Several days ago, a check for \$50.00 from the W. M. James Estate, was received by the editor of the Baird Star, requesting that it be turned over to the Baird Cemetery Association for beautification or improving the old cemetery, now known as the Ross Cemetery.

This contribution was made by the heirs of the W. M. James Estate, namely Mrs. J. F. Boren, J. H. James and Frances James in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. James. Mr. and Mrs. James were early settlers of this area, and 'Wiley' James as he was known to his many friends, was a prominent cattleman of his time. All the existing heirs were students of Baird schools, and later Mrs. Boren started her teaching career in the Baird high school.

As no Cemetery Association now exists, the City of Baird having taken over the operation and maintenance of the cemetery in 1942, Mayor Ault turned the check over to the City Council to be used for the purpose intended. The City was planning to gravel several streets in the cemetery, and this will enable quite a bit more work than had been planned. Work will start in the very near future.

Farm Census Leader For County Chosen

Appointment of Mrs. Nell C. McAnally of Cisco as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mrs. McAnally will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Eastland and Callahan Counties. Before assuming her post, she will go to Graham where she will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is her responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing her training Mrs. McAnally will return to her district where she will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

State Fair of Texas Sets New Records

A new national attendance record for annual expositions of the United States were established by the 1959 State Fair of Texas, which ended its run Sunday night, Oct. 15, with a total attendance of 2,801,395.

James H. Stewart, executive vice president and general manager, declared that the 1959 fair was the biggest, best and most successful exposition in every year in the entire 74-year history of the State Fair of Texas.

The 1959 fair set another record also - a new world's record for attendance on any one day at any annual fair anywhere. This record was set on Saturday, Oct. 17, when 331,998 visitors clicked through the turnstiles.

Another historic set of attendance figures were clocked on the middle week end, when, for the first time had three days with more than 300,000 people on hand for each day.

Even as the record-breaking 1959 attendance was being added up, fair officials already were making plans for the 1960 fair, which will be the Diamond Anniversary Exposition of the State Fair of Texas, coming in its 75th year.

One of the wittiest men I ever knew was Charley Garibaldi, desk sergeant at the police station in Memphis when I entered newspaper work. Not only was he witty but he could think of something clever to say at the time and not half an hour later, as is the case with most of us. His humor gained much of its effect from the grace and ease with which it was delivered in the manner of a polished actor.

I had been working on the "police run" only a few days when a young man was brought in on a reckless driving charge. We recognized each other as schoolmates. Soon afterward, another acquaintance of high school days was brought in on a speeding charge. After he had posted bond and left, Garibaldi demanded, "Was that a school for crime that you attended?" -- which amused the officers and, of course, embarrassed the young and serious reporter.

A youth about six feet three was brought in, one night. The sergeant asked, "How old are you?" "Sixteen," was the answer. Garibaldi declared, "You ought to be a lot of help to your parents when you grow up."

The desk sergeant had a remarkable memory. When I returned to headquarters after having been out for supper and would ask if anything had happened, he would give a reply that was strictly accurate in every detail, and without referring to any notes.

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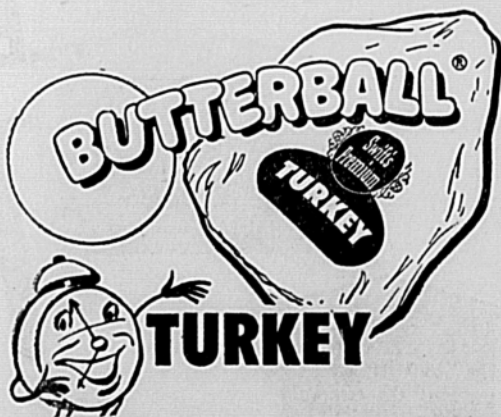

Snyder Brothers Cooperate

In Improving Rangeland

In 1892 the late Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Snyder settled on a ranch five miles west of Moran. Before their deaths a few years ago they had acquired 24,476 acres of some of the best rangeland in Shackelford and Callahan counties.

They also reared seven highly respected children, five sons and two daughters, and instilled into them the same love and respect for the good earth they labored hard to accumulate.

The elder Snyder was well-known for the good commercial Herefords he produced, the excellent care he gave his cattle, ranges and ranching equipment. He made his sons partners in the operation as soon as they were old enough to assume their responsibilities. And among the heritages he passed on to them was the love of the soil, good cattle and work.

For about 66 years the ranch has been under the management of the Snyder family. The father was never one to over-graze or otherwise abuse the range. This practice he also passed on to his children.

