MEMBERS OF THE Baird High School band have placed their 1965 calendars on sale to the public for \$1 each. They may be purchased from any bandsman.



Failure to have the water system improvements might raise Baird's fire insurance key rates -- which would mean higher fire insur ance on our homes and businesses.

YES FOR STREETS

Unless some of our paved streets get immediate care, they will soon be gone forever. Some \$10,000 to \$12,000 of the \$32,000 in bonds will pay for the needed sealcoating.

Some of the \$32,000 will also go to buy better equipment to maintain our streets. The rest will be retained to pay for paying alley and street intersections as needed in the iuture.
