Capacity Crowds Firemen Meet With The City Council

In a joint meeting of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department and the City Council last Thursday night, a number of hazardous habits of Baird people were pointed out that The Star wishes to pass on to all our people. Fire Chief Earle Hall reported that much confusion had been caused here of late by 10: local people trying to beat the fire truck to fires. He stated that when the siren gives the alarm, many people jump into their cars and try to get ahead of the firemen. This is not only dangerous, but it delays the firemen and causes damage that could be avoided. State law makes this a finable offense, so 2:00 from here on, folks, wait for the fire department to get to the 3:00 scene of a fire first. The only time it is necessary for people other than the firemen to go to a fire is when the siren repeats its blast numerous times. or, of course, when the fire breaks out on your own pro-

It was also reported that a man not in the fire department who does not live in the city limits recently took charge of the fire truck and drove it to a grass fire outside the city limits. This was a serious violation on two counts. First, the fire fighting equipment is not to be handled by anyone except a member of the fire department, and then only under direction of the fire chief. Second, the fire fighting equipment is not to leave the city limits at any time except by authority of the fire chief. This ought to be a warning to everyone who is not in the fire department. Such rules and regulations must be observed in order for the fire department to function for the best interest of the citizens of

The city council also heard a report of the trip Fireman Jim Asbury and Fireman Gilbert Hinds made to the state fireman's convention in Galveston. In the report read by Mr. Asbury and commented on by Mr. Hinds a number of worthwhile points were brought out that might be good to apply in Baird. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5





The same amount of feed produces more milk when fed to high producing cows. There is no profit in feeding cows that only pay their board bill. They should be culled. It is a good practice for a dairyman to weigh the milk from each cow once a week if possible to see just exactly which cows are paying their way.

The man is murdered and the kid has no one to look after her but Bob, who proceeds to do the best he can with very limited know-how.

Lucille Ball portrays a nightclub singer with a soft spot in her heart for Bob which she covers up with outspoken contempt for his stinginess. But when she sees what he does for "Shorts," the adorable child who has wound him around her little finger, and the changes "Shorts' makes in him, financial cost notwithstanding, Lucille's interest takes a spurt.

The plot thickens hilariously when Bob becomes involved with gambler-racketeer Bruce Cabot and his henchmen, an involvement which threatens to seperate him from "Shorts." When the child is injured and taken to the hospital and Hope brings her pet horse to see her, with Cabot hot on his heels, the going is really riotous.

William Demarest lends excellent assistance as do Tom Pedi and little Mary Jane Saunders as "Shorts."

\$993,307,000 **FOR 17 STATES**

Library of Congress tabulation shows that total government appropriations for building reclamation projects in the 17 western reclamation states amounted to \$993,307,000 during the entire 11 year period from 1939 through 1949.

\$738,000,000 **FOR ONE STATE**

Arizona is making Congressional bid for one irrigation project costing a minimum of \$738,000,000 for initial development only. Additional tunnels and dams would raise total project cost to an estimated \$1,500,000,000.



Backers of western reclamation development have expressed grave concern over possible fate of numerous state programs if Arizona's request for a huge irrigation project should be granted. They point out that this proposal gives Arizona the lion's share of all available funds. To meet such a threat, a fight is being waged behind the scenes in Congress over Senate Bill 75 and House Resolution 934. These are the controversial bills calling for the largest reclamation appropriation ever made to a single state. The reclamation states involved in this vital matter are: Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.



HUMBLE TO BUILD NEW PIPE LINE FROM WEST TEXAS

An \$18 million pipe line from West Texas to the Gulf Coast will be started by Humble Pipe Line Company toward the end of 1949 and completed around the middle of 1950. The new line will be of 18-inch pipe, extending 375 miles in a direct route from Kemper in Reagan County to Satsuma, 20 miles north of Houston, where it will connect with Humble's existing lines to Baytown. It is being built to provide a more economical trans portation system for Humble from West Texas. Upon completion of the new line, Humble plans to take up a part of its old system from West Texas to Baytown by way of West Central Texas which has a capacity of 50,000 barrels per day. No changes are contemplated in Humble's other line from West Texas with a capacity of 70,000 barrels per day to Corpus Christi.




