SPD Corn Meeting Slated In Muleshoe

"Corn is becoming an increasingly important cash crop on the Texas South Plains," said Bailey County Agent J.K. Adams, "and educational efforts are being beefed up to provide producers with information essential for profitable production of the crop."

Money In Hogs Meeting Set At Hub Center

A "Money in Hogs" meeting has been slated for the Hub Community Center Wednesday, March 11. Meeting time is 7 p.m. and all persons interested in hog production are urged to attend the meeting.

First speaker on the program will be Dr. Williams Thomas, swine animal husbandman with Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M. Dr. Thomas will discuss "Factors to Consider When Entering the Hog Business."

Ed Garnett, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will then speak on "Profit Potentials." He will present potentials for various sizes of units and methods.

Dr. Thomas will again speak on "Feeding Grain Sorghum." It is expected to be one of the highlights of the meeting due to the large number of grain sorghum producers in the area, and as feeding is the major expense in hog production.

Three speakers will conclude the program with a panel discussion on "Financing Hog Operations."

Joe Montgomery, vice president of Security State Bank in Littlefield will explain how banks can help in financing hog operations. Lev Connors, District Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration of office in Amarillo will be a panelist to explain how FHA can assist the producer and Robert Neelley, manager of the Friona Production Credit Association will be third panelist in the financial discussion.

Palmer County Agricultural Agent Ronnie McNutt encourages each potential hog producer in the area to attend the meeting.

One such educational program is slated for Monday, March 16 at Muleshoe. This meeting is being sponsored by the South Plains Development (SPD) program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Billy C. Gunter, SPD coordinator and Extension District Two agricultural agent.

The corn production meeting will be held at the Bailey County Electric Cooperative and will begin at 7:30 p.m. Bailey County Agent Adams will moderate the program.

Featured speakers will be Extension Specialists Dr. Robert Metzger, Dr. Bill Clymer, James H. Valentine and Leon New. These specialists are headquartered at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

Metzger will discuss selection of hybrids, time of planting and other key cultural practices for producing corn profitably. Clymer will talk on controlling the southwestern corn borer which has been a menace to corn crops in certain areas.

Valentine's discussion will concern fertilizing corn for profit while New will speak on irrigating corn for maximum efficiency.

Extensive field studies on corn were conducted this past year in Bailey County, points out Gunter. In addition, result demonstrations have been conducted by a number of county agricultural agents in the area for the past few years to determine the best hybrids and correct cultural, fertilization and irrigation practices. Information from these various field trials will be presented in an effort to provide farmers with the latest information.

Gunter encourages all interested individuals in the corn-producing counties in the area to make plans to attend.

1970 Crops Boosted By New Moisture

Rain--in the form of a slow, gentle fall which soaked into thirsty, dry ground, broke a dry spell which had extended from last October.

The official weather bureau report was .19, although at times water was running down gutters and pools formed in depressions. This was the first measurable moisture since the heavy snowfall in the last of December and first of January. Added to the .26 logged by the weather bureau this year, the total reached .45 for the year.

High Incidence Of Youth Drinking Noted

Eight youths picked up during the past week by the Muleshoe City Police and the Texas Highway Patrol for drinking (or, minor in possession of liquor) point up an increase in the immediate area, according to reports of the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

Sheriff Dee Clements said reports on youths drinking in public areas was apparently on the increase in Muleshoe. Those youths who had complaints filed against them were from 16 to 20 years of age.

In other action by the city police, two were jailed as entering the country illegally; one for vagrancy; one for assault and battery and one for no driver's license.

The Bailey County Sheriff's office jailed two persons for vagrancy.

Dick Pierce, Muleshoe, reported a lost or stolen 1970 license tag. He said the license tag, 1K 9718 was missing from a 1953 Chevrolet pickup.

A.R. Hill, who lives three miles from Muleshoe, near Highway 84, said he had a missing stalk shredder. He said it has the name "A.R. Hill" on the front and has trailer type wheels. There is a suspect in the case, although it has not been cleared.

1970 License Tag Deadline April 1

"Wonderful," said Jean Lovelady, Bailey County Tax Assessor, when asked what her office employees thought of the new system of licensing vehicles in Texas. "If we can just get the people to bring in the three part form they received in the mail, it cuts the time to process their license by more than two-thirds."

She said that approximately 1100 license applications had gone through her office for passenger tags with one month of the license tag sale gone by. This is perhaps slightly above normal for this time of the year she added. Mrs. Lovelady said she did not know how many tags had been processed by her three sub-stations in Bailey County. The substations are located at Claunch Gin, Bula; Enochs Cop Gin, Enochs and the Goodland Cafe at Goodland.

