in at the White House for lunch. The man who rode to fame and fortune on the Model T talks little but says much. He declared that too many people try to live off money instead of produced wealth, and that the annual wage cannot become a reality until there is annual business to support it. Also, Mr. Ford would use an eraser on Vice President John N. Garner's official title, and make it President John N. Garner in 1940. Mr. Ford's favorable mention of Mr. Garner as Presidential timber serves to emphasize the analogies which exist in the lives, character and genius of these two men. Industrially and financially, Henry Ford is rated one of the world's outstanding liberals, where Jack Garner is, at heart, a conservative. Politically, Mr. Ford is classed as a conservative, while Mr. Garner is allied with, and ranks as the Nation's second-high man in an administration known as the most liberal under the sun. Ford, a lifelong Republican, is an industrial car near the Canadian border, while Garner, a lifelong Democrat, is a political tycoon from the great open spaces next to Mexico. Yet, like the Michigan capitalist-manufacturer, the Texas cattleman-politician talks sparingly but says much. Political Lochinvars For public consumption, the rank and file of Washington's politicians refuse to see any sign of threat in the new National Progressives of America party. But off the record and clandestinely, a few admit that it is a potential infernal machine for some of the boys who earn their livings at running for re-election, that by the very possibility of its gaining the balance of power it can and may assume national importance to a bothersome degree. Others are suspected of whistling in the dark when they discredit the new move by labeling it just another third party, and pointing out that third parties are not important. Besides, many of the states have laws especially designed, so they say, for making it next to impossible for any new party to gain representation on printed ballots. Its supporters profess to see in it the fighting spirit of the late Senator LaFollette riding the West again. Still others are rediscovering that a famous Caesarean delivery was performed on the expiring body of LaFollette's own neck of the woods—back in 1854—which gave birth to that unpromising runt, the Republican party. This puny offspring of antislaveryism and political butchery of that day has lived to give opposing sides no end of trouble. Wage-Hour Fight to Continue The powerful House Rules Committee seems determined to prevent full congressional consideration of the highly controversial wage-hour bill, either in its original form or in the form of its so-called less radical—or less liberal, depending on one's personal view—successor. President Roosevelt appears to be equally or more determined that gag rule shall not successfully throttle his pet measure, and protesting against the committee's latest move he telegraphs another rebellion from Charleston. During the late but unlamented special session the Rules Committee packed the original wage-hour bill away in the political refrigerator and locked the door. They failed to shelve the controversy, however, so somebody pried the lock, revived the original stew, covered it with a nice new frosting and served it with a milder sauce. But the head chef, Chairman O'Connor of the House Rules Committee, called in some of his more trusted assistants—specifically, Reps. Cox, of Ga., Driver of Ark., Smith, of Va., Clark, of N. C., Dies, of Tex., Maps, of Mich., Taylor, of Tenn., McLean, of N. J.—and between them decided that the dish was not suitable for public consumption. So last week the reshaped wage-hour bill found its way to the cemetery. It neglected to bury its face downward, according to custom, and it scratched out—instead of down. President Roosevelt, fishing cruise or no fishing cruise, campaign year or no campaign year, wants his wage-hour bill brought out in the open and on the floor of the House where it can be considered and publicly debated by Congress. And so the inflammable fat may again be in the fire—with primaries popping, and elections just around the corner. Poor candidates! Since recent developments indicate that we have just emerged from a crazy era of government by telegraph to the crazier era of government by chain letters, some wooden nutmeg suggested that Congresswoman Mary T. Norton, champion of wage-hour legislation, inaugurate a high-pressure chain-letter propaganda drive to swamp the bill's foes. GOSSETT OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR CONGRESS MON.

Summary of Platform Given in Speech at Bowie

Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls formally opened his campaign for Congress in Bowie Monday, May 9, with a lengthy speech, before a large crowd outlining his platform, and discussing general issues confronting the American people.

Mr. Gossett was introduced by Judge Vincent Stine of Henrieville, Judge Stine for many years served as District Judge in Montgomery and Clay counties.

