Dun & Bradstreet Notes Changes in Foard County Business

This week A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to businesses in Foard county. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1962, totaled 46 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area.

Mr. Hemphill stated that during January, business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being mailed to approximately three billion business concerns — to the corner grocery with a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers, and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 40 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Foard County businesses, including 11 names added, 14 names deleted, and 15 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Foard County are about the same with the rest of the country. There is a change of business significance is counted about every two seconds.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise (or his accountant) fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes part of the credit report on his business and factor in determining the credit rating of the business. Mailing the statement, rather than waiting for the Dun & Bradstreet reporter's call means a concern's important suppliers will quickly have the facts on which to make credit and sales decisions. When the Dun & Bradstreet reporter arrives in a business man's financial statement in advance of his periodic call, he can make a more detailed analysis of the financial condition of the business and discuss its operation more intelligently.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference Book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a history of the business (who runs it, who operates it); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the best financial statement; and a record of how the business pays its bills.

While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters also use credit reports to review risks, rates, and coverage for fire and other types of insurance.

Who Must File a Federal Income Tax Return for 1961

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return, Murray C. King, administrative officer, Internal Revenue Service, Vernon, Texas, announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by contacting the IRS office. Oh, yes, the filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16.

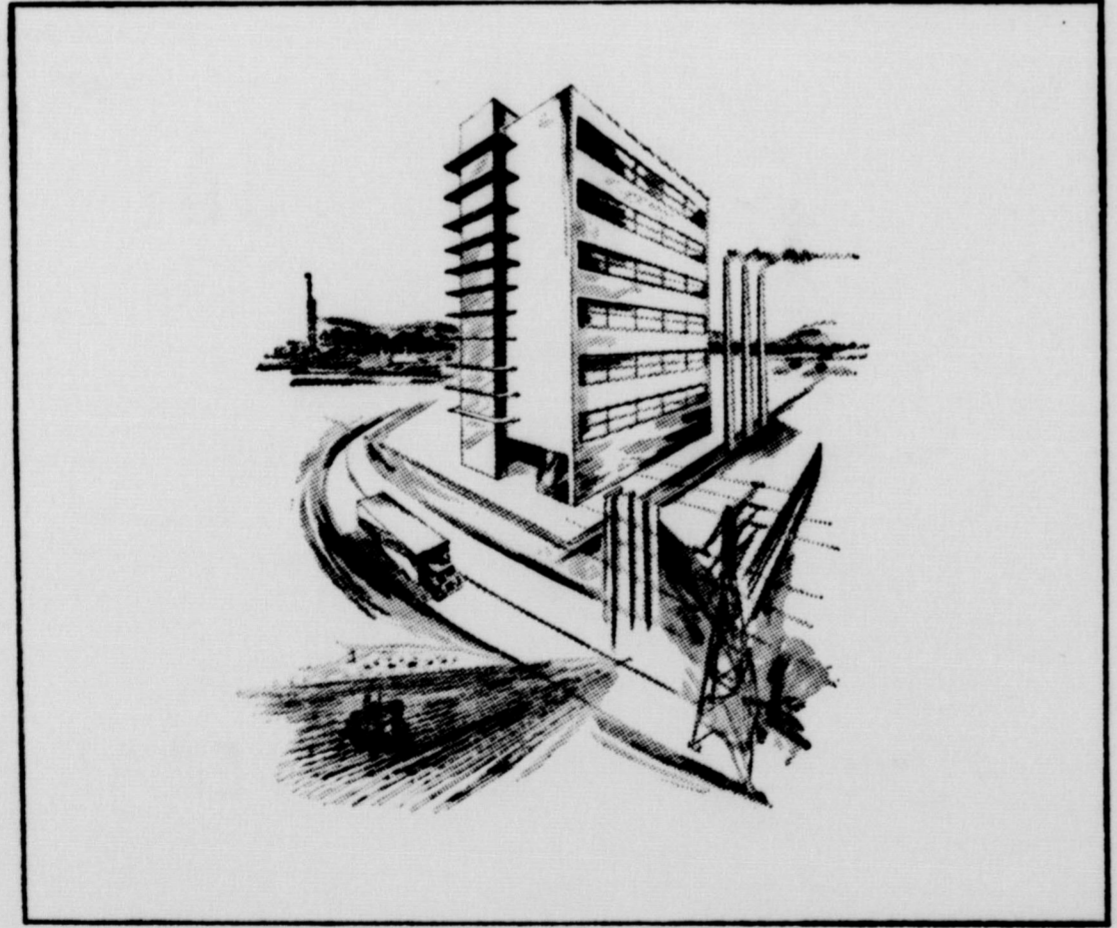

Nine Plentiful Foods Greet New Year Shoppers

American farmers have a nice way of saying "Happy New Year." They do it by providing extra-large supplies of tasty foods at

low prices for January markets. Fresh grapefruit and honey are two examples. They head the January list of plentiful foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

