

The beginning is definitely marked by the fact that it was this day that oil was struck by Colonel E. L. Drake in a well drilled by him near Titusville, Pennsylvania. The anniversary of this discovery which brough wealth to Pennsylvania, as well as many other sections of the country has been celebrated in Pennsylvania for many years.

Colonel Drake was sent to Titus-Pennsylvania, by a group of Connecticut speculators who recognized the great commercial value of petroleum. The interest of this group had been aroused as the result of a report by Professor Silliman Jr., of Yale Col ege, who made a scientific study of petroleum and in a published report told of its possibilities as lubricant and an illuminant. Since Professor Silliman's report chemists have discovered that over 500 products may be secured The synthetic rubber situation from petroleum. 



### GROWING FALL POTATOES

College Station. - Soil mixed thoroughly with rotted manure is the first step in preparing for fall crop of potatoes, says J. F home is not yet complete, they have found it necessary to defer. Service. For sandy soil, about three pounds per hundred row feet of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer should be added.

Small potatoes from the spring crop, which have been kept in a cool place, may be used as seed for fall planting provided a rest period of six weeks is allowed between harvesting and planting. As the fall crop requires 75 to 80 days to mature planting should be made early enough so that the potatoes will be ready to harvest be-

Where it is not possible to ir rigate, seed potatoes should not be allowed to sprout before planting. Sprouts may dry up for lack moisture and retard the crop. 'Dry" planting may be done in August by thoroughly preparing the soil and planting the seed pieces four to five inches deep where there is a better chance for soil moisture.


