The dire need of the Chinese people and the missionaries who are trying to help them, was illustrated by Miss Groves by the story of one experience. The compound where she lived had the privilege of taking in one hundred aildren for protection, food and care. They had tried to be very quiet about the proceedings but when the morning came to receive the children and the gates were opened, the news had got abroad and there were literally hotsands of children lined Np down the streets hoping that they might be taken in by the missionaries

She stated that the Japanese army and navy and all military possibilities should not be underestimated but she brought out the fact that the Christian nation, China, had withstood so much and had courage to hold on with faith in the face of seeming impossibilities and that they had hopes of ultimate victory.

Miss Groves stressed the fact that the Chinese need the prayers of the Christian nations more than they need anything else. She relayed the thanks and appreciation of the Chinese people to America for the food, clothing and money they have sent to them and which, they say, has saved thousands of people from starvation and freezing.

Miss Groves is planning to re-turn to China at the first opportunity and to give the rest of her life to that work and says that if she had 10,000 lives to live, they would all be lived for China. Her address was received with appreciation by her hearers, who responded to her moods with earnestness.

Army and Navy rules for shipping unsolicited Christmas packages overseas are the same as for last year-but correct addressing is more important than ever.

The package must be mailed between September 15 and October 15. They cannot weigh more than 5 pounds, be more than 15 inches in length, nor more than 36 inches in length and girth combined. Perishables are not allowed and fragile things will be strongly discouraged.

Remember that incorrect addressing can delay delivery for 90 days or more. One reason this is true: Just among the Navy's enlisted men there are 16,000 Smiths, 300 of them with identical first names and middle initials.