The tax assessor added one word of caution to those who will need to secure their license tags this year. She said deadline to have the plates on the vehicle is midnight, April 31. All tags must be displayed on the vehicle by April 1.

She added, "The deadline has passed to order 1970 Texas motor vehicle registration plates by mail, but there still is time for motorists to register their vehicles without a lot of the bother of former years. "The cutoff date for mail orders was March 1. But the three part computerized form which all Texas vehicle owners received just after January 1 still will save time-if motorists act quickly. "All you need to do," continued Mrs. Lovelady, "is to take the registration application to your county tax assessor's office or sub-station with the fee. "The process is greatly simplified and the lines--if any--are fast moving. "That's still no guarantee there won't be long lines facing those who wait until the last few days before the midnight April 1 deadline. Each year, thousands of motorists, including Bailey County motorists, put off registering their vehicles until the last minute. "And, each year," concluded

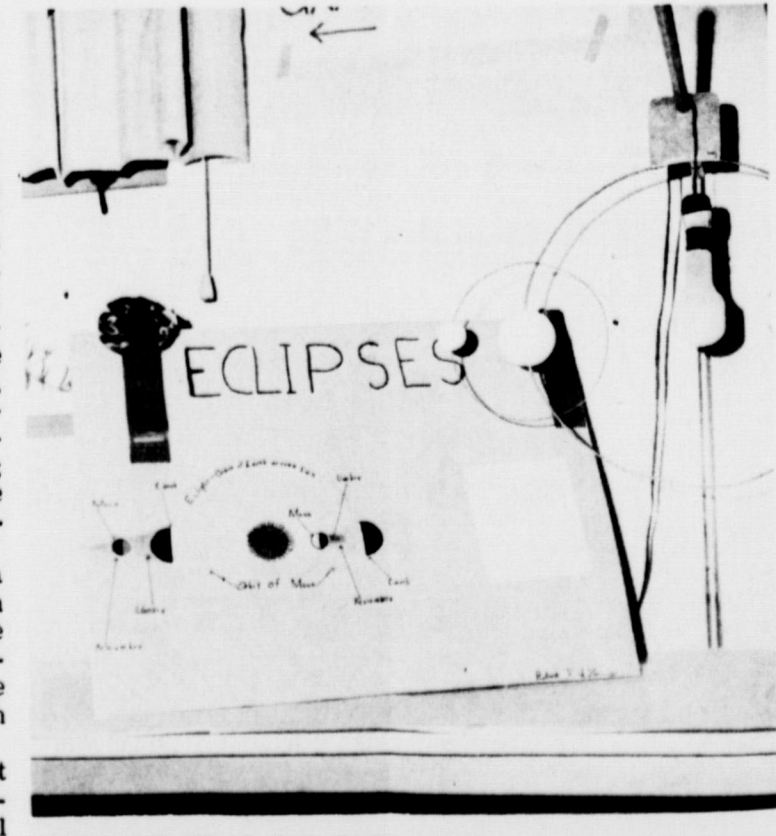

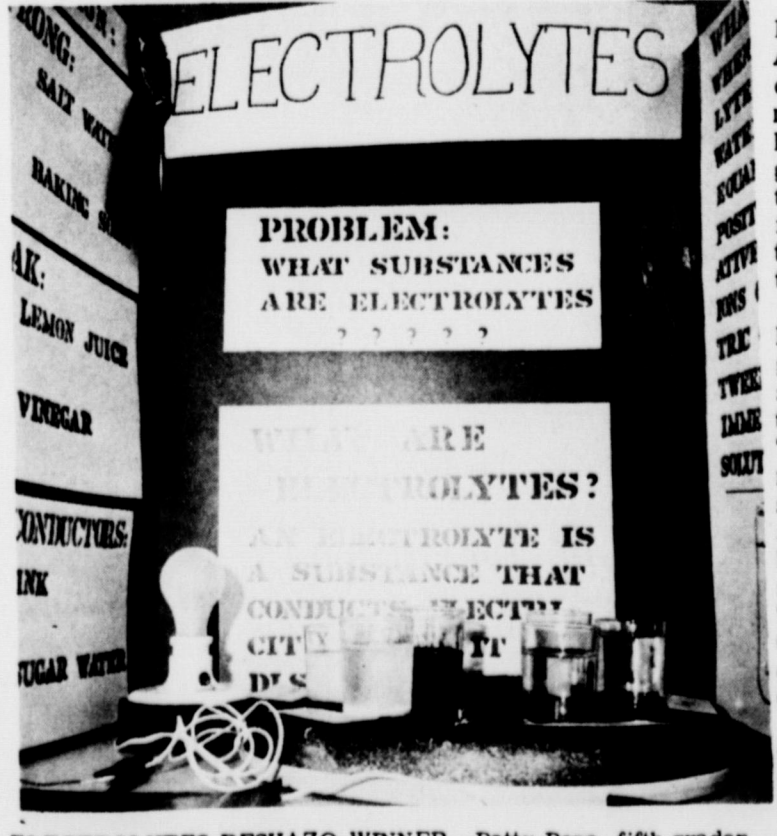
Distributive Education is a vocational training program in retailing, wholesaling, and the service selling occupations, designed to give the student on the job work experience along with his class study.

