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





Norris - Gilbert Company of New York City has staked a loca-tion for its No. 1 V. H. Weekley ranch, in section 85, block 16, H. & T. C. survey, in the extreme southeast corner of the county. The location is 8 miles northwest of the Fluhman pool in Wilbarger and five miles northeast of the Thalia pool in Foard County.

The location was made on the geology of Edwin S. Smith Jr., geologist for the company. Pro-duction in the Fluhman pool ranges from 200 to 500 barrels daily from sands at 1,200 feet, 1,400 feet, 1,500 feet, 1,800 feet and 2,-200 feet, and natural gas and oil is found in the Thalia field between 800 and 2.000 feet.







RELATED SUBJECTS By H. E. Thomson County Welfare Worker

Q. What are the duties of a county welfare worker?

A. Since the duties of a county welfare worker are so many and varied, time and space will and varied, time and space will not permit a complete answer to this question. Therefore, we will outline the principal and more im-portant of the many duties. To begin with I would like to make this statement: In order for the people of a county to derive bene-fits under the various federal pro-grams such as, WPA, The Nation-al Youth Administration, the al Youth Administration, the Civilian Conservation Corps, and paritciption in the distribution of Federal Surplus Commodities, which includes both food com-modifies nurshes of her the fed modities purchased by the fed-eral government and clothing commodifies which are manufactured in the WPA sewing rooms, it is necessary that the county have a welfare worker approved by the state and federal government, to determine eligibility of the appli-cants for participation in the benefits of the various programs. The Texas Relief Commission has been approved as the State Agency by the Federal Government. County welfare workers having been ap-proved by the Texas Relief Commission are authorized to assist the people of their county in se-curing the benefits of the various programs as needed.

The County welfare worker is authorized to take applications for WPA referral. (Acceptance or rejection of applications are based on need and employability as out-lined by TRC rules and regula-

tions.) The County welfare worker is authorized to make NYA referrals. The County welfare worker is authorized to take applications for CCC enrollment.

The County welfare worker is authorized to take applications for assistance in the form of Fed-eral Surplus Commodities, includ ing food and clothing commodi-

ties. The four programs outlined above are the outstanding pro-grams now in effect by the Federal Government.

In this county we have a coun-ty wide NYA project of which the county welfare worker is proj-ect superintendent and timekeep-

There are so many duties that fall under the above headings that I will not try to enumerate them at this time. I would like to add that your

county welfare worker is your contact man with the assignment division and the social service de-partment of WPA.