Started Conservation
In 1945 he became interested in conservation and signed an agreement with the Soil Conservation Service. Since then the land has been under an active and continuing conservation program.

In 1955 the land was divided between C. B. and James, both of Baird; Eugene (Buddy), Albany; Morris and Ralph, both living on the ranch; Miss Laura Snyder, Amarillo, and Mrs. W. H. Cooley, Winnetka, Ill.

Today they are working together in a program to further the improvement of the range and the cattle.

In the last four years they have "chained" the mesquite on approximately 10,000 acres.

Try Sorghum Alum
The brothers said they kept reading and hearing about sorghum alum, but they were never quite sold on it.

"We had a 55-acre field that had been planted in wheat last year. We didn't have anything on it and we had a ranch hand that needed something to do. We furnished the seed, he planted 55 acres of sorghum alum and plowed over most of it once before he found a higher paying job," explained C. B.

The sorghum alum was planted the last of May and the first of June. It was dry and didn't do too good until it started raining in July.

The grass started growing. Its growth was satisfactory, the brothers agreed, but they doubted if the cattle, which had been running in the field since two weeks after planting, were eating it.

Then they noticed that the range grass showed no signs of being grazed. Also, they noticed that the sorghum alum around a gate that led from the field to the nearest stock tank was getting shorter and shorter. The cattle were grazing it.

Cross Fencing
The ranch has been cross fenced, about a section to each pasture, and water has or will be

made available to cattle in each pasture.

Cross fencing has reduced the costly and time-consuming chore of working the cattle, making a more economical operation for the Snyders.

They plan to continue chaining mesquite on untreated land and are now considering what control steps they will take when the chained areas begin resprouting.

Also, sorghum alum, the crop they were not too sold on at first will be planted in other fields that previously were devoted to small grains.

"We are not farmers. It has been years since any cotton was ever grown on the place. We did grow wheat and oats, mostly for winter grazing. We'll probably plant considerable acreage in sorghum alum next spring," said C. B.

The brothers last week separated their 1959 calf crop from their mothers and put them in pens to wean. They picked out the top heifers and will use them for replacements. They plan to feed the steers and culled heifers through winter and market them in the spring. All of their calves are well - marked, heavyweight Herefords. They use Mousel Brothers, straight Anxiety 4th Hereford bulls.

The brothers agreed they were going to do what they can to give their native grasses every chance to make a maximum comeback.

Murrell Thompson, Albany work unit conservationist, of the Middle Clear Fork SCD, is working with them on the plan.

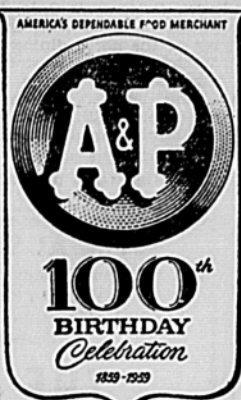

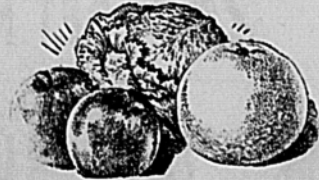

IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

Any day now you (and Uncle Sam) may need to figure out your "net worth".

The Internal Revenue Service may use the "net worth" method to check a taxpayer's income tax records. It compares what he was worth, say, five years ago, with what he is worth today. Then it looks to see if his increase in net worth compares well with his reported income during that time, after allowing for his estimated expenditures. By this method the government can detect tax deficiencies, fraud, or evasion, or assess tax where the taxpayer has not kept records or has lost them.

At a trial for tax evasion, the government must first prove what a taxpayer was worth at the beginning of a period, and what he is worth at the end of the period. The difference is his increase in net worth. The question: Has his wealth increased between the two periods by unreported taxable amounts?

For example: John Doe, a taxpayer, had little wealth when he started his career. He often

borrowed. After four years his net worth grew much larger. In court John could not explain how this happened. So, to cut a long story short, he had to pay the tax, plus interest, and civil and criminal penalties.

Richard Roe, another, was worth \$50,000 in 1946, but in 1950 the government claimed he was worth \$200,000. Roe tried to show but couldn't that he had much more money in 1946 than the government showed. For also, the government's old tax returns showed that Richard had reported a small income in 1946, and had mortgaged his home and business. Besides, Roe spent freely much more than his reported income, and could not show that he received gifts or other non-taxable money. So the court found a large unreported income, and Richard was convicted for fraud.

By keeping proper records of all transactions over a period of years, a taxpayer can properly account for receipts and expenditures of income so that he can forestall the revenue service from using the net worth method.