Bailey County farmers, who suffered severe crop losses during the last year, were smiling as they watched the grey, laden skies in the area. They expect the moisture to prove to be a boon to winter wheat which has been forced to draw from 'deep' moisture and to prepare the land for spring crops.

Muleshoe's temperature stayed in the high 30's all during most of the day. Grey skies greeted residents when they got up Saturday, although weathermen predicted the sky would start clearing late Saturday morning.

A total of 54 counties in south and southeast Texas were placed under a tornado watch Friday and wary citizens scanned the sky until the all clear at 2 a.m. Saturday. No severe storms were reported in the aftermath of the booming thunderstorms in a vast area, which at some time roamed over most of Texas.

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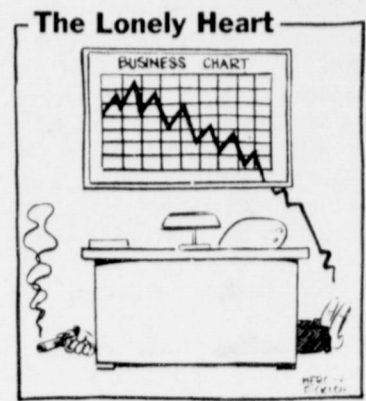

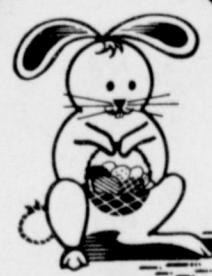

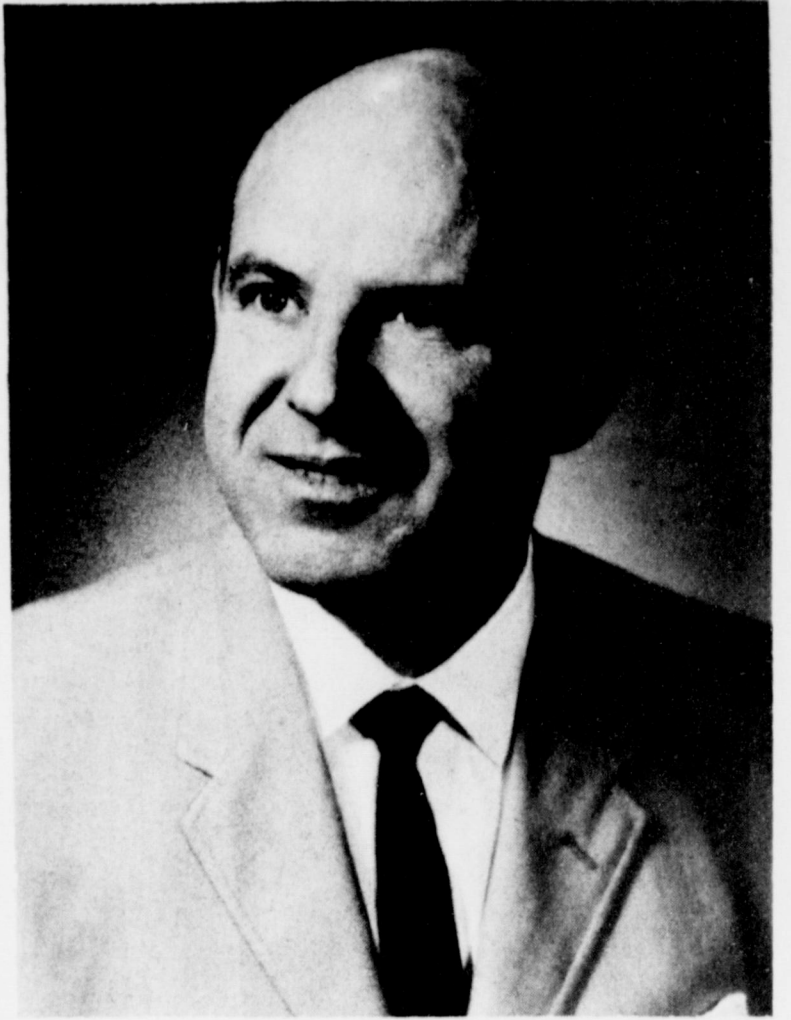

The Muleshoe Science Fair was held last Monday night, March 1, during Open House. There were eight entries in this year's fair. Entered in the Physical

