Applicants should be men who desire to make sanitation or some other phase of public health activity a career or life work. Ap plicants who have been accepted will receive such training allowances as is provided under the "G. I, Bill of Rights;" for instance, \$65 and \$90 per month, depend ng on marital status, which mount may be supplemented the city where the applicant i




