See Democracy in Action During Public School Week

This next week is the week that the public schools are open to adults. It is Public Schools Week, an annual event in Texas education. It is a chance for you parents to see for yourselves what the schools are doing.

Visiting your child's school and meeting their teacher or teachers will thrill your child as well as being a thrilling experience for you. Foard County is very proud of its fine schools and well-qualified teachers. All schools—Thalia Grade School, Crowell Colored School and Crowell Public Schools—invite you to visit any time during the week. The Thalia School will have a special open house on Thursday, March 3, from 7 to 9 p. m.

These public schools are your schools. You build them. You maintain them with your taxes. They are major factors in developing the character of your children. Visit them next week. See them in action during Public Schools Week.

While touring your schools, begin in the first grades and notice the kind of work they are doing. Then proceed to the second and continue until you have toured all grades. Notice how the degree of learning differs from one grade to another. You will be surprised how much a child learns from grade to grade. Yet a child's learning should be so gradual that he never feels the effect from one grade to the next. It is only by a teacher's intricate planning that this is achieved. Look at the teacher's lesson plans to see how they make material come to life for your child. Notice the many kinds of displays and large wall charts used daily in teaching children.

In each room, look at their text books to see how modern and up-to-date our school books are. Notice how the vocabulary changes from grade to grade. Notice how much longer the sentences get in books as you proceed up the grades.

Talk with all teachers about their grade or subject as this is what they spend 175 days a year doing. They enjoy and appreciate knowing the people in their community are interested in their work, and they enjoy telling and sharing their work with you.

Now for a few statistics about our Foard County Schools. Thalia Grade School has 60 students in grades 1-8 with four teachers—three with a master's degree and one with a bachelor's. Crowell Colored School has 66 students enrolled in grades 1-10 with five 11th and 12th grade students attending Booker T. Washington School in Vernon. Their staff of three teachers has one with a master's degree and two with bachelor's.

How to Buy Shoes That Fit

Keep the following fitting pointers in mind when you go shoe shopping:

1. Always have both feet measured and shoes fitted to the longest foot. Don't judge by your old shoe size.
2. Try on both shoes and walk in them, preferably on a wooden floor. If they don't feel good, don't let yourself be talked into buying them on the basis that they'll "break in." They may, but your feet may "break in" first.
3. Proportions of the shoe are a factor in fit. For example, one manufacturer may make a shoe with a fairly short vamp, while your feet may need a long vamp.
4. While you are standing, ask the salesman to check, or check yourself, to see that the ball of your foot coincides with the widest part of the shoe.
5. Be sure shoes are long enough. If you can feel your longest toe touch the inside tip, the shoe is too short for you.
6. Check the width in front. Your foot should fit the shoe without feeling squeezed.
7. Feel for toe room — you should be able to wiggle toes freely.
8. Check, as you take your test walk, to see that the heel of the shoe clings to your heel without slipping.

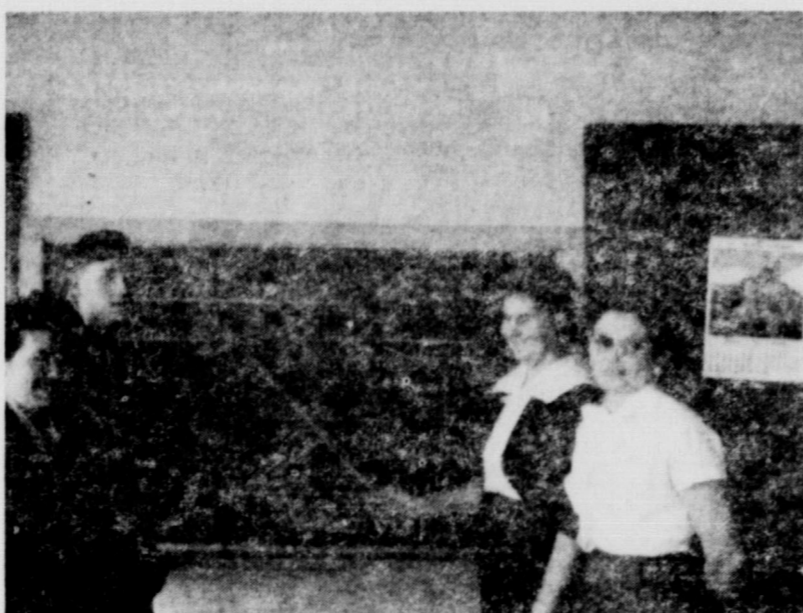

The news headlines this week will be on the start of President Eisenhower's 10 day, 10,000-mile visit to four South American countries where our diplomatic fences are badly in need of repair.