This year's grapefruit crop is estimated at 45.2 million boxes, 8 per cent more than last year. Texas grapefruit are an especially good buy in this area. And bees in all parts of the nation have produced 276 million pounds of honey, an all-time high.

Also on the list of plentiful foods for January are broiler-fryers, apples, Irish potatoes, pecans, frozen and canned cherries, rice and dry beans.

The Agricultural Marketing Service, in cooperation with growers and the food trade, selected these items as being in supply that exceeds normal needs. There's a different list each month.

Food stores usually find it possible to offer plentiful items as special week end features, at attractive prices. Consumers can take advantage of the abundance by serving plentiful foods often.

Is Utopian by Russian Standards

"The plight of the unemployed American, although not a happy one by American standards, is Utopian compared with that of the Russian who is unemployed. . . Wages paid Russian workers in 1959-60 average about four rubles per hour of labor, the equivalent of \$80 per month at the rate of exchange at that time, according to latest international labor data. . . 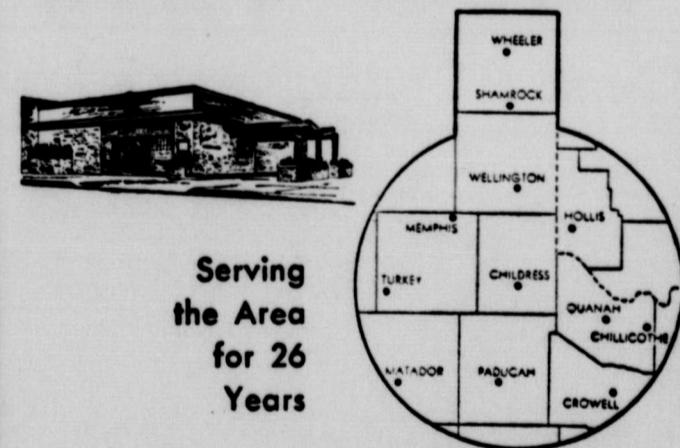
No Longer a Matter of Pennies

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—"Escheat" is a word you'll hear often during the next 30 days.

With the fourth session of the 57th Legislature underway, the most important item on the agenda is "escheat." Governor Price Daniel called this third special session because he believes the more than 1,500 banks and savings and loan associations should be subject to escheat.

But just what is "escheat"? It's a process as ancient as Roman history; written in Old England's feudal law; described by Webster as, "Reversion of land to the crown, or to the state in the United States, by failure of persons legally entitled to hold the same."

Escheat provisions were incorporated in the constitution of the Republic of Texas, and enacted as a state statute in 1885.

Texas law always has stated that when anybody dies without heirs, or disappears and can't be found, his property shall be turned over to the state, after seven years. But the law has lacked a provision by which persons or institutions holding property of missing persons were required to report it.

Governor Daniel started pushing for a provision three years ago, and last summer the Legislature finally passed a reporting provision. But the bankers have fought it long and successfully. They are still exempt from the reporting law, although all other businesses and public agencies must comply.

