

NEW TECHNIQUES IN BRIDGE BUILDING HELP SPEED UP HIGHWAY PROGRAM



Precast concrete spans, reinforced with prestressed steel, are brought from the factory and quickly positioned for a big bridge

Modern wonders in construction will enable the National Highway Building Program to better accomplish its missions of reducing traffic congestion and providing safer travel.

Precast concrete spans—a cost-saving development—will go into many of the 304,600 bridge structures required in the 13-year road program including the 41,000-mile network of super-highways.

On just one highway in one state (Illinois), there was a saving of \$20,000 on each of 200 bridges by using precast bridge members. The weather-proof structures require a miaginum of maintenance and no painting.

Each of the spans in precast bridge sections is reinforced with steel cables and pretensioned. They function as the support between plers and as flooring. American-Marietta Compar—one of the nation's sup-

While contractors' crews are building forms and pouring concrete for piers, workers in American-Marietta's plants are precasting the concrete span sections.

They are trucked to the bridge site for placement as soon as upright supports are ready. Cranes swing them onto the piers, and they are interlocked in required widths. widths.

Derricks are moved forward on the newly placed spans. Where a stream bed is shallow, a crane may be operated from there.

Placing of one full span a day is normal, though some installations are finished within hours.

Contractors save construc-tion time, and motorists avoid detours that often plague drivers for months. Uniformly made with high-

strength concrete, the bridge decks are manufactured un-der closely controlled factory conditions.

First step in AmericanMarietta's process is the
stringing of high tensile steel
cables in a pouring bed,
formed to the required dimensions. These cables are the
unseen sinews of the bridge.

Tension of the cables after
they are released increases
the span strength by exerting
pressure inward on the finished concrete. A favorite engineering comparison is a row
of books. When pressed inward at each end, the row
becomes so strong it can be
moved, for the books' strength
has been multiplied. So it is
with steel cable and concrete
for bridge.

Pasture Grasses Crowd Out Weeds

A "keep out" sign won't scare undesirable weeds out of your pasture. A carefully planned mowing or chemical control program is the only efficient answer to the pasture weed problem.

blem.

Farmers can get a head start on weeds with proper establishment of adapted plants. Good stands of desirable grasses can usually "outgrow" pasture weeds under optimum conditions, says Extension Pasture Specialist E. M. Trew, especially when properly fettilized. Good grazing also limits pasture weed population.

Trew advises mowing when

Trew advises mowing when the worst weeds start blooming since they are more easily dam-aged at this stage. Mow all weeds before seed is produced, and re-member that some require sev-cral operations. Sometimes fall-blooming weeds call for both early summer and fall mowing.

Avoid mowing when desirable grass is scarce or during hot, dry weather if grass stand is not thick enough to shade the soil CAUTION — many mid and tall native bunch-grasses such as bluestem cannot stand repeated mowings.

Mowing exces growth for hay Mowing exces growth for hay or sliage is like putting money in the bank. Mowing also stimulates new growth or near-mature plants and evens up growth after grazing. It removes old grass growth and allows entrance of volunteer fall clovers. Mow high and as early as is practical. A rotary-type mower is generally faster and cheaper. Chemical control is usually

is generally faster and cheaper.

Chemical control is usually more economical than mowing, Trew says. Spray annual broadleaved weeds early with 1-2 to 3-4 pound 24-D or M.C.P.A. to the acre. Apply with a low volume, low-pressure broadcast sprayer in 20 or 30 gallons water per acre. Add about 4 ounces liquid detergent or 1 pound dry for best leaf coverage. Perennials may require slightly higher chemical rates.

Be familiar with herbicide regulations before using these chemicals. They will severely damage pasture legumes such as white, hop, Persian, crimson and red clovers, lespedeza, black medic and alfalfa. Broad-leaved crops such as cotton, tomatoes,

crops such as cotton, tomatoes, and sweetclover are susceptible to chemical drift. See your county agent for local recommendations.





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
