### Korean Vets Urged To Apply Early

"Apply now. Don't get caught in the rush."

This is the advice that the Vet-

erans Administration gave to-day to all Korea veterans plan-ning to start school in the fall under the Korean GI Bill.

1. Since the law allows a vet-eran to change his GI course on-ly once, he should give plenty of thought, in advance, to his goal.

2. If he decides about what to train for, he may ask for VA vocational counseling.

3. He should be sure that his course has been GI-approved by the state in which the school is located.

4. He should make all arrangements for gaining admission to his school before he even files his application with VA.

5. The GI training application should be completely filled out and signed. The veteran should send it, along with a photostat or certified copy of his separation paper, to the VA regional office.

6. A veteran with dependents should have the necessary proof of dependency.

7. A veteran should take along

enough money of his own to tide him over the first two months of training. It takes about that long, ordinarily, for his first monthly GI check to reach him.