During the interim between legislative sessions, a special house committee has been investigating enforcement of escheat laws applicable to banking institutions. Committee discovered that much of the \$4,000,000 escheatable accounts lying dormant in Texas banks is being dissipated through service charges and recommended that:

1. The Legislature add banking institutions to the escheat enforcement law without delay, and require banks to advertise for lost owners after seven years.
2. That this matter receive prompt attention in the January session, because the committee estimates a year's delay would mean the loss of \$1,000,000 through the procedure of service charges on accounts that don't require service.

3. That the committee keep on

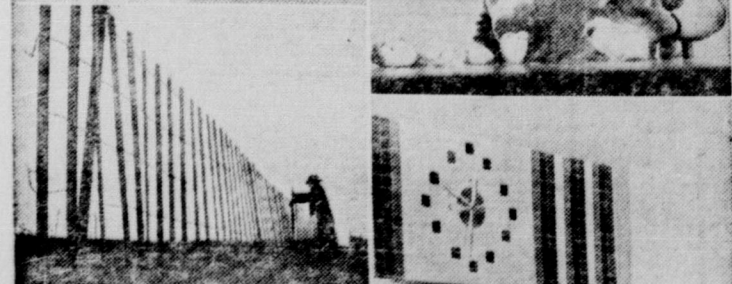

W. Price Jr., chairman of the Tourist Council's executive committee, writes, "We have every reason to believe that the Governor will submit in his call appropriations for the tourist attraction program before our meeting on January 10."

Earlier, the committee estimated that \$3,000,000 would be needed from General Revenue to get the advertising program underway. The Council hopes to augment this amount with \$2,000,000 in private subscriptions.

PRESIDENTIAL TASK FORCE—National interest in Texas' program of work with the mentally retarded resulted in the appointment of Charles S. Eskridge, director of the Division of Special Education of the Texas Education Agency, to the President's Task Force Committee on Education and Rehabilitation.

Eskridge will serve with physicians, scientists, educators and rehabilitation specialists selected from other sections of the country. Approximately 5,000,000 Americans are mentally retarded, of whom four per cent reside in institutions at an annual cost of almost \$300,000,000.

The Texas Education Agency has been notably successful in a cooperative school-work program of local school education of mentally retarded children between the ages of 6 and 17.

HOUSING FOR THE AGED—In an effort to stimulate housing for those men and women among Texas' 745,000 old folks who need either specially-built small homes, apartments priced within their limited incomes or institutions that offer nursing care, the Governor's Committee on Aged has prepared a guide to federal building programs.

Guidebook outlines procedures and requirements for obtaining building loans from seven federal agencies, some of which are virtually unknown to the average citizen or organization.

Response has been so great that the original order of 3,000 copies is just about depleted. Committee Chairman Senator Crawford C. Martin has ordered a second printing.

Short Snorts
Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has asked the Attorney General to take "all necessary steps" to stop dredging of a deep water channel in Calhoun County until that county's navigation district returns 20,639 acres of unused underwater land to the state.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White says he will run for reelection. He's been undefeated since he first won the post in 1950. Senator Ralph W. Yarborough announces that preliminary design work has started on a special commemorative stamp honoring the late Sam Rayburn.

Brigadier General Everett S. Simpson is encouraging Texas men to enlist in the Texas National Guard's 36th Infantry Division. The six-months active duty training program will be reinstated this month.

UT's Bureau of Business Research reports retail sales in the state for November rose 1.9 per cent above October, and six per cent over November, 1960. 7.7 per cent more building permits were issued during the first 11 months of 1961, than in the same period last year.

Texas Highway Department reports a total of 61,979 miles of roads in the state network—far more than any other state's.

