Too Much Government

Writing in National Review, Sylvester Petro says: "The fundamental defects of existing labor policy... can be stated very simply. We are suffering from too much government of the wrong kind, and too little of the right kind. In the United States, government, particularly the federal government, has given trade unions very special privileges. At the same time, it has failed to enforce those basic laws which are designed to prevent individual and special groups from abusing other persons and groups. The result of this failure is a threat to the freedom and well-being of our society, the threat the large trade unions nowadays pose."

Many people drive as though they considered human life cheap and living out of style. Occasionally, faulty highway warnings or signs can be blamed for accidents; more commonly, the failure of a driver to notice highway caution signs results in disaster.

Of course, it seems ridiculous to put a 40 mile per hour speed limit on a big four lane highway, but could it be necessary? Is a slow down sign on a wide curve really essential? In other words, our question is this: Are highway signs and warnings adequate and essential?

Highway signs are essential. I think that they are adequate, too, but people do not pay enough attention to them. I don't think they can have too many speed signs. People ignore stop signs much too frequently. Accidents, therefore, are caused by the failure of people to look at signs, not the failure of signs to give proper warning.

To me, the only signs that do any good are the ones that say: "Speed limits radar enforced". Only about half of the highway signs are needed, the other half aren't useful or necessary. I think the speed limit should be raised to 70 and that the signs on curves, etc., should remain as they are. —Guy Todd Jr.

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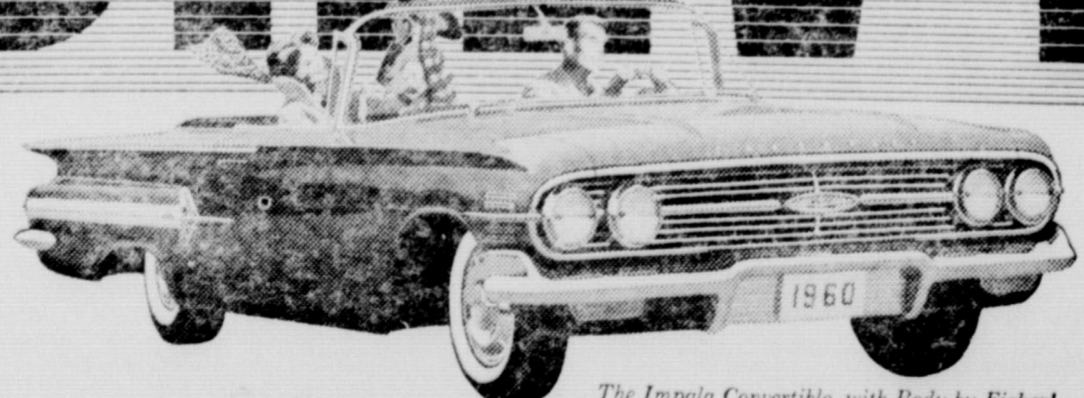

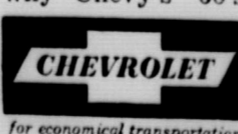

Home Demonstration Notes
VIRGINIA JACKSON

Versions of the "slim silhouette" are popular again this spring. The slim lines present several problems when it comes to keeping a crisp, unwrinkled look. The dress may lose its shape across the back if the material you choose has a tendency to stretch. Also, wrinkles may develop across the front.

To guard against this, line the dress. Use a light-weight rayon lining or other material that isn't too heavy, and doesn't cling.

Cut the lining about one-eighth inch smaller than your regular dress pattern and bring it eight to ten inches below the hip line. Machine-baste to the front and back pieces of the dress before putting the seams together. This keeps the fabric from slipping and puckering as you stitch it in place.
