


Two Oil Tests In County Abandoned; Tools Recovered from Wallace No. 1 Gamble, Drilling Operations Resumed

J. B. Cunningham-Gamble No. 1. farm-out from the Texas Company in the north edge of the Allee Oil Pool, has been abandoned at 2375 feet without encounter-ing the lime from which the other wells were producing. This dry hole probably defines the field on the north.

Tools were recovered Monday afternoon from the Wallace No. afternoon from the wallace No. 1 Gamble after an extended fish-ing job. The tools were lost in process of drilling plug in No-vember. For two months the at-tempt to recover them with a spudder rig was a failure. The rotary rig was then moved over the hole and some progress was made, however, the tools were not brought to the surface until a spudder rig was again moved ov-er the well and the job completed. The well was cleaned out Tues-

day afternoon and the process of day atternoon and the process of drilling the plug resumed. Op-erators hope to have the well com-pleted within a very short time. The Texas Company J. F.