Americans Spend \$4 Billion a Year to Keep Appliances Working

According to Newsweek, Americans spend \$4 billion a year to keep their 650 million appliances, 46 million TV sets, 19 million power mowers, and other assorted gadgets in working order. The biggest culprits, cost-wise, are automatic washers and TV sets, the magazine adds. It also says that a great many Americans blame both repairmen and the manufacturers for what has amounted to a 70 per cent increase in the appliance repair load in the past 12 years. In rebuttal, an executive of an appliance producing company is quoted as saying: "Manufacturers try to anticipate all the possible ways that a housewife can use an appliance, but they have never been able to match her imagination in this respect."

TV Camera Used in Search for Oil

The tireless electronic eye of an underwater television camera is being used in the active search for oil off the California coast. The camera is carried aboard a barge anchored off shore on deep water acreage leased from the state by Standard Oil Company of California—Western Operations, Inc. It is heavily armored against the 100 pounds per square inch pressures at current working depths, to guide installation of essential drilling equipment resting on the ocean floor, 235 feet below.

Two Minutes With the Bible

Continue Thou

"Evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse . . . but continue thou" (II Tim. 3:13,14).

These were among the last words of the great Apostle Paul, written in view of his approaching martyrdom, to Timothy, his beloved son in the faith.

Circumstances, outwardly, were anything but encouraging. It seemed that the last days of the dispensation of grace were indeed at hand. The apostle had borne many "persecutions" and "afflictions" and now "suffered trouble, as an evil doer, even unto bonds." There were those who, like Janes and Jambres, had "resisted the truth" (verse 8). "Alexander the copper-smith" had done him "much evil" and had "greatly withstood his words" (4:14,15). "Evil men and seducers" had risen on every hand and were to "wax worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived" (3:13).

There was even defection among his own brethren in the faith, so that now, from his Roman prison, he had to report: "All they which are in Asia have turned away from me . . . Demas hath forsaken me . . . only Luke is with me" (1:15; 4:10,11).

And what, now, is his parting advice to young Timothy? Does he say: "Perhaps I have been too intense. My methods have made many enemies. I advise you to be more diplomatic and tolerant than I have been?" Hardly, for the records show Paul to have been of all men most tactful and considerate. His sufferings were not the result of a contentious spirit,

but of his faithfulness in proclaiming that message which so embarrasses and enrages "our adversary, the devil," that message which is God's gracious response to man's need and His answer to Satan's slander—the gospel of the grace of God.

Thus it is that the Apostle urges Timothy: "Continue thou . . . be not ashamed . . . be strong." He well knew that in this sin-cursed world the only hope for the individual is to be found in God's offer of salvation through faith in the redemption wrought by Christ at Calvary.

Continues Unabated

" . . . The desire of bureaucrats in government to run businesses seems to continue unabated. The Department of Interior wants to build \$17 million worth of power lines between Cottonwood and Tracy, California. The Department has asked Congress for \$5 million to start. No doubt transmission lines are necessary. Proof is that the lines are already there. Investor-owned companies erected them some time ago. The lines, moreover, have all the capacity that is needed. 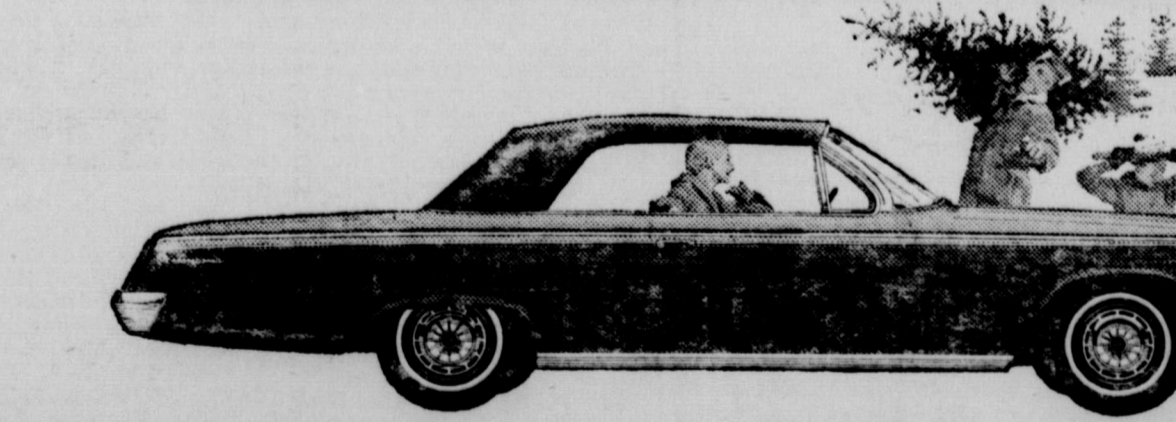

