Debbie Ethridge, nine, who was hospitalized in West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe, was expected to be released from the hospital sometime Saturday.

"We think we are very lucky" was the way Mr. and Mrs. Joe Damron described their experience with a violent lady this week. The violent lady was Hurricane Celia, which devastated a wide area along the coast of Texas Monday.

The Damrons were at their summer home in Rockport when the hurricane watch was posted. Mrs. Damron said that at 1:30 a.m. on Monday, the watch was changed to a warning for residents to evacuate. The Damrons said they went to an apartment occupied by their daughter, Mrs. John Smith, Mrs. Smith's daughter and granddaughter, Cindy and Robin, to warn them of the evacuation notice. At 3 a.m. the Damrons left for San Antonio after securing their boat and locking their home.

Comparing, Mrs. Damron said Hurricane Celia was much worse than Hurricane Beulah which rampaged along the coast in 1967. She said that one unusual aspect of the hurricane was the fact that no water accompanied the 161 mile an hour winds except from rain. Also indicated, said Mrs. Damron, was the after effects of probably several tornadoes which were spawned by the storm. She also said the tides did not rise with the storm.

Although the Damrons did not attempt to get back to Rockport until Tuesday afternoon around 4 p.m. they were unable to cross the damaged bridge until early that night.

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
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

another load. He returned to the elevator around 2:45 Saturday afternoon and purchased 30,900 pounds on another truck. Both loads were paid for in cash. Yeager said the man lacked \$6 cash having enough money to pay for the grain, so the man gave him a personal check on a local bank and said he would pick the check up when he purchased a fourth load on Mon-

According to testimony given by Foster, and a New Mexico State Police Officer, James Kelley, they had been working with Texas authorities investigating suspected grain swindles, and had arranged with Yeager to notify them when a man fitting Dressler's description

came in. Foster said that after Yeager notified him by telephone, he went to a prearranged lookout and watched as the trucks were loaded, then trailed them as they left, traveling toward Clovis, He further testified that he notified Kelley by police radio and they watched trucks as they parked near a truck stop east of Clovis.

From that time until the following Monday, Foster and Kelley testified that they had the trucks under constant surveillance.

According to testimony given by Houtchins at the hearing, he and the other officers had anticipated that Dressel would deliver the grain to the Anderson-Hamman Feed Pens near Portales and they made arrangements with Manager Charles Hamman to isolate the truck loads of grain for later re-weighing.

Early in May I attended a meeting at Needmore which was to answer any questions concerning the proposed bond election, Mr. Neil Dillman and Mr. Sam Damron were both present at this meeting and both stated emphatically that there was NO WAY, I repeat, NO WAY, that this bond money that Mr. Dillman and Mr. Damron were asking the voters to approve, could be used to pay off the existing debt on the present facilities.

In a letter dated May 18, 1970, addressed to the Hospital Board and signed by Mr. Joe Smith, of Texas Municipal Bond Company, it is pointed out that the first thing for the board to do was to issue \$380,000.00 revenue bons to acquire West Plains Memorial Hospital payable from the gross revenue of the Hospital District. Please notice that the bonds are to be paid from gross revenue.

This means that even if the Rest Home (present Hospital facilities) should break even (please read TROUBLES A-HEAD FOR NURSING HOMES -- U.S. News and World Report. July 20, 1970) that the taxpayers would have to pay off the bonds since we are obligated to pay any loss encurred by hospital district. Remember that they asked 50¢ per hundred evaluation, but have the option to raise it to 75¢ per hundred.

All income to the district would go into the "pot" and all expenses including the payments on the bonds to pay for West Plains Memorial Hospital would come out. The taxpayer would then have to make up the difference.

I think that either Mr. Dillman and Mr. Damron misrepresented the facts, or didn't know what they were talking about. Either way I feel that they both should resign.

We are really sorry for the problems that we have caused the residents of Muleshoe, but had the District never been formed, none of us would have these problems. Please don't deny us our day in court! And do you really think that only two voting boxes for over 3,000

eligible voters was fair? Next week we will discuss just when it was decided that a hospital district was the only answer and who made this decision.