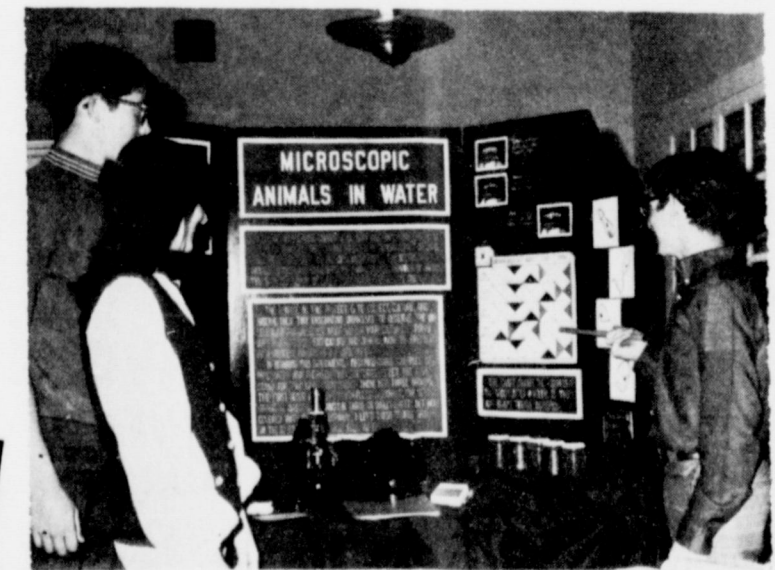
Science area were Randy Lackey who did "Copper Plating", and Janis St. Clair who did "The Atom". Randy Lackey won first place.

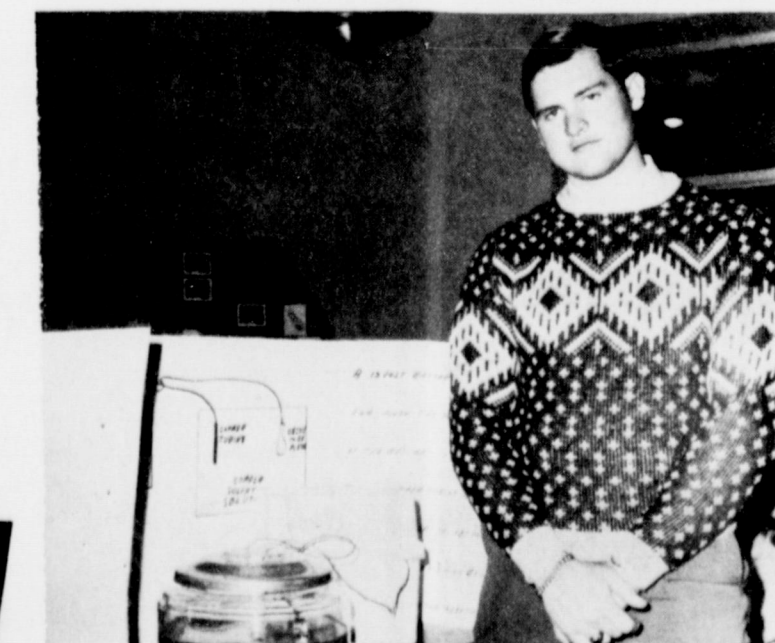
Health Career Assembly Set For March 9

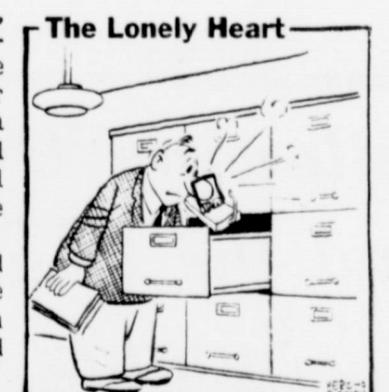

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Internal Revenue Sues Local Man

On February 11, 1970 U.S. banks and three individuals to District Judge Halbert O. Woodward ordered two Muleshoe vice summonses to produce

books, records, and papers relating to their financial transactions with Boyd Magby, owner of the Magby Ditching Service, Muleshoe, Texas for the years 1964 through 1967.

