Funeral Held Saturday in Crowell Baptist Church

Scott, 67, of Crowell, who died in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Fred Cox of Junction, Texas, were held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, in the First Baptist Crurch of Crowell with Rev. C. C. Haston of Chalk, former pas-tor of the Claytonville church, officiating. Interment was made in the Crowell cemetery with the Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Columbia, South America, was received last week from Carta-gena in which he related many interesting things about the picturesque and historic old city.

from Texas in a ten passenger plane, and spent that afternoon inspecting the city before going into the jungle to his work.

He wrote that Cartegena is a

city of about 125,000 population and is surrounded by a stone wall two meters thick. The wall was erected several hundred years ago as protection against the pirates who roamed the seas in that time. Cartagena is a cleaner and better city than most South American up. est cities of that country, according to the letter.

He told of visiting an old monastery and fort which were located on the highest hill near the town and of inspecting the five mile network of tunnels which connected the fort and town. The tunnels were dug under a river between the town and fort. Cartagena, Mr. Brisco wrote, is sur-rounded by two bays, and Carribbean Sea and a river, and that there was also an American set-tlement located there.

Mr. Brisco visited a cotton farm near Cartagena and relates a story that would be hard to believe by cotton farmers in Foard County. According to his letter, cotton was picked for four years from the same stalks, and after that time, the stalks were cut down and replanted. The cotton he saw was three years old and most of the stalks were from ten to twelve feet high. Some of the stalks were six inches in diameter at the base. "The leaves, blooms, bolls and squares look just like they do back home," he wrote, "but the

stalks are young trees.' In speaking of the pecularities of the natives, Mr. Brisco told of an accident that would have made headlines in any North American newspaper, but was quickly forgotten there. A large jar of acid exploded and killed or wounded several of the native workers and instead of the usual atmosphere that surrounds a disastrous mishap, the natives laughed and joked about the whole affair.



same conditions, and in every case, whether or not they consciously sit down and map out a system of farm management, it will be found that their thrift is not luck, but good judgment in making the best possible use of their facilities and utilizing the available labor to a better advantage. In its simplest terms good farm management is "man use plus land use."

Certain crops call for a peak of labor at the same time, and if they are not to suffer from neglect, labor has to be hired. This is a cash outlay which must be deducted from the gross profits from saleable products, reducing the farmer's own net returns from practical and scientific planning and set a goal for the planning of every farm in the county by 1940. Doubtless other counties have adopted a similar program, and where they have, the farmers who first co-operate will be that much ahead of their neighbors.

It is not necessary, however, to wait until there is a county-wide planning program, and the individual farm family, after all, must plan according to its own resources and abilities. Helpful bulletins can be had from the agricultural colleges on request, and they will well repay careful study during these long winter nights when there is plenty of time to read and digest the information they supply.


