Bowley and Lt. Cyrus Corson of Bossemer City, N. C., were put in a half-truck hauling ammu-nition and he had been on the road five hours when an American fighter strafed them, setting off the ammunition.

He was then taken to a French use guarded by seven Germans. During the day, Bowley became friendly with a German sergeant. The German proudly showed the picture of his wife and baby and Bowley reciprocated. The babies were the same age and had never seen their fathers.

In the evening, a courier arrived with a written order that the sergeant execute the prisoners. German remnants of the shatter-ed 77th division were fleeing southward from the American

The sergeant read the orders and then let Lt. Corson read them. The friendly sergeant said that he hated to comply with the order but was a slave to duty.

Bowley appealed for his life for the sake of his baby. The sergeant wept. He said if the Frenchman who owned the house would hide the prisoners he would stick out his neck by saying the order was executed and the bodies buried. He thought it would go uninvestigated because of the confusion. The Frenchman hid the Americans under hay in the baru.

"The oil industry has been handicapped in the past three years in its search for oil through a scarcity of skilled field manpow er and a scarcity of equipment," says J. Edgar Pew, chairman of the American Petroleum Institute Committee on Petroleum Re-serves. "Nevertheless, the industry has met the unprecedented requirement for its products and at the same time been able to maintain a favorable reserves position with little or no diminution

"The only way this situation can be continued is through the iscovery of new pools, or increases n the amount of oil in pools al ready discovered, resulting from deeper drilling, extension of pro-ducing areas, better techniques in production, more extensive secondary recoveries, and an oppor tunity for development of vast new areas so far untested and undeveloped. The history of the inlustry demonstrates that adequate oil supplies can be obtained in this manner at a fair price level.

"But the industry cannot dis charge its responsibility to public of giving assurance of adequate supplies for the future if it is required to continue depletion of its known reserves at a pric based on costs which are less the cost of replacing such re serves. A fair price level would be not only an incentive to the replacement of existing reserves, the development of synthetic oils derived from distillation of coal

Fulton's Steamboat-August 11 Every student of history is fa-miliar with the story of Fulton's steamboat the "Clarmont" and its trip up the Hudson River from New York City. Although Fulton was not the inventor or originator of the steamship, he is given the credit for having made steam navigation commercially successful. The "Clermont", sailed up the Hudson River on August 11 from New York City and within a month was making regular trips between New York and Albany. Previous to Fulton's exploit a steamboat had been built by John Fitch of Philadelphia who operated it on the Delaware River for several weeks in 1788. The enterprise proved a failure, due to lack of financial support. Fitch's boat was the first steamboat in Amer-

During this hot, dry season it will be difficult to have green feed for them and since they are a dead expense until they begin to lay they absorb a pretty stiff feed bill, so we are inclined to reduce their feed to less than their

absolute needs. It is also important that they have an abundance of good, cool water available at all times as well as adequate shade, and that they are not crowded on roosts

at night.

If they could be provided a good out-door shade, wired in so that you could force them to roost in it, it would be a fine place to

keep them. To insure them against foulpox vaccinate them between 8 and 12 weeks of age. This disease is usually prevalent here in the county

and vaccination will prevent it. Cull out weak and unhealthy birds. It costs too must to feed them as they would be late layers. Rid them of external insects and if wormy, treat them before they begin to lay. Avoid if pos-sible any molt among them.

Care of Laying Hens

Now is the time to cull your poultry flocks, especially hens that have been laying for the past sea-Many of these hens will be completing their production period and will be going into a feather molt. These hens should be tak-



summer pullets that will come ino laying in the next three months. In the first place it is best to grow them out completely before they begin laying or they may never get their full growth.

During this hot, dry season it will be difficult to have green feed for them and since they are a dead expense until they begin to lay they absorb a pretty stiff feed bill, so we are inclined to re-duce their feed to less than their absolute needs.

It is also important that they have an abundance of good, cool water available at all times as well as adequate shade, and that they are not crowded on roosts

at night.

If they could be provided a good out-door shade, wired in so that you could force them to roost in it, it would be a fine place to keep them.

To insure them against foulpox vaccinate them between 8 and 12 weeks of age. This disease is usually prevalent here in the county and vaccination will prevent it.

Cull out weak and unhealthy birds. It costs too must to feed them as they would be late layers. Rid them of external insects and if wormy, treat them before they begin to lay. Avoid if pos-sible any molt among them.

Care of Laying Hens

Now is the time to cull your poultry flocks, especially hens that have been laying for the past sea-

Many of these hens will be com-pleting their production period and will be going into a feather molt. These hens should be taken from the flock as they will not lay any more eggs until they have completed the molt and have reevered their body vigor.

They will consume a lot of high ost feed and will give nothing in

These hens will show shrunken and pale comes heavy molt and the yellow color will begin to re-turn to their beak and shanks. A little later they will be the hess looking birds in the flock with their rew coat of feathers and will be

The old faithful hens will be ragged, with bright red combs and no color in their beaks and shanks, but still delivering the goods.
