

Austin .- The State Health Department reminds Texans of the hazard of acquiring trichiniasis (trichinosis) by eating pork that is improperly cooked.

The warning is directed primarily to Texas farms where rats are known to be numerous. The rat is perhaps the most common carrier of the trichina worm which causes trichinosis. is evidence that on many farms, hogs acquire the parasite from
