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

Another great Crowell basketball team coached by Grady Graves finished the 1940 season in Austin last week in fourth place of the state race after winning a thriller from Dublin in the first round of the state tournament and dropping sensational scraps to San Marcos and Livingston, defending state champions. San Marcos Champs

As was predicted by many, the team that dumped the Wildcats from the race became the state champions. In the semi-final round of the tourney, San Marcos pulled the game from the fire in the last minutes of play to enter the final game with El Paso. San Marcos barely nosed out El Paso for the state championship. Take Share of Honor

The Wildcats came in to take their share of the honors meted out at the conclusion of the meet placing three players on the All-State teams, probably plac-ing more players on the honor teams than any team present,

GREAT RECORD

With the conclusion of the 1940 basketball season, the 1940 record of the Crowell High School Wildcats places them probably as the greatest team ever to come from the local school.

There is only one other team of Crowell's in which an argument in comparisons might arise. It was the 1933 edition of the Widlcats which went through a season of 34 games, winning 33, scoring 1,411 points while holding their opponents

to 710. The 1940 Wildcats played a schedule of 41 games, winning 36 games, and tallying 1,665 points as compared with 1,026 for their opponents.


