Foard Voters Pay 1,223 Poll Taxes for 1940

A total of 1,223 poll taxes vere paid by voters of Foard County before the deadline for obtaining them closed Wednesday night, Jan. 31, according to a report from the office of the tax assessor-collector. Records show that 1,861 were assessed in the county for 1940.

Over 610 of these were paid during the last six days. This total does not exceed the mark of 1,333 poll taxes of 1938. The all-time poll tax payment rec-ord is held by 1932 with 1,-497 polls.

An estimate of exemptions could not be made as it is impossible to number those whose age entitles them to free votes this year.

In 1938, 1,333 polls were paid and 1,592 votes were cast in the first primary, which means that 259 exempt persons cast their votes. With 1938 to obtain an estimate of free votes, the voting strength should be around 1,480.
