## 3,000 Extra Copies

In order to supply what we considered would be the extra call for papers concerning the tornado, we printed 1,000 extras at the first printing. They were all gone at 4:30 p. m. Thursday.

It would have been impossible to make a reprint of the original twelve pages, so we condensed the twelve pages, into eight pages. We left out some material which we considered non-essential to those who wanted simply a story about the storm. No pictures and none of the story were omitted. Of these, we put out 1,250 more. They sold fast and we printed another 750 making a total of 3,000, and the calls have been many and we hope we will have sufficient to supply all those who want a copy.

Again, we would acknowledge the use of cuts of the scenes which were furnished by the Wichita Falls Record-News, the Abilene News-Reporter and The Vernon Times. Without these, the paper would have been incomplete, and, within our own power at that time, it was impossible for us to secure any



Lindbergh Lands At Paris, May 21:-It is fifteen years ago that Charles Augustus Lindbergh took from Roosevelt Field, New York, on May 20, 1927, on a nonstop flight to Paris to win a prize of \$25,000 which had been offerfor the first successful flight of this kind. He landed at the air field in Paris May 21, having flown the 3,600 miles in 33 and one-half hours. Lindbergh's first solo flight was made in April. 1923. On March 19, 1924, he enlisted in the United States Air Service at San Antonio, Texas, and following his Paris flight he was advanced to Colonel of the Air Corps Reserve. In 1926 he was an air mail pilot between Chicago and Saint Louis. When the announcement of the prize for nonstop flight to Paris was made, Lindbergh, backed by a group of Saint Louis men went to San Diego, Calif., where he superintended the building of an airplane which was called the "Spirit of Saint Louis." 



College Station, April 6 .- Community sewing centers to provide self-help for rural women who do not have machines may be one result of the war.

## Two Minute Sermon

The Adult Problem: We frequently hear mentioned today what is referred to as "The Youth Problem." 