But the inside story back of that visit is one that most newsmen covering the trip will fail to report. It may well be a part of the most important story in the world this year.

The trip is a part of the President's dedication of his last year in office to the building of peace and friendship throughout the world. It is a part of his "crusade for peace."

Only those who know him personally realize fully how deeply and earnestly he feels about establishing a firm foundation for peace based on friendship and understanding rather than a "military stand-off" of two powerful blocs of hostile nations.

A Change in Policy
The President's efforts represent a substantial change in world diplomacy. He is shifting emphasis from military alliances to friendship alliances.

He has become the world's foremost salesman of world peace and friendship, a commodity the people of all countries fervently want. He is creating an entirely new, and refreshing, image of America in the mind of the peoples of the world.

In the 15 years since the end of World War II the United States has placed emphasis on building the military and economic strength of the Free World nations as a counter-force to spread of communist influence.

We have spent billions of dollars in that effort, only to find that we cannot buy friendship as we would a sack of potatoes. It has resulted, more often, in creating suspicion of our motives and objectives.

The Personal Touch
President Eisenhower is bringing to world diplomacy a new, friendly, personal touch that has too often been lacking in the past. He is placing emphasis on friendship and mutual understanding rather than on cold war alliances.

His trip last fall to Europe, Asia and Africa probably did more to enhance the chances of world peace than all of the billions we have spent to build military alliances since the end of World War II.

No other President has ever travelled so widely, or has been so enthusiastically welcomed as a messenger of peace. He has made literally millions of new friends for the United States.

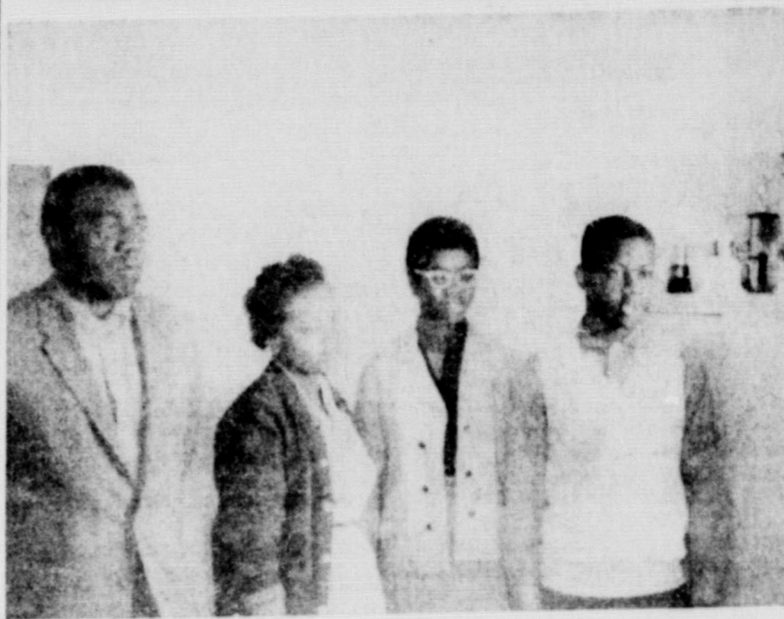
The climax of his "crusade for peace" will come at the Summit Conference in Paris next May, followed by a 10-day visit to Russia in June; and thence eastward to Japan and other Far-Eastern nations.

He will carry with him the prayers of millions of people throughout the world, on both sides of the Iron Curtain, for "peace with honor." No man in almost 2,000 years has so inspired hopes of lasting "peace on earth and good will among men."