From the News THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Friday, Jan. 8, 1932, issue of The Foard County News: Cotton ginnings in Foard County prior to Dec. 13 amounted to 10,861 bales, compared with 3,987 bales for the same time last year. Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the Farmers Co-Operative Gin at Thalia Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 29. The fire started in the cotton house. The Crowell State Bank, a new financial institution for Crowell and Foard County, opened for business Tuesday, Dec. 29, and before the close of its first day, over \$22,000.00 in new deposits had been received. Total deposits now are over \$134,000. Another general rain over Foard County fell Sunday night and Monday and amounted to 1.68 inches at Crowell. Steps toward the organization of a Foard County tax payers association were taken in a meeting at the Thalia school Saturday night which was attended by twenty-three men of the Thalia community. Saturday evening, Dec. 26, Mrs. S. S. Bell, the class mother of the senior class of 1930, entertained her "children" with their first reunion. The total rainfall at Crowell during 1931 amounted to 22.46 inches, compared with 22.13 inches for 1930 and 27.49 inches for 1929. Over one-half of the 1931 rainfall came during the past three months, the total for October, November and December being 11.41 inches. Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Fox are the proud parents of a baby girl born Tuesday, Jan. 5. They named her Patricia Louise. M. L. Hughton and family have moved to Truscott where Mr. Hughton is employed in the First Bank, fiscal officer. There were 599,851 hunting licenses issued for the 1960-61 season, an increase compared with 554,593 for the previous year. Sports fishing license sales were \$72,236, as compared with \$46,632 for the previous year. Harris County again led in the number of licenses bought, both fishing and hunting. Harris County sales during the 1960-61 season were 76,418 hunting licenses, as compared with 61,693 for the previous year, and 112,336 fishing licenses as compared with 109,717 the previous year. Dallas County bought 41,055 hunting licenses, against 36,886 for the previous year, and 56,937 fishing licenses against 57,235 for the previous year. Foard County bought 31,619 hunting licenses against 32,847 for the previous year, and 33,120 fishing licenses against 32,847. Tarrant County bought 24,195 hunting licenses, against 21,726 for the previous year, and 54,951 fishing licenses against 55,859. TVA Reduces Electric Rates Again The Tennessee Valley Authority recently announced a reduction in its electric rates. The head of the Edison Electric Institute observes that if TVA paid taxes and the market costs of borrowed money comparable to those paid by private electric companies, rates would have to be raised 46 per cent. If this were done, electric rates in the TVA area would be about the same as rates paid by customers of the electric companies operating under similar circumstances. Diverging Policies The U. S. government's diverging policies toward aiding foreign and domestic railroads were highlighted by J. Handy Wright, vice president of the Association of American Railroads, in a recent speech. He charged the government with "reverse myopia" in supplying great sums of money to help foreign railroads while failing to provide even a simple equality of treatment for our own lines. Grants and loans for the foreign rails, he said, have totaled more than \$1.2 billion since World War II. in any time in history. We are brainwashed into believing that we can spend ourselves into prosperity, that we can maintain financial stabilization by going deeper and deeper into debt, that the national debt is of no significance—just a long line of meaningless digits. . . . No wonder babies come into the world crying. They're held upside down, spanked and have a \$1,675 debt hanging around their neck. Our debt is larger than that of all the nations of the world put together."—Star City, Ark., Ledger.

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
