### 1962 Savings Bond Sales in County Total \$98,554.00

December Savings Bonds sales in Foard County were \$3,585, according to George Self, chairman, Foard County Savings Bonds Committee. During 1962 the citizens of this county purchased \$98,554, which represents 89.6 per cent of the 1962 sales goal of \$110,000.

This is the first time in a number of years that Foard County has failed to reach its Savings Bonds goal. Sales in Texas during 1962 totaled \$143,146,965 which is 86.7 per cent of the state goal of \$165,100,000.

U. S. Treasury records disclose that the number of individual bonds issued during 1962 set a five-year record with over 73 million individual bonds issued during the year. The number of \$50 bonds purchased was the highest amount since the war years, and the sale of \$25 bonds was at a five-year record.

### EDITORIAL

#### The March of Dimes

This month the March of Dimes Foundation is celebrating its 25th anniversary. During its quarter century of existence, it has probed into many unexplored areas of disease causes. "March of Dimes" is synonymous with polio prevention. This institution has developed an immunization against the disease and has discovered a way to prevent it from being transmitted or carried by humans.

Now, with the battle against polio nearly won, the March of Dimes is turning its efforts to include two other crippling — arthritis and birth defects. The motto for this year's campaign

is "Give for the life of a child." This theme is especially fitting because three cripples — polio, arthritis and birth defects — await the very young.

Almost all of the money with which the March of Dimes Foundation carries on its research is secured through donations. These donations provide also for operations to relieve painful sufferings of those for whom the Salk vaccine came too late.

This is one foundation worth our notice and our contributions.

#### Teachers Attend District Meeting

Henry Black and Marvin Myers attended the Vocational Agriculture Teachers, Principals and Superintendents meeting of the Wichita Falls District at Iowa Park High School last Wednesday evening. John Halcomb, professor from A&M College, and Geo. Hurt, state director of vocational agriculture, were present. Mr. Hurt discussed vocational agriculture and its role in our present-day school systems.

He stated that even though the number of people on our farms is decreasing, agriculture is still our nation's largest industry and 40 per cent of our people are either in agriculture or agricultural related occupations. He also stated that shop work in vocational agriculture is increasing in this mechanized age.

Mr. Black and Mr. Myers report the meeting to have been a worthwhile one.

#### Facts About Bus Transportation

There are 222 students riding buses into our school daily. This makes an average of 20 students for each of the eleven buses. Carl Cox has the smallest group—15—these come from Good Creek. The Margaret bus, driven by Ernest King, has 28, the largest group. However, he has one of the shorter routes. The two buses to Truscott, driven by Allen Taylor and George Fox, travel only 36 miles per trip. The longest route is Joe Smith's to south Thalia. It covers 60 miles per trip.

Other drivers are Marcus Mills, Thalia; Henry Earl Pruitt, Riverside; Joe Vernon Smith, Vivian; Paul Wallace, Foard City; Clyde Russell, Four Corners; and Roy Cooper, Black.

There are two feeder buses coming into Truscott from the Antelope Flat and Masterson communities. They are driven by Mrs. N. L. Looney and Mrs. W. O. Cordeur.

The Crowell Colored children are transported into South Ward School by one large bus that is driven by Noel Matthews, and Henry Anderson drives a small bus to Vernon to transport the Colored High School children. This makes the total number of 265 children for whom the Crowell School District furnishes transportation.

#### Judy Traweck Wins Honor

Judy Traweck is Homemaker of Tomorrow for our school in the 1963 Betty Crocker search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Having achieved the highest score in a knowledge and attitude test given senior girls Dec. 4, she now is eligible, along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of state Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills, sponsor of the program. The runner-up receives a \$500 scholarship. The school of each state homemaker of tomorrow is awarded a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The state homemaker of tomorrow, accompanied by her school advisor, also will join with other state winners in an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring. During the tour, the 1963 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and national runners-up will be named. The Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will have her scholarship raised to \$5,000, with second, third and fourth place winners being awarded scholarships of \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Basis for selection of local and state winners is a test prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago. Personal observation and interviews are added factors in determining national winners.

#### Screwworm Program Still in Jeopardy

An appropriation of funds by the Texas Legislature will not relieve the crisis which has developed in the exhaustion of producer funds in the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. Private sources will still have to raise the remaining \$1,000,000

of a \$3,000,000 livestock production goal within the next 18 months, it was pointed out by C. G. Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

Scruggs expressed the Foundation's appreciation to Governor John Connally and the Texas Legislature for recognition of the emergency facing the livestock owners of Texas. State funds which might become available would insure the successful completion of the three-year program provided producers come up with their share, Scruggs said.

Governor Connally recently urged that immediate hearings be held so that action can be taken to prevent the termination of the project that seeks the eradication of the pest that costs the Southwest livestock industry an estimated \$100 million annually. Legislative study group has taken the problem under consideration since early January 1962.

The future of the program remains in jeopardy because of federal appropriation bill specifies that money will be available only as long as 50 per cent of the program's needed funds are provided from non-federal sources. The \$2,000,000 already contributed by Southwestern farmers and ranchmen will have been spent before March 31.

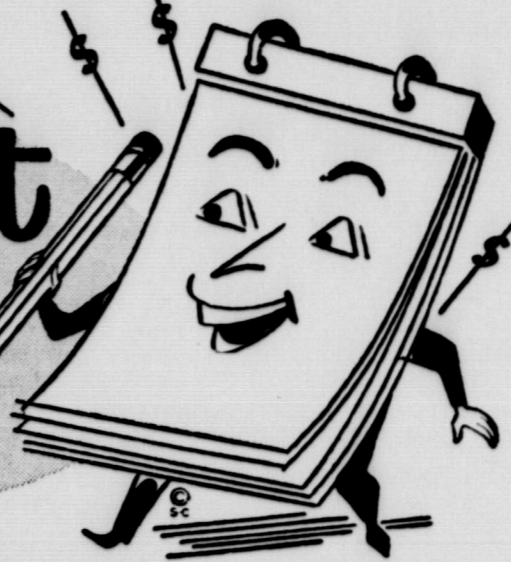