Mr. Magby has secured a temporary restraining order and a preliminary injunction from Judge Woodward in November 1969 preventing the First National Bank of Muleshoe, the Muleshoe State Bank, H.D. King, president of King Brothers Grain Company; W.B. Kitrell, Secretary Treasurer of Mid County Gas Line Assoc.; and C.A. Larimore, Controller

of Can-Tex Industries, Mineral Wells, Texas, from complying with the Internal Revenue summonses.

Mr. Magby alleged in his motion for the temporary restraining order and injunction that the Internal Revenue Service had issued the summonses for the sole purpose of securing evidence for a criminal prosecution against him. Magby sought to intervene in the enforcement of the summonses, but in his order of February 11, 1970, Judge Woodward denied Magby's intervention in the enforcement of the summonses,

holding that the books, records, and papers sought to be obtained by the Internal Revenue Service were books, records, and papers belonging to the banks and individuals summoned, not Boyd Magby, and that there was no confidential relationship existing which would entitle Magby to prevent a disclosure by the banks and individuals summoned.

A main issue involved was whether the summonses were issued for the purpose of determining Magby's correct income tax liability, or for the purpose of obtaining

evidence to use in a criminal prosecution against him. As a part of Judge Woodward's order on the matter, he held that the summonses were issued to the banks and individuals for the purpose of ascertaining Magby's correct tax liabilities for the years 1964 through 1967.

The respective banks and individuals were consolidated into one case for the purposes of enforcement proceedings, and in his order of February 11, 1970, Judge Woodward stated that the respondents were not required to comply with the summonses until March 16, 1970.

Congressman Gives Report

President Nixon made a long overdue move last week when he sent to Congress the Federal Economy Act of 1970. The President noted in his message accompanying the bill that, "no government program should be permitted to have a life of its own, immune from periodic review..."

"Too often in the past, 'sacred cows' that have outlived their usefulness or need drastic revamping have been perpetuated because of the influence of special interest groups. Others have hung on because they were too small to be worthy of attention," the President said.

While I may disagree with the priority of some of these proposals for reductions, I am quite concerned about the seeming "untouchability" of government programs once they are begun.

A small item may be termed a "drop in the bucket" of a \$200 billion budget, but these drops add up. Every one of these dollars was sent to the Government by people like you and I, and we have a right to demand that they be well spent.

As the President points out, the government has had a Board of Tea-Tasters since 1897. At one time, there may have been a reason for tea-tasters, but that reason no longer exists. The general attitude was: it did not cost much, so why upset the teacart?

The attitude should have no place in government. The taxpayer's dollar deserves to be treated with more respect.

The President proposed 57 savings actions for the fiscal year beginning this July 1. Forty-three of these can be taken by the President and 14 others require Congressional action.

Some of the President's proposals include:

1. Reform of assistance to school districts in Federally-impacted areas--Originally, this type of aid went to school districts where parents of school children lived on Federal installations and, therefore, paid no school taxes.

During its 20 years of existence the program has been twisted to also include payments to districts where there are many Federal employees, but they do not live on Federal property and, consequently, they do pay local school taxes.

The President noted that re-

turning to the original purpose of this act will save taxpayers \$392 million in 1971 alone.

2. Medicaid--The original purpose of this program was to provide medical treatment to all persons, regardless of age, who could not afford such care. This has been enlarged to include long-term care in nursing homes and mental hospitals. The Federal Economy Act re-directs the use of Federal matching funds toward medical care and provides new incentives for states to emphasize more efficient forms of extended care. Estimated savings for 1971 would be \$235 million.

3. Space Research--Reduction of the number of manned expeditions to the moon, which will result in a \$417 million savings for 1971.

4. Duplicated Veterans Benefits--Medical insurers should be required to pay policy holders who choose to be treated in Veterans Administration hospitals for non-service connected disabilities. This would mean a savings to the taxpayers of \$40 million in 1971.

5. Other Items--The \$4.4 million per year spent to subsidize the purchase of milk for school children benefits a great number of children who are not poor. These resources should be reallocated to more effective programs to benefit poor children.

The Federal government should sell the Alaska Railroad to private enterprise or the State of Alaska.

Taxpayers will be saved \$65 million if a Nixon Plan to replace grants to hospitals for construction purposes with loans from private sources guaranteed by the Government. A program to sell materials which have been stockpiled by the Government will produce about \$750 million.

In these times of high interest rates and a rising cost of living, the need to curtail unnecessary government spending is overwhelming. In this fight there is too much that needs to be done for all the people to permit special benefits to be conferred unfairly upon some of the people.

I plan to continue my efforts to reduce unnecessary government spending and will assist President Nixon in every way possible.