Mr. Gossett's platform follows: Agriculture We should have a back-to-the-farm program including:

- (1) A better farm tenant program — take farmers off relief, put them back on the farms; (2) Widespread ownership and stability for the family sized farm...

Patronage Abuses Political intimidation should be prevented. Patronage abuses should be prevented. Severe penalties should be prescribed for those holding government jobs who contribute to the campaigns of persons seeking public office.

Debts and Taxes Government expenses should be curtailed where possible. The number of persons on the public payroll should be decreased not increased.

Crime and Disease Men and money should be saved by reducing crime and disease. A better law enforcement and crime prevention program is imperative.

Good Citizenship is the most important problem of Social Security and National Welfare. It should be the first and greatest concern of the State.

Relief Relief problems should be returned to the states for administration, subject to Federal aid and supervision for the sake of uniformity and efficiency.

Citizenship Good Citizenship is the most important problem of Social Security and National Welfare. It should be the first and greatest concern of the State.

Unemployment and Labor We should divide work instead of money. Idleness is a moral and an economic curse.

Old Age Assistance Red tape should be eliminated — injustices removed — by giving old age assistance in a fixed amount to all persons over sixty-five who ask for it.

The Little Man Small business men, small merchants, and small farmers must be protected from unfair competition and ruthless extermination.

Public Utilities Reasonable rates, efficient service, fair competition, and honest dealing should be required of all public utilities.

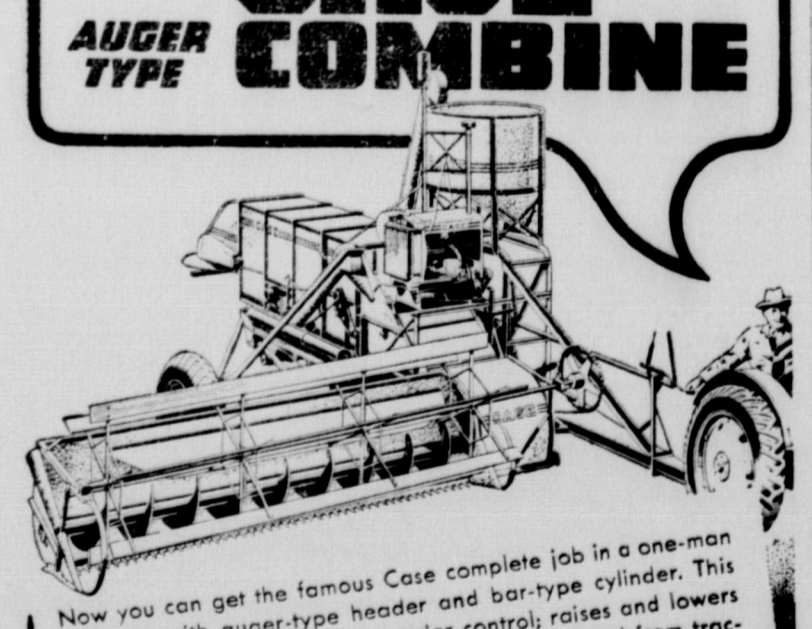

(Continued from Page One) hopper war the following items must be supplied by each farmer: sack in which to put mixed poison; for every 100 pounds of bran used an additional 100 pounds of cotton seed hulls must be supplied; two gallons of molasses must be bought for every 200 pounds which can now be purchased at the gin for 25 cents per gallon; four ounces of amyl acetate, which may be purchased at any drug store. The last item is banana oil and gives the mixture a strong, sweet aroma which will attract the hungry hoppers.

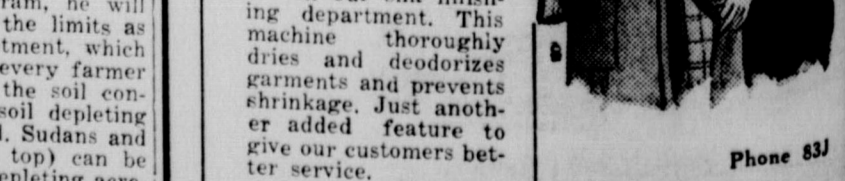
