

Bones of Prehistoric Man Found in Gravel Pit in Hockley County

Lubbock, Nov. 25 .- Remains of a skeleton unearthed in a gravel pit several miles northwest of Whitharral in Hockley County last week are believed to be those of prehistoric man, although conclusive evidence that this was the long-sought Folsom man was lacking, Dr. W. C. Holden, curator of the Tech Museum, said.

Amount of fossilization of the skeleton was similar to that on elephant, camel and horse bones found in the same strata, possibly 20,000 years old, he said. But due to disturbance of layers immediately above the grave by excavations of the gravel pit, proof was missing.

A portion of the skeleton was excavated and brought to the museum for study and measurement. Excavation of the skeleton brought archeologists from University of Texas, University of New Mexico, and Texas Technological college, and from Santa Fe.
