The city ordinance prohibiting the shooting of fireworks of any kind in the business district will be rigidly enforced during the Christmas season. The city asks the co-operation of merchants selling fireworks in notifying buyers of the existence of this law, as in the past few years, this has become a nuisance as well as a danger-ous fire hazard, and last year one painful injury was sustained by a person stepping on one of the exploding firecrackers, as well as other unreported minor injuries.


Motor Freight Truck **Burned West of City;**



WILDCATS HAVE IMPRESSIVE RECORD

Coach Graves was re-elected to that position at a meeting of the school board early last week, but its announcement Cotton marketing quotas were came as a surprise over the retained as a part of the Federal public address system at the Crowell-Newcastle game here last Friday, while his football team was winning the second regional championship Crowell since he started coach-

ing here. He has piloted twelve Wildcat grid teams and those teams have played eighty-four games, won three district titles, three bi-district crowns and two regional championships, and only one of his teams, the 1936 club, has fallen below second place in the conference standing and that team of rookies finished in third place. Only ten Class B teams have defeated a Wildcat eleven the past 8 years. Five of the defeats were at the hands of strong Class A squads.

Coach Grady Graves' Crowell Wildcats won their second regional championship by defeating the Newcastle Bobcats, 26-7, on the local gridiron last Friday afternoon to hang up probably the best record for any Class B team in the state and establish them-selves as one of the strongest elevens in Texas.

Best In State

The Wildcats have tallied 424 points this season while holding their twelve opponents to the un-usually low total of 20 points, and the low score of the opponents is that which makes Crowell's rec-ord so outstanding. Wink, recog-nized as one of the outstanding teams in the state, has a slightly better scoring record than the Wildcats, with 523 points, but Wink's opponents crossed its goal line for 96 points, which makes the Wildcats the strongest de-fensive team in the state, as well as having an offensive machine that will rank with the best.

Much color and entertainment was added to the game by the Vernon and Quanah High School bands. Each band played during the game and gave drills at the half-time, in a show that added much interest to the game.


Stage Aerial Attack
